(Reconvened at 1:00 p.m.)

COMMISSIONER MacCALLUM: Good afternoon.

MR. HODSON: Good afternoon.

ALL COUNSEL: Good afternoon.

MR. HODSON: Good afternoon,

Mr. Commissioner. Just one introduction, Cheryl Stanley is here, a second counsel for Hersh Wolch who is away this week, if I can introduce Ms. Stanley.

COMMISSIONER MacCALLUM: Ms. Stanley.

MR. HODSON: Welcome. Our first witness today is Linda Fisher. If I could ask Ms. Fisher to come up to the stand, please.

**LINDA LILLIAN FISHER, sworn:**

**BY MR. HODSON:**

**Q** Good afternoon, Ms. Fisher. Thank you for agreeing to testify before this Commission of Inquiry. I understand that you reside in Cando, Saskatchewan; is that correct?

**A** Yes.

**Q** And that's about a half -- an hour and a half northwest of Saskatoon; is that right?

**A** Well, southwest more.

**Q** Southwest, my apologies. And your current age I



1 understand is 54 years of age; is that correct?

2 A Yes.

3 Q And that you were formerly married to Larry  
4 Fisher?

01:03 5 A Yes.

6 Q And I understand that you were married on December  
7 16th, 1967?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And the formal divorce was January of 1979; is  
01:03 10 that correct?

11 A Yes.

12 Q Does that sound right? And I understand that  
13 Larry Fisher was incarcerated starting on  
14 September 19th, 1970 and would it be fair to say,  
01:03 15 Ms. Fisher, that prior to your divorce and  
16 sometime prior to that did you and Larry Fisher  
17 cease to be living as man and wife?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And when would that have been, early '70s, mid  
01:03 20 '70s?

21 A Well, from the time he was picked up in Winnipeg  
22 he had been in jail.

23 Q Right. So physically you were apart; correct?

24 A Yeah.

01:04 25 Q And at some point before the court did the final



1 order of divorce, at some time prior did you at  
2 least in your mind conclude that you were no  
3 longer living as husband and wife or --

4 A Yes.

01:04 5 Q And when would that have been?

6 A Probably almost as soon as he went to jail.

7 Q Okay. And when was the last contact you've had  
8 with Larry Fisher?

9 A I don't know. Before 1980 I guess.

01:04 10 Q So about 25 years ago?

11 A Yeah.

12 Q Or longer?

13 A Yes.

14 Q I would like to just go through some family  
01:04 15 members and get some information and ask you some  
16 questions. If we could call up the family tree  
17 document, please. I'm sorry, I don't have the doc  
18 ID. Just turn it around. Mrs. Fisher, this is a  
19 document that we prepared based on information  
01:05 20 from various sources that sets out family  
21 relationships and you'll see your name there.

22 Your maiden name, was it Pambrun or McDonald?

23 A Pambrun.

24 Q Pambrun. And your mother is Irene; is that  
01:05 25 correct?



1 A Yes.

2 Q And that we understand that you had an Uncle Cliff  
3 and his wife was Anita; is that right?

4 A Yes.

01:05 5 Q And back in the late '60s, 1969, that time frame,  
6 were you fairly close with your Uncle Cliff and  
7 your Aunt Anita?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And did you spend a fair bit of time with them?

01:05 10 A Yes.

11 Q And in the '70s, the years that followed, did you  
12 remain close with Cliff and Anita Pambrun?

13 A Yes.

14 Q And then what about Roy Pambrun, he's also an  
01:05 15 uncle; is that correct?

16 A Yes.

17 Q And did you spend a fair bit of time with him?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And then Doris Poitras is an aunt; is that  
01:05 20 correct?

21 A Yes.

22 Q And were you fairly close with her?

23 A Yes, but not as much time was spent.

24 Q I see. And did she live in Saskatoon at the time?

01:06 25 A No.





1 Q 1969?

2 A No.

3 Q Now, I understand that she is married to a James  
4 Poitras?

01:06 5 A Yes.

6 Q And then I understand as well that Larry Fisher's  
7 sister Sylvia was also married to a Poitras; is  
8 that right?

9 A Yes.

01:06 10 Q And that was Herbert?

11 A Yes.

12 Q And did you know Herbert back in the late '60s?

13 A Yes.

14 Q And then as well I take it then through your Aunt  
01:06 15 Doris and Larry's sister Sylvia, you had two  
16 relationships, if I can call them that, or family  
17 relationships with the Poitras family; is that  
18 correct?

19 A Yes.

01:06 20 Q And so James, George, Arnold Poitras, did you know  
21 those people back in --

22 A Yeah.

23 Q Yes?

24 A Yes.

01:07 25 Q And throughout the '70s and '80s would you be in



1 contact with those people from time to time?

2 A I'm not sure about George, and Arnold not too  
3 much, but I might have ran into them once in a  
4 while.

01:07 5 Q And Doris, would you have contact with Doris?

6 A Yes.

7 Q In the '70s and '80s. And what about Herbert?

8 A Yes.

9 Q You had contact with Herbert in the '70s and '80s?

01:07 10 A Yes.

11 Q I want to go through, Ms. Fisher, some residences.

12 If I could call up 067059, please. For the  
13 record, that family tree is 331783. And this is a

14 document that the RCMP prepared a number of years

01:07 15 ago to try and put in one record where you and

16 Larry Fisher lived starting -- and in particular

17 Larry Fisher back in 1949 -- and I just want to go

18 through some of these with you. If we can just go

19 to the next slide, please, and this says in 1967,

01:08 20 December 16th, 1967 you were married and that you

21 lived at your Uncle Cliff's house on 818 Avenue H

22 for a few months. Is that correct?

23 A Yes.

24 Q And then you moved to Avenue F South, 512 Avenue F

01:08 25 South. Do you remember living there?



1 A Yes.

2 Q Do you remember how long you lived there or when  
3 you lived there?

4 A Well, until Tammy was born. Maybe she was a month  
01:08 5 or two old when we moved.

6 Q Okay. And I think she was born April of '68; is  
7 that correct?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And then if we can go to the next slide, please,  
01:08 10 and 1530 Avenue C North, and I think we heard  
11 evidence that that was a house where Sylvia and  
12 Herb Poitras lived in the upstairs. Did you live  
13 in their basement for a while?

14 A Yes.

01:09 15 Q So you would have moved there a couple of months  
16 after Tammy was born; is that right?

17 A Yeah.

18 Q And then it says -- actually, it's got here birth  
19 of daughter Tammy April 25, 1968. Is that  
01:09 20 correct?

21 A Yes.

22 Q So 1530 Avenue C North, it says you moved out on  
23 November 12th, 1968 after a toaster fire? Do you  
24 remember that?

01:09 25 A Yes.



1 Q Does that date sound correct, November 12th? I'm  
2 not sure where the RCMP obtained that.

3 A I'm not sure either. It was starting to get cold,  
4 so I don't know what the date was.

01:09 5 Q Does that sound within the time frame --

6 A Yeah.

7 Q -- that you recall? And then it says that you  
8 moved to 334 Avenue O South from November 12th  
9 until the fall of '69; is that correct?

01:09 10 A Yes.

11 Q And that was the house where the Cadraings lived on  
12 the main floor, the top floor; is that right?

13 A Yes.

14 Q I'll come back to the Cadraings in a moment. If we  
01:10 15 can go to the next page, please. And then you  
16 moved out of the Cadraings to 1824 Avenue D North;  
17 is that right?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And the fall of '69 until 1970, and there's some  
01:10 20 documents that suggest your land lady there was a  
21 lady by the name of Antonio Kinar. Does that name  
22 sound familiar?

23 A Yes.

24 Q And then the next slide, please. And then 120  
01:10 25 Adelaide Street East, do you recall moving there?



1 A Yes.

2 Q And then you were there until Larry went to jail  
3 in September of 1970; is that correct?

4 A Yes.

01:10 5 Q And then I understand that you moved to your  
6 grandmother's house; is that correct?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And was that on Avenue K or J?

9 A K.

01:10 10 Q Avenue K. And how long were you there for; do you  
11 remember?

12 A Not really, no.

13 Q Pardon me?

14 A No, I don't remember.

01:10 15 Q If we could call up 049548, and again this is an  
16 RCMP document from 1992 and they identify that  
17 after Larry went to jail you moved to 830 Avenue K  
18 North. Linda and two year old daughter moved in  
19 with grandmother Edith Pambrun. Is that correct?

01:11 20 A Yes.

21 Q And then again where you went after that, do you  
22 have any recollection of how long you were with  
23 your grandmother and then where you moved after,  
24 or when?

01:11 25 A I'm not sure. Maybe Avenue U.



1 Q Do you remember how old Tammy would have been when  
2 you moved then?

3 A No, I --

4 Q Just back to the Cadrain house. So you would have  
01:11 5 been in the Cadrain house for about a year; is  
6 that right, November '68 until the fall of 1969?

7 A Well, yeah, around a year.

8 Q I'm sorry, do you think it was less or more than  
9 that?

01:12 10 A I'm not positive. I know Tammy turned a year old  
11 there.

12 Q So that would have been April of 1969; correct?

13 A Yes.

14 Q April 25th. And certainly at the time of Gail  
01:12 15 Miller's murder, which was January 31, 1969, were  
16 you living at the Cadrain house at 334 Avenue O  
17 South?

18 A Yes.

19 Q Do you remember how it came to be that you moved  
01:12 20 into that house?

21 A Well, it was after the toaster fire and I don't  
22 know, probably it was in the paper. I'm not sure.

23 Q Did you know the Cadrains prior to moving in?

24 A No.

01:12 25 Q Do you know if Larry knew the Cadrains prior to



1 moving in?

2 A I don't know.

3 Q And did you know any of the Cadrain children then  
4 when you lived there, did you socialize with any  
01:13 5 of them or have contact with any of them?

6 A No, not socialize, but I knew them, yes.

7 Q And what about the parents, Leonard and Estelle  
8 Cadrain, did you spend much time with them?

9 A No. I think I borrowed a can opener one time.

01:13 10 Not -- not much, no.

11 Q And tell us just a bit about the basement suite  
12 then, did you have the entire basement area to  
13 yourselves?

14 A I think so, yes.

01:13 15 Q Or was there any part that the Cadraings utilized  
16 either for storage or had access to?

17 A Not that I remember, no.

18 Q And did you have your own entrance?

19 A Yes.

01:13 20 Q And what side of the house was that located on?

21 A On the north.

22 Q And that entrance went to the basement only?

23 A Yes.

24 Q And so I take it then that people on the main  
01:13 25 floor or the second level, the Cadraings would



1 generally not use that entrance; is that fair?

2 A No. Yeah.

3 Q It was a private entrance?

4 A Yes.

01:14 5 Q And then was there another entrance for the  
6 Cadrain house at the front of the house?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And that would be on the west side of the house;  
9 am I right?

01:14 10 A Yes.

11 Q And that would be into the main level of the  
12 Cadrains; is that right?

13 A That's right.

14 Q And through that, the west entrance, the front  
01:14 15 door, would there be access, direct access to the  
16 basement suite?

17 A No.

18 Q And was there another door that you shared,  
19 another entrance?

01:14 20 A Yeah, on the east.

21 Q And would that be a back door, if I can call it  
22 that?

23 A Yes.

24 Q And in the back door you had access to the  
01:14 25 basement suite?





1 A Yes.

2 Q And access to the main level; is that right?

3 A Yes.

4 Q Now, generally when you were there, did you use  
01:14 5 the north, the private entrance or did you also  
6 use the back door, the east entrance on occasion?

7 A I mostly used the north entrance.

8 Q And what about Larry, what entrance did he --

9 A The north entrance.

01:15 10 Q I want to ask you some questions about around the  
11 time frame January, 1969. Where did Larry Fisher  
12 work at that time?

13 A Masonry Contractors I think it was called.

14 Q And what type of work was he doing?

01:15 15 A I think he was a bricklayer's helper.

16 Q And had he been there for a time period?

17 A Well, from the time we moved to Saskatoon, yeah.

18 Q So in 1967; is that right?

19 A Yeah.

01:15 20 Q Yes?

21 A Yeah, '68.

22 Q Or early --

23 A '68?

24 Q December you were married, December of '67, so is  
01:15 25 it '68 that you moved to Saskatoon?



1 A Yeah, around, well the end of '68, the very end of  
2 '68 I guess it would be.

3 Q So about the time you moved into the Cadrain house  
4 is when he started to work there?

01:16 5 A Yes.

6 Q And prior to that did he work anywhere?

7 A Well, yeah, he worked from -- for them as long as  
8 we were in Saskatoon.

9 Q Okay.

01:16 10 A From the beginning.

11 Q Now I understand and we've heard evidence that  
12 your Uncle Cliff also worked at masonry  
13 construction, is that right, or Masonry  
14 Contractors?

01:16 15 A Yup.

16 Q And your Uncle Roy worked there as well?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And were there some other friends or relatives  
19 that also worked at Masonry Contractors?

01:16 20 A Umm, Ken Shoemaker and --

21 Q Leonard Sonnleitner?

22 A Yeah, Leonard worked there for a period of time.

23 Q Leonard Sonnleitner?

24 A Yeah, Sonnleitner, yes.

01:16 25 Q And did your Uncle Cliff get Larry the job there,



1 or did he get it on his own, or do you know?

2 A I don't know.

3 Q Okay. And again in January of 1969 or the winter  
4 of '68-'69, when you were living at the Cadrain  
01:17 5 household, what days did Larry normally work?

6 A Monday to Friday.

7 Q Did he ever work on the weekends, Saturday or  
8 Sunday?

9 A I don't remember.

01:17 10 Q And do you remember what time he worked, what time  
11 his shift started and ended?

12 A Well, around 7:00, I thought from 7:00 until -- I  
13 don't know, he was usually home by supper, I don't  
14 know what time he got home normally.

01:17 15 Q And at that time, again the winter of '68-'69, did  
16 Larry own a vehicle?

17 A I don't think so.

18 Q Did he have his driver's licence to your  
19 knowledge?

01:17 20 A He had his learner's licence.

21 Q How did he generally or normally get to work,  
22 then, in the morning?

23 A By the bus, usually.

24 Q Did he ever get a ride to your knowledge?

01:17 25 A He could have. I don't know.



1 Q Do you recall whether your Uncle Cliff gave him a  
2 ride to work from time to time?

3 A I don't remember.

4 Q And again, sorry, when he took the bus do you have  
01:18 5 any recollection of what time he would normally  
6 leave the house in the morning or what bus he  
7 caught?

8 A Actually, no. Well around 7:00, I thought, but --

9 Q Did you generally get up in the morning, then,  
01:18 10 when he went to work?

11 A No.

12 Q At that time, again the winter of '68-'69, did  
13 Larry ever borrow your Uncle Cliff's automobile?

14 A Yes.

01:18 15 Q And for what purposes would he borrow it?

16 A Well, if we had to go to the doctor, or maybe  
17 sometimes for groceries. Not too often. Clifford  
18 didn't like to lend his vehicle so it would have  
19 to be kind of important.

01:19 20 Q And how, how long would you generally borrow it  
21 for?

22 A Not long.

23 Q And --

24 A If we went to the doctor, just for the  
01:19 25 appointment, and take it home.



1 Q And do you recall whether, again the winter of  
2 '68-'69 or at any time, whether Larry Fisher would  
3 have borrowed your Uncle Cliff's vehicle  
4 overnight?

01:19 5 A I don't know, I don't --

6 Q Pardon me?

7 A I don't know.

8 Q Okay.

9 A I don't think so.

01:19 10 Q And why do you say you don't think so?

11 A Umm, Clifford didn't like to lend the vehicle.

12 Q Do you know whether Clifford and Anita had more  
13 than one vehicle operating?

14 A I don't know. I don't think so.

01:19 15 Q Were there occasions that Mr. Fisher did not go to  
16 work Monday to Friday due to cold weather; do you  
17 remember if that --

18 A Not that I remember.

19 Q Do you remember him missing work due to any  
01:19 20 illness, or I think I've read some mention of a  
21 cement allergy, anything of that nature?

22 A I remember one time, I think it was cement, a  
23 cement crack on his hand that -- or something like  
24 that. That's the only time I remember him not  
01:20 25 going to work.



1 Q And you have a recollection of him not going to  
2 work on a weekday because of this?

3 A Well I don't know if -- he probably went in the  
4 afternoon, but in the morning or something he went  
01:20 5 to the doctor or that, because it was open or  
6 bleeding or --

7 Q Yeah.

8 A -- they couldn't get it to --

9 Q Was this the morning of January 31, 1969 or on a  
01:20 10 different occasion?

11 A I don't know, I don't -- I don't know what  
12 occasion it would have been.

13 Q So you have a recollection of one day where he  
14 didn't go to work in the morning because of a  
01:20 15 problem with his hand; --

16 A Yes.

17 Q -- is that right?

18 A Yes, yeah.

19 Q Can you tell us what did Larry Fisher generally  
01:21 20 wear for work clothes then, again around the time  
21 of the 1968-1970 time period, did he have a set of  
22 work clothes?

23 A I don't remember what he wore. Probably khaki  
24 pants or jeans or something like that.

01:21 25 Q What about a hard hat?



1 A Yes.

2 Q And do you have a recollection of him having a  
3 hard hat at home that he would take to and from  
4 work?

01:21 5 A Yeah, I think he had a yellow one at home.

6 Q And do you remember if there was a liner with that  
7 hat for the wintertime?

8 A I don't know.

9 Q Do you ever remember him having a white hard hat?

01:21 10 A Yes.

11 Q And, again, would that have -- when would that  
12 have been; the same winter?

13 A I don't know.

14 Q And what about a toque; do you have a recollection  
01:21 15 of him wearing a toque that winter?

16 A I know he had a couple toques, but I don't know  
17 when he wore them or --

18 Q Do you remember what colour they were?

19 A Not really. I know one either his mother made or  
01:22 20 was home-made, but I don't know what, I don't even  
21 know the colour any more.

22 Q Okay. And what about footwear, did he have  
23 construction footwear?

24 A Yeah, he had --

01:22 25 Q When he was --



1 A -- work boots. He had the steel-toed work boot.

2 Q Okay. And again, this comes up in the some of the  
3 later statements and interviews Mrs. Fisher, what  
4 about other dress clothes then? And again I'm  
01:22 5 talking January 1969; do you have a recollection  
6 of what else he had, when he was not working, for  
7 clothes?

8 A Well he had a black pants and a colourful shirt  
9 and he had a colourful pants, I think it was blue  
01:23 10 and green and kind of the, the bright colours,  
11 blue, green, black, yellow.

12 Q Okay. And at the time, again in '68-'69, was it  
13 common for Larry Fisher to go out in the evening  
14 to the bar socializing; did that happen from time  
01:23 15 to time?

16 A Yes. Yes.

17 Q And, again, would he go in his construction  
18 clothes, his dress clothes, or did it depend on  
19 the day?

01:23 20 A Usually the dress clothes.

21 Q Again, back in January of 1969, do you recall if  
22 he had a leather coat?

23 A No, I --

24 Q Again, that winter of '68-'69, who did Larry  
01:23 25 socialize with at that time?





1 A Mainly Clifford I think.

2 Q And that would be your Uncle Clifford?

3 A Yes.

4 Q And --

01:24 5 A And, well, I'm not sure if Ken, Ken Shoemaker he  
6 used to hang around with, I don't know if that was  
7 before the Miller or after.

8 Q So Clifford Pambrun, your Uncle Cliff, your  
9 recollection is that Larry would have spent some  
01:24 10 time or a fair bit of time with him socializing;  
11 is that right?

12 A Yes.

13 Q And did they go out to the bars together; is that  
14 what they did?

01:24 15 A I think they went pretty well everywhere together.

16 Q Okay. Did you go with them on occasion?

17 A No, not to the bars.

18 Q And what was your age at that time?

19 A That's -- 17, 18, I'm not sure.

01:24 20 Q Okay. I think in January of '69 you would have  
21 been 17 years old; does that sound right?

22 A Yeah.

23 Q And you would have turned 18 on April 20th of  
24 1969?

01:25 25 A Yeah.



1 Q Were you old enough to get in the bars?

2 A No.

3 Q Was Larry?

4 A No.

01:25 5 Q Can you tell us just generally, again the winter  
6 of '68, 1969 and 1970 before Larry was arrested in  
7 Winnipeg, did you observe his drinking habits; did  
8 he drink a lot, a little, can you tell us about  
9 that?

01:25 10 A No, not -- he didn't drink much.

11 Q He didn't drink much?

12 A Umm-umm.

13 Q What about drugs, did you either know of or  
14 observe him taking drugs?

01:25 15 A No.

16 Q Were you aware that he had been -- did he ever  
17 tell you that he ever was?

18 A No.

19 Q And again prior to his arrest in Winnipeg, so from  
01:25 20 the time you were married in 1967 until his arrest  
21 in September of 1970, did you have any issues with  
22 Larry Fisher about other women that he was  
23 seeing --

24 A Yes.

01:25 25 Q -- at the time? And would that be on more than



1 one occasion?

2 A Yes.

3 Q Would it be an issue that the two of you would  
4 argue about from time to time?

01:26 5 A Yes.

6 Q And was he seeing other women and having  
7 relationships with other women while he was  
8 married to you; is that correct?

9 A Yes.

01:26 10 Q Are we talking a handful, two or three, or can you  
11 give us some sense?

12 A Two or three that I know of.

13 Q And are there others that you suspected but didn't  
14 know of?

01:26 15 A Yes.

16 Q And would that be a source of dispute between the  
17 two of you?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And, again, at that time '68-'69 who would you  
01:26 20 have socialized with, Mrs. Fisher, who would have  
21 been your close acquaintances at the time?

22 A My Aunt Anita, umm, I think some of the Vermettes,  
23 my Aunt Florence.

24 Q That's Sonnleitner?

01:27 25 A Yeah.



1 Q Sonnleitner?

2 A Uh-huh, Sonnleitner.

3 Q Sonnleitner?

4 A Yeah.

01:27 5 Q There was also mention, were there some teenage  
6 girls who babysat for you at that time?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And who were they?

9 A Pat and Theresa Van Aseldonk.

01:27 10 Q And they were sisters I take it?

11 A Yes.

12 Q And do you remember how old they were,  
13 approximately, at that time?

14 A Umm, Pat was 12 or 13 and Theresa must have been  
01:27 15 15-16.

16 Q And, again, the winter of '68-'69 did they babysit  
17 for you from time to time?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And did they also visit you socially --

01:27 20 A Yes.

21 Q -- from time to time?

22 A Yes.

23 Q What, would you have considered yourself a good  
24 friend of theirs at the time, or --

01:27 25 A Umm, yeah.



1 Q When you were living at the Cadrain residence did  
2 you know of a person by the name of Albert Cadrain  
3 or Shorty Cadrain?

4 A Yes.

01:28 5 Q And you knew who he was?

6 A Yes.

7 Q And did you spend much time socializing with him  
8 or talking to him?

9 A No.

01:28 10 Q Did you see much of him?

11 A No.

12 Q Do you know if Larry Fisher spent any time with  
13 Albert Cadrain?

14 A Not that I know of.

01:28 15 Q I want to ask you, back in late 1968 or early 1969  
16 before the Gail Miller murder -- and the Gail  
17 Miller murder was January 31, 1969 -- prior to  
18 that did you become aware of a couple of rapes and  
19 an attempted rape being committed in Saskatoon,  
01:28 20 two in the area that you lived in, in October and  
21 November of 1968?

22 A I think so, I -- yes.

23 Q And what do you remember about that?

24 A I think there was something on the news too, or in  
01:29 25 the paper -- no, I never got the paper, it had to



1 be on the radio -- that that was happening in the  
2 neighbourhoods.

3 Q Okay. And at that time, again while you were at  
4 the Cadrain house, did you have a television?

01:29 5 A No.

6 Q Did you have a radio?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And did you listen to the radio frequently?

9 A Yes.

01:29 10 Q And did you get the newspaper or read the  
11 newspaper?

12 A Umm, no newspaper, no.

13 Q And then prior to the Cadrain house, at your  
14 previous residence, did you have a television or  
01:29 15 radio there?

16 A Before Cadrain's we never had a radio, no.

17 Q So prior to moving into Cadrain's you would not  
18 have had television, radio, or newspaper; is that  
19 correct?

01:29 20 A That's right.

21 Q And at Cadrain's you would have had the radio but  
22 no television, no newspaper; is that correct?

23 A Yes.

24 Q So your recollection is that you would have heard  
01:29 25 something about some rapes; is that correct?



1 A Yes.

2 Q Do you remember what you heard?

3 A Probably just a warning to be careful going out.

4 Q Okay. And do you remember, do you remember

01:30 5 hearing where those took place, whether it was in  
6 the area you lived or not?

7 A No.

8 Q And were you concerned at all about -- about that?

9 A I think, I think we all, all thought about it,  
01:30 10 yes.

11 Q When you say 'we' who are you talking about?

12 A Oh, me and Anita, my aunt, and the girls, Pat and  
13 Theresa, we probably talked about not running  
14 around at night and --

01:30 15 Q Okay. If I could just call up 214160, please.  
16 This is an article that was in the *Saskatoon*  
17 *StarPhoenix* September 14th, 1968, and I think  
18 you've told us that you wouldn't have read the  
19 paper at the time; is that correct?

01:30 20 A No.

21 Q And it says here that:

22 "Police have issued a warning to women  
23 not to talk to strangers or walk in dark  
24 areas of the city if they can avoid it.

01:31 25 They issued this warning after



1 two instances of alleged rape and one  
2 assault were brought to their attention.  
3 Police said the alleged rapes took place  
4 in the Riversdale area and the assault  
5 took place in the university district.

6 They said the alleged assailant  
7 first talks to women and then takes them  
8 into alleys."

9 And again, the part that I have read you, does  
01:31 10 that sound similar to what you would have heard  
11 on the radio; are you able to tell us?

12 A It does, it does, so maybe I did know in the areas  
13 they were.

14 Q Okay. And at this time, and again this is prior  
01:31 15 to Gail Miller's murder, did you have any  
16 suspicions or concerns that your husband Larry  
17 Fisher had been involved in any of those rapes or  
18 attempted rape?

19 A No.

01:31 20 Q Did you have any discussions with Larry Fisher, at  
21 or around that time, about these warnings in the  
22 media about the rapes?

23 A I don't remember.

24 Q Again, I'm going to call up 325549, please. And  
01:32 25 Mrs. Fisher, this is a document that we've





1 prepared, it simply outlines the date of the  
2 offences and the name of the victim and the  
3 location where these assaults took place, and  
4 apart from the (V4)---- (V4)--- incident the other  
01:32 5 four are all matters where Larry Fisher pled  
6 guilty to and was convicted in 1971. And so just,  
7 again, October 21, 1968, 18th Street between G and  
8 H, the second one 18th Street between Avenues E  
9 and F; do you recall anything about those areas?  
01:33 10 I think there was some reference that you had  
11 lived on Avenue F at some point; is that right?

12 A Yeah.

13 Q Was it in that area, the 500 block of F?

14 A Yes.

01:33 15 Q And then again the third one was in the university  
16 area November 29th, 1968. So again I think, apart  
17 from what you heard in the media, on the radio you  
18 think, was there anything else that you were aware  
19 of about these rapes or incidents at the time?

01:33 20 A Not that I remember, no.

21 Q And again, October-November 1968, did you notice  
22 anything unusual about Larry Fisher's behaviour at  
23 that time that would cause you to suspect him of  
24 being involved in these rapes?

01:33 25 A No.



1 Q Did you notice anything unusual about his  
2 behaviour towards you, or any other people at the  
3 time, that would cause you to be suspicious of him  
4 being involved in these rapes?

01:34 5 A No.

6 Q At the time?

7 A No.

8 Q Let's now turn to January 30th, 1969 and January  
9 31, 1969. And the latter date, January 31, 1969,  
01:34 10 is the date that Gail Miller was murdered and her  
11 body was found that morning; do you recall that  
12 day and the evening prior?

13 A Well that evening, umm, Larry never came home from  
14 work, and so I was in a panic, packing my bags and  
01:34 15 mad as a hatter. And so I packed my boxes and put  
16 them on the -- in the middle of the hallway and --

17 Q Okay. Carry on?

18 A And then in the morning when I woke up Larry was  
19 still home, he hadn't went to work, and so I  
01:35 20 started arguing with him and that's when we had  
21 the argument about the knife being missing. When  
22 I went to cook dinner the knife was missing, and  
23 as I was arguing that bulletin came on the news,  
24 and so then I just said 'well you were probably  
01:35 25 the one that was out doin' that because my knife,



1           where's my paring knife', and so then that's when  
2           he looked shocked and so I quit arguing with him.

3       Q       Okay. And then what happened?

4       A       Well that was probably the end of our argument,  
01:35 5           and I made dinner I guess, and --

6       Q       And did he leave or did he stay; do you remember?

7       A       No, he left, he left. I don't know if it was  
8           after dinner or --

9       Q       Okay. And do you know where he went?

01:36 10      A       No.

11      Q       Okay. Let's just back up. I think at the start  
12           you said the night before, which that would be the  
13           night of January 30th; is that correct?

14      A       Yes.

01:36 15      Q       And you said he didn't come home; is that correct?

16      A       Yes.

17      Q       And was that come home from work or had he come  
18           home from work and gone out?

19      A       He hadn't come home from work.

01:36 20      Q       And was that uncommon for him, on a weekday, not  
21           to come home from work?

22      A       Umm, well that's what our arguments were about so  
23           no, not really uncommon.

24      Q       And so he, he had -- when he hadn't come home on  
01:36 25           the night of January 30th where did you think he



1 was?

2 A Well I thought they -- he was out partying or --

3 Q Okay. And had that happened before, that he had  
4 been out and you thought he was out partying?

01:37 5 A Yes.

6 Q And had there been previous occasions where he  
7 wouldn't come home until very late after work?

8 A Well he, when he wouldn't come home for supper,  
9 anyways there was -- there was occasions.

01:37 10 Q So I think you said you packed up your belongings;  
11 did you?

12 A Yes.

13 Q And that would be during the evening of January  
14 30th?

01:37 15 A Yes.

16 Q Had you done that before?

17 A No.

18 Q And what prompted you to do that?

19 A I was just mad I guess.

01:37 20 Q And why were you mad?

21 A Because he never came home for supper.

22 Q And then I think you said when you woke up in the  
23 morning, I think your words were, "he was still  
24 home", and do you know when he came home on the  
01:37 25 night of January 30th or the morning of January



1 31st?

2 A No.

3 Q So when you went to bed, what time did you go to  
4 bed the night before, do you remember?

01:37 5 A Must -- it was probably after, after 1:00.

6 Q And were you waiting up for him?

7 A Yes.

8 Q So you went to bed after 1:00, he wasn't home at  
9 that time, is that correct?

01:38 10 A Yes.

11 Q And do you recall roughly what time you would have  
12 woken up on the morning of the 31st?

13 A Oh, I figure it would be between 9:00 and 11:00.

14 Q And on what basis do you say that, is that your  
01:38 15 normal time that you would get up, or is there  
16 something that you remember about that morning  
17 that causes you to say that time?

18 A Well that's usually around, in between there, when  
19 I would get up.

01:38 20 Q Okay. And so when you woke up Larry Fisher was at  
21 home; is that correct?

22 A Yes.

23 Q And do you remember what he was wearing?

24 A He was wearing his dress clothes.

01:38 25 Q And did you ask him about that?



1 A Yes.

2 Q And what did he say?

3 A He said -- he didn't -- I don't know what he said.

4 Q Did you ask him about why he wasn't at work?

01:38 5 A Yes.

6 Q And what did he say about that?

7 A I don't know what he said.

8 Q Did you -- and you have been asked this question  
9 on a number of occasions before, Mrs. Fisher -- do  
01:39 10 you know whether or not Mr. Fisher had come home  
11 late Thursday night or early Friday morning after  
12 you went to bed?

13 A Well he had to come home sometime after I was  
14 asleep, I don't know whether it was the morning,  
01:39 15 or I know it -- to me it seems like he wasn't home  
16 that night at all.

17 Q And why do you say that?

18 A Well, he, I don't think he got into bed.

19 Q Okay. And you were asked this question, and I'll  
01:39 20 show you this in transcripts a bit later on about  
21 whether it's possible that he did get into bed  
22 that night and then got up in the morning, and  
23 what do you say about that; is that possible or do  
24 you think that happened?

01:39 25 A Well, it's possible, but seeing that I was mad and



1 kind of waiting for him I'd have probably been  
2 trying to pick at him if he came home.

3 Q Let me ask you this. At the time when you saw him  
4 that morning I think you said you were upset with  
01:40 5 him?

6 A Yes.

7 Q And at that time what had you -- what were you  
8 thinking about where he had been the night before  
9 and when he got home?

01:40 10 A I didn't know, I thought he was running around, I  
11 guess.

12 Q And did you think he had just gotten home shortly  
13 before you saw him then?

14 A I thought so.

01:40 15 Q Okay. And did you notice anything else about him  
16 other than his dress clothes?

17 A Well he had -- he was -- had just bathed or  
18 showered or --

19 Q Okay. And, again, so the argument, again I think  
01:40 20 you've told us you would have been upset with him  
21 for not coming home; is that right? Is that  
22 correct? I need a "yes".

23 A Yes.

24 Q Do you remember how long you argued with him for?

01:41 25 A Umm, I don't know. All that morning.



1 Q Okay. Now you'd mentioned about a knife being  
2 missing; do you remember when you realized that  
3 your knife was missing?

4 A When I went to make dinner I was going to peel  
01:41 5 potatoes and it wasn't there.

6 Q Okay. So this would be the morning or this would  
7 be after you started the argument -- or I  
8 shouldn't say "you started" -- after you had the  
9 argument with Larry Fisher that morning, or in the  
01:41 10 course of the argument, is that more accurate,  
11 that you would have gone to look for your knife?

12 A Yes.

13 Q And is that the first time, then, you noticed it  
14 was missing?

01:41 15 A Yes.

16 Q And then tell us again about what you heard on the  
17 radio; what is your recollection of what you  
18 heard?

19 A Umm, that a woman was, was stabbed or murdered --  
01:42 20 stabbed, must have been stabbed, because I think  
21 that's what I told Larry, I said "you were  
22 probably stabbing that woman", so I must have  
23 heard that she was stabbed and killed.

24 Q Okay.

01:42 25 A I don't remember what else.





1 Q Do you remember the news report indicating where  
2 the murder took place?

3 A No, I don't remember.

4 Q Do you remember whether or not, again and I'm  
01:42 5 talking about the first broadcast that you heard,  
6 whether they identified the victim as a nurse or  
7 not?

8 A I'm not sure.

9 Q Okay.

01:42 10 A I'm not sure.

11 Q So then, shortly before the broadcast came on, is  
12 it fair to say you would have realized that your  
13 knife was missing; is that correct?

14 A Yes.

01:43 15 Q And then when the report came on do you remember  
16 what words you used, then, when you accused Larry  
17 Fisher?

18 A I -- I don't know. I think it was pretty crude.

19 Q And at that time, Mrs. Fisher, did you think that  
01:43 20 your husband had been involved in the murder of  
21 Gail Miller?

22 A No.

23 Q And why did you accuse him of that, then, at the  
24 time?

01:43 25 A Because that bulletin came on, and I couldn't find



1 my paring knife, and I just -- probably just to --  
2 probably just to get a reaction or something. I  
3 don't know.

4 Q Okay. And tell us again about the reaction that  
01:43 5 you did get; describe for us what Larry Fisher  
6 said and what you observed?

7 A Then Larry quit talking and he just kind of looked  
8 shocked, went pale, and then I thought, oh, he  
9 really thinks that I think that, and I didn't  
01:43 10 really think that so I thought I overdid it.

11 Q Okay. Did you ever apologize to him for that; do  
12 you remember?

13 A Probably not, no.

14 Q And so again his reaction, did -- at the time did  
01:44 15 you think anything about his reaction, anything  
16 unusual about that?

17 A No.

18 Q Or suspicious at the time?

19 A No.

01:44 20 Q And again, at that time when you made the comment  
21 to him and he reacted as you've described, did his  
22 reaction cause you to believe that he may have  
23 been involved in the murder?

24 A No.

01:44 25 Q Tell us about the knife that -- the knife that you



1           were missing. Can you describe that for us,  
2           please?

3           A       That was a wooden-handled paring knife about maybe  
4           five inches long. It had two rivets in the -- to  
01:44 5           hold the blade on.

6           Q       Yes. And prior to this incident with Larry  
7           Fisher, had you noticed the knife missing before  
8           that do you know?

9           A       No.

01:45 10          Q       Did you use this knife on a regular basis?

11          A       Yes.

12          Q       Like, every day?

13          A       Yes.

14          Q       Now, as far as the timing of this, Mrs. Fisher,  
01:45 15          and you've been asked in previous proceedings and  
16          I will show you some earlier transcripts and  
17          interviews a bit later, but you've been questioned  
18          from time to time about whether or not this  
19          discussion you had with Larry Fisher heard on the  
01:45 20          morning or the day of the murder or the next day.  
21          Do you remember being asked about that in various  
22          proceedings?

23          A       (Nods head).

24          Q       Yes?

01:45 25          A       Yes.



1 Q And what is your best recollection today as to --  
2 and again, just -- I think there's no dispute on  
3 this, that January 31st was a Friday and it was at  
4 about 8:20, 8:30 that morning that Gail Miller's  
01:46 5 body was found of that morning. What is your best  
6 recollection as to whether or not this discussion  
7 with Larry Fisher was on the Friday or perhaps on  
8 the Saturday, the next day?

9 A I still think it's on Friday because he had to go  
01:46 10 to work.

11 Q Okay. Do you recall a discussion or an argument  
12 with him about the fact that he wasn't at work at  
13 that time?

14 A Yes.

01:46 15 Q Do you recall what the weather was like that day?

16 A Well, not really, because I never went out that  
17 day.

18 Q Now, do you know whether Larry Fisher went to work  
19 either before you had the argument with him or  
01:47 20 after that day? Did you ever inquire about that?

21 A No, I didn't. He might have went to work after we  
22 argued.

23 Q Do you have any recollection as to any reason that  
24 he may have given you for not being at work that  
01:47 25 day?



1 A The only reason would have been his hand.

2 Q And do you have a recollection of January 31,  
3 1969, of either observing his hand or him telling  
4 you that he had a problem with his hand?

01:47 5 A I'm not sure, no.

6 Q So it's possible, but you don't remember; is  
7 that --

8 A That's fair.

9 Q Do you know if your Uncle Clifford was at work  
01:47 10 that day?

11 A I don't know.

12 Q I just want to bring up a couple of documents. In  
13 1993, Mrs. Fisher, the RCMP made some inquiries at  
14 a radio station to see if they could find a record  
01:48 15 of when news casts were, radio news casts were  
16 played on the 31st of January, and maybe just to  
17 put it in context, I'll call up 049050 and I'll  
18 just go through this so you understand where this  
19 document came from and what it means, and this is  
01:48 20 an inquiry that they made in March of '93, and  
21 they checked with CFQC radio and as well CJWW and  
22 they found that -- scroll up, please -- CJWW was  
23 not broadcasting in Saskatoon in 1969. Do you  
24 remember CKOM being a radio station that  
01:49 25 broadcasted in 1969?



1 A Could have. I think there was two radio stations  
2 then.

3 Q Okay. And do you remember which one you listened  
4 to?

01:49 5 A I don't know.

6 Q So this talks about the CFQC radio station and it  
7 just goes on to describe that -- if we can go to  
8 page 049048 -- and the RCMP talked to a fellow by  
9 the name of Jim Mattern who reviewed the news  
01:49 10 review file and noted that the first indication of  
11 the murder news was at 12:25 p.m. on January 31,  
12 '69. He felt that this heading could have been  
13 used for other subsequent news broadcasts, i.e.,  
14 on the hour, and then attached to that, if we  
01:49 15 could call up 049051, please, and these have been  
16 highlighted -- what I'm going to do is just have  
17 these -- Mr. Commissioner, I've got a better copy  
18 of this, these have highlighter on them. I think  
19 these can be shown on the screen, it might be  
01:50 20 easier. And again, this would be a report,  
21 Mrs. Fisher, from one of the radio stations and it  
22 suggests that on January 31, '69, 12:25 news, and  
23 these are just headings, murder, body of a young  
24 woman found in a snow bank in the 200 block on  
01:50 25 Avenue N South, and again, as far as timing, does



1           that sound, 12:25, does that sound like the time  
2           that you may have heard it coming on the radio at  
3           the time?

4           A           I don't know, it could be, but --

01:51 5           Q           Do you remember what time of day it was that you  
6           heard --

7           A           It was close to noon, close to dinner.

8           Q           And why do you say that?

9           A           Well, I was going to make dinner.

01:51 10          Q           So 12:25, does that sound again within the time  
11          frame you may have heard it or do you think it was  
12          prior to that?

13          A           Yeah. Well, noonish is all I know.

14          Q           Okay. And if we can just scroll down, then again  
01:51 15          at six o'clock, another bulletin, it's a murder at  
16          Avenue N South this morning, dead is 20 year old  
17          Gail Olena Miller of 130 Avenue O South, and I  
18          think in the RCMP report the radio represented,  
19          indicated that the same bulletin could have been  
01:51 20          used from time to time that afternoon, but again,  
21          12:25, that could have been the time that you  
22          heard it; is that fair?

23          A           Yeah, it -- I don't even know if the name was out  
24          when I -- so -- I don't even know if they  
01:52 25          mentioned it was a nurse or --



1 Q And do you remember hearing about the murder on  
2 the news in the days that followed?

3 A Yes.

4 Q And would you have heard a fair bit about it do  
01:52 5 you think?

6 A Yes.

7 Q And would you have known that the body was found  
8 about a block and a half from your house?

9 A I don't know if I knew that until -- I knew it was  
01:52 10 in our area, but I didn't know where it was, I  
11 think for years.

12 Q And did that cause you any concern, that there had  
13 been a murder close to your house?

14 A I think so.

01:52 15 Q We're done with that document, thanks. So you  
16 would have had the argument with Larry Fisher on  
17 the morning, or around the morning, possibly as  
18 late as noon on January 31; is that correct?

19 A Yes.

01:53 20 Q And then you would have heard the first news  
21 report and then you would have heard following  
22 news reports; is that fair?

23 A Yes.

24 Q Did you ever bring it up again with Larry Fisher,  
01:53 25 and again let's talk prior to him being arrested





1 in Winnipeg, and we know that's September of 1970,  
2 okay, so did you -- again, did you bring it up  
3 with him again?

4 A No.

01:53 5 Q And why not?

6 A Because I didn't think that -- it was just --

7 Q And what about the missing knife, did you ever  
8 find that knife?

9 A No.

01:53 10 Q And again, prior to Larry Fisher's arrest in  
11 Winnipeg in September of 1970, did you have any  
12 thoughts or suspicions that he may have been  
13 involved in the Gail Miller murder?

14 A No.

01:54 15 Q If we could call up 226843, please, this is a  
16 newspaper article and at that time, Ms. Fisher, I  
17 believe the *StarPhoenix* was printed, or  
18 distributed around four or five o'clock in the  
19 afternoon, so this would be the day of the murder,  
01:54 20 and again I think you told us, at least back in  
21 December, you didn't receive the newspaper; is  
22 that correct?

23 A No.

24 Q And would it be fair to say again throughout 1969  
01:54 25 you didn't get the paper either?



1 A I don't think so.

2 Q I just want to go through some of the information  
3 that's reported here and see whether this -- you  
4 would have listened -- would you have listened to  
01:54 5 the radio then throughout this time period?

6 A Yes, and maybe my aunt had the newspaper. I don't  
7 know if they got it.

8 Q This would be your Aunt Anita?

9 A Yeah.

01:55 10 Q And did you read the paper when you were over at  
11 their house do you remember?

12 A I can't remember.

13 Q Would the murder have been fairly significant news  
14 in the neighbourhood at that time?

01:55 15 A Yes.

16 Q And would you have had discussions with your  
17 friends and relatives about it?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And talked about the circumstances and things of  
01:55 20 that nature?

21 A I think so, yes.

22 Q And so this is the first article, if we can just  
23 go through parts of that, they talk about a  
24 murder, the body of a young woman was found this  
01:55 25 morning in an alley behind the 200 block Avenue N



1 South, and so that would be about a block and a  
2 half away, is that right, from your house?

3 A Uh-huh.

4 Q Yes?

01:55 5 A Yes.

6 Q And the police believe it to be murder, and they  
7 reported earlier this afternoon that the woman had  
8 knife wounds in the throat and abdomen area. Do  
9 you remember at the time, or at or about the time  
01:56 10 of the murder, within days or weeks after,  
11 learning that Gail Miller had been stabbed?

12 A Yes.

13 Q And did you learn that she had also been raped?

14 A No, not right away I don't think.

01:56 15 Q And then if we can scroll down, it talks about a  
16 child on the way to school finding the body. Do  
17 you remember hearing about that or talking to your  
18 friends about that?

19 A Yes, I do, the kids had said that, some of the  
01:56 20 kids they went to school with had found the body.

21 Q And was that Pat Van Aseldonk?

22 A Yes.

23 Q And she was going to St. Mary's school at the time  
24 was she?

01:56 25 A Yes.



1 Q And what do you remember about what she told you?

2 A One of her school mates had found the body.

3 Q And it goes on to talk about Mary Marcoux finding  
4 the body. Does that name sound familiar?

01:56 5 A I don't know if she mentioned the name, but the  
6 name does sound familiar.

7 Q If we can go to 214161, please. Sorry, it's  
8 214160 and go to page 161. The doc ID is 214160  
9 and it's the second page. This is an article,  
01:57 10 February 3rd, 1969, so a couple of days after the  
11 murder, and it talks about a reward. Do you  
12 remember hearing about a reward being offered?

13 A I think so, yeah.

14 Q And then as well call out that part of the  
01:58 15 article, it talks here about one of the  
16 possibilities being investigated by the police is  
17 that the attacker was a rapist who was active in  
18 the city last fall. Do you remember hearing about  
19 that in 1969?

01:58 20 A I don't -- I'm not sure. I probably did.

21 Q Do you recall today whether you would have --

22 A No, no.

23 Q -- heard about that at the time? Go to 025945,  
24 please, and this is a document put out by the  
01:58 25 Saskatoon City Police, I think on February 3rd.



1 Do you remember seeing anything like this in the  
2 neighbourhood or being distributed?

3 A I remember there was a reward. I don't remember  
4 seeing it.

01:59 5 Q Okay. Let me just go through parts of this, and  
6 it talks about:

7 "The victim had been murdered sometime  
8 between 6:45 a.m. when she was seen  
9 leaving for work and 8:40 a.m. when her  
01:59 10 body was discovered. The death had  
11 resulted from multiple stab wounds. The  
12 victim's clothing was partially removed  
13 and disarranged, indicating a sexual  
14 attack. The weapon was found at the  
01:59 15 scene, -- a household paring knife."

16 Do you remember, again back in 1969, hearing this  
17 information, that a paring knife had been found  
18 at the scene of Gail Miller's murder?

19 A I must have heard about it. I don't remember  
01:59 20 about then, but --

21 Q Why do you say you must have heard about it?

22 A Because it seems to me because my paring knife was  
23 missing, that must be how I connected later.

24 Q So at the time you think you would have known that  
02:00 25 a paring knife was involved; is that what you are



1 telling us?

2 A Yes.

3 Q We're done with that document. Do you have a  
4 recollection of Larry Fisher losing his wallet  
02:00 5 that winter?

6 A Yes.

7 Q Tell us about what you remember, when it was and  
8 what happened?

9 A Well, it was about a week, in that week after the  
02:00 10 murder, a kid had brought his wallet in and said  
11 he found it outside by the big tree in front of  
12 our house.

13 Q And the big tree would be in front of the Cadrain  
14 house; is that right?

02:00 15 A Yes.

16 Q And do you remember what time of day this was?

17 A It was in the afternoon.

18 Q And was Larry there when the wallet was brought  
19 back?

02:00 20 A No.

21 Q Do you remember who was there with you?

22 A Pat Van Aseldonk.

23 Q And anybody else?

24 A No, not that I remember.

02:01 25 Q And do you know if the wallet had identification



1 in it? I presume it did.

2 A Yes.

3 Q And what did you do with the wallet?

4 A Well, I told him that it was Larry's wallet.

02:01 5 Q Yes. And then what -- so you don't remember  
6 who -- I think you said a kid; is that right?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And do you remember how old, male, female?

9 A I think it was a male.

02:01 10 Q And then once you got the wallet, what did you do  
11 with it?

12 A Well, when Larry got home I gave it back to him.

13 Q And do you recall what discussion you would have  
14 had with him about the wallet?

02:01 15 A I said, "How did you lose your wallet?" and he  
16 said, "It probably fell out of the cab."

17 Q Okay. And any further discussion? Do you  
18 remember discussing it any further with him?

19 A Not really.

02:01 20 Q And when he said it fell out of the cab, what did  
21 you take that to mean?

22 A Well, out of the cab of the truck or -- I don't  
23 know. I didn't think it was -- I don't know what  
24 I thought.

02:02 25 Q Taxi cab?



1 A Taxi cab or the cab of the truck.

2 Q After the murder of Gail Miller, do you have a  
3 recollection of Saskatoon City Police attending at  
4 your home?

02:02 5 A Yes.

6 Q Tell us about that, please.

7 A They came and, to the north door and they asked me  
8 if anything unusual had happened in -- if I heard  
9 anything, seen anything.

02:02 10 Q How many days after the murder would this have  
11 been?

12 A That would have been I think the week after the  
13 murder too.

14 Q So within the week after the murder?

02:02 15 A Uh-huh.

16 Q Yes?

17 A Yes.

18 Q How many police officers were there?

19 A I'm not sure.

02:02 20 Q Was there more than one do you remember?

21 A Probably two, yes.

22 Q Do you remember if they were in uniform or whether  
23 they were plain clothed?

24 A I don't remember.

02:03 25 Q And was Larry home at the time?





1 A No.

2 Q Was anybody at your home at the time in the  
3 basement suite?

4 A Not that I remember.

02:03 5 Q And do you recall these, the officer or officers  
6 telling you what they were inquiring about?

7 A Yes, I think so.

8 Q And what did they tell you?

9 A They were just looking for information that could  
02:03 10 relate to what had happened I think.

11 Q Was it in relation to the Gail Miller murder?

12 A Probably, yes.

13 Q You say probably, yes. Is there -- do you  
14 remember what else they might have been there to  
02:03 15 talk to you about?

16 A That was it I think.

17 Q And they asked you whether, I think you said  
18 whether you saw anything or heard anything; is  
19 that right?

02:03 20 A Yes.

21 Q And what did you tell them?

22 A No.

23 Q And so this would have been about a week after, or  
24 thereabouts, your argument with Larry Fisher on  
02:03 25 the morning of the murder; is that right?



1 A Well, it was in that week.

2 Q Within that week?

3 A Yeah.

4 Q And did you tell them about your argument with  
02:04 5 Larry Fisher?

6 A No.

7 Q Did you tell them about your missing paring knife?

8 A No.

9 Q And did you tell them about your accusation to  
02:04 10 your husband regarding that he must have stabbed  
11 the girl or stabbed the nurse or whatever words  
12 you had used, did you tell them about that?

13 A No.

14 Q And why not?

02:04 15 A I just thought -- I don't know, our arguments were  
16 pretty regular. I mean, they were looking for  
17 something -- something to do with the murder I  
18 guess and I didn't think --

19 Q At that time did you suspect that Larry Fisher was  
02:04 20 involved in the murder of Gail Miller?

21 A No.

22 Q And I take it at that time, I think you've told us  
23 you would have been aware of some of the details  
24 of the murder; is that correct?

02:04 25 A Probably, yes.



1 Q So where the body was found; is that correct?

2 A Yes, in the area.

3 Q And I think you said that a paring knife had been  
4 used; is that correct?

02:05 5 A I don't -- I probably knew a knife was used then.

6 Q And if you would have had suspicions that Larry  
7 Fisher had been involved in a murder, I'm talking  
8 about the first visit within a week after the  
9 murder, if you would have had suspicions would you  
02:05 10 have told the police?

11 A I think so.

12 Q You think so?

13 A Yes.

14 Q And why do you say that?

02:05 15 A Because I would have been scared.

16 Q You would have been scared?

17 A Uh-huh.

18 Q Of what?

19 A Of somebody that was a murder -- murdering.

02:05 20 Q So that if you had a belief or a suspicion at the  
21 time that your husband may have had something to  
22 do with it, you think you would have told the  
23 police at that time?

24 A Yes.

02:05 25 Q Did you become aware at that time -- the police



1 reports indicate, Mrs. Fisher, that on Monday,  
2 February the 3rd, 1969, so that's three days after  
3 the murder, that Larry Fisher was interviewed at  
4 the bus stop by two police officers while he was  
02:06 5 catching the bus to work. Did Larry Fisher ever  
6 talk to you about that or tell you about that?

7 A He could have. I don't remember.

8 Q So prior to Larry Fisher's arrest in Winnipeg in  
9 September of 1970, and we'll talk about that a bit  
02:06 10 later, you've told us about the officer or  
11 officers coming to your door; correct?

12 A Yes.

13 Q Was there any other contact that you had with any  
14 police officer relating to the Gail Miller murder  
02:06 15 or any of the rapes in the area prior to Larry  
16 Fisher being arrested in Winnipeg in 1970?

17 A No.

18 Q And again prior to Larry Fisher's arrest in  
19 Winnipeg, did you have any suspicions that Larry  
02:07 20 Fisher was involved in the Gail Miller murder?

21 A No.

22 Q Did you have any suspicions prior to Larry  
23 Fisher's arrest in Winnipeg in 1970 of his  
24 involvement in any of the rapes that you had heard  
02:07 25 about in the area?



1 A No.

2 Q Now, again back after the murder, did you become  
3 aware -- I'm going to say maybe April, May, June  
4 of 1969 or thereabouts -- that someone had been  
02:07 5 arrested for the murder of Gail Miller?

6 A Yes, probably.

7 Q And do you remember the name David Milgaard?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And what do you remember, and I want to know what  
02:07 10 you remember, if you are able to tell us, from  
11 that time as opposed to what you may have heard or  
12 read later on. Can you tell us back at the time  
13 what you would have heard or what you would have  
14 known about the charge against Mr. Milgaard?

02:08 15 A I think he was accused, that they had picked up  
16 somebody. I remember the Cadrain kids talking  
17 about it could have been blood on Milgaard's  
18 clothes or Milgaard had come to their place or  
19 something. It seems to me that I knew a little  
02:08 20 bit more about it, you know, in that -- that  
21 somebody had come to their place, like, Milgaard  
22 had come to their place and blood on the clothes,  
23 that's what I had heard.

24 Q And when you say their place, that was also your  
02:08 25 place?



1 A Yeah, upstairs.

2 Q And so do you remember at that time, Mrs. Fisher,  
3 talking to people about the fact that the person  
4 who was accused of the murder was at your house  
02:09 5 the morning of the murder? Do you remember that?

6 A Yes, uh-huh.

7 Q And would that have been in discussions with the  
8 Cadrain --

9 A Yes.

02:09 10 Q -- family members? Do you remember which  
11 Cadrains?

12 A I don't remember if it was Rita and Pat or -- I  
13 think it was the girls, or maybe I even got it all  
14 secondhand from Pat, the information that I knew.

02:09 15 Q And this would be in 1969; is that fair?

16 A Yes.

17 Q And would there be a fair bit of discussion in the  
18 neighbourhood about both the murder and the charge  
19 and the trial for David Milgaard?

02:09 20 A I think there was, yes.

21 Q And what do you remember hearing about bloody  
22 clothes?

23 A I don't know, I heard -- first I heard coveralls,  
24 that's what Pat had said, the Cadrains had found  
02:10 25 some coveralls or something, that was one of the



1 stories.

2 Q Anything else?

3 A I think this was already when we had moved out  
4 that I heard about the coveralls.

02:10 5 Q And I think you moved out in the fall of 1969; is  
6 that right?

7 A Yeah.

8 Q And what do you remember about hearing about  
9 coveralls?

02:10 10 A One of the kids had found some coveralls, that was  
11 one of the stories I heard, at Cadrains'.

12 Q And was there anything on the coveralls?

13 A Oh, I don't know, they might have said there was  
14 blood on the coveralls or something. I'm not  
02:10 15 sure.

16 Q Were you aware at the time that Albert Cadrain,  
17 also known as Shorty Cadrain, was a witness in the  
18 proceedings, was involved in the investigation?

19 A I don't know when exactly, but I was -- I did.

02:10 20 Q Do you remember whether Larry Fisher had any  
21 discussions with you or with the Cadrains or  
22 anybody at this time about the murder and the  
23 investigation?

24 A He would have been there when I was discussing it  
02:11 25 except for when he was at work.



1 Q So would there have been occasions where you  
2 talked to either the Cadraings or Pat or to friends  
3 about the Gail Miller murder and about David  
4 Milgaard being the suspect or being charged,  
02:11 5 things of that nature?

6 A I don't know about the Cadraings, but I talked to  
7 Pat about it and Pat kind of hung around with the  
8 Cadraings.

9 Q And do you remember, would Larry have been  
02:11 10 present, Larry Fisher have been present when you  
11 discussed the Gail Miller murder and the David  
12 Milgaard prosecution?

13 A Probably, yes.

14 Q And do you have any recollection of what he would  
02:11 15 have said or whether he showed any interest in  
16 those discussions?

17 A I don't remember, no.

18 Q There's some mention later in the materials about  
19 coveralls and you had mentioned that as well. Do  
02:12 20 you have any recollection of Larry Fisher having  
21 coveralls?

22 A Yes.

23 Q And what did he use those for?

24 A Hunting.

02:12 25 Q And do you have any recollection of those -- of





1 finding coveralls or anything of that nature?

2 A Of me finding coveralls?

3 Q Yes.

4 A No.

02:12 5 Q Did you ever observe Larry Fisher washing any of  
6 his clothes?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And on how many occasions?

9 A Well, only one that I remember.

02:12 10 Q And tell us what you remember?

11 A Well, I asked him what he was washing and he said  
12 his hunting outfit.

13 Q And his hunting outfit was what?

14 A Coveralls.

02:12 15 Q And do you remember when that was?

16 A No.

17 Q Was it while you were living at the Cadrain house?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And do you have any recollection -- or did you  
02:12 20 observe anything on the coveralls?

21 A No.

22 Q Was it unusual for Larry Fisher to be doing his  
23 own laundry?

24 A Yes.

02:12 25 Q And had you washed his coveralls on other



1 occasions?

2 A I don't remember.

3 Q I understand then, I think we went through, that  
4 would you have moved out of the Cadrain house in  
02:13 5 the latter part of 1969; is that right, and moved  
6 to Avenue D North?

7 A I think so.

8 Q And do you remember why you moved or how that came  
9 about?

02:13 10 A No.

11 Q And I think you said that you then moved to Avenue  
12 D North; is that right?

13 A Yes.

14 Q And I mentioned the name earlier, as the land  
02:13 15 lady, Antonio Kinar. Does that name sound  
16 familiar?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And was she your land lady?

19 A Yes.

02:13 20 Q And do you recall an incident or hearing about an  
21 incident between Larry Fisher and the land lady?

22 A Yes.

23 Q And tell us what you remember.

24 A I remember he was supposed to have beat her up and  
02:14 25 I remember she was looking in our house when we



1           weren't home, the neighbours had said that she was  
2           in there and I was upset about it. I think Larry  
3           was too.

4           Q       And then did something happen?

02:14 5           A       Well, then he had assaulted her and --

6           Q       When you say he had assaulted her, did you see  
7           that?

8           A       No, no. He was accused of assaulting her.

9           Q       Okay. And did he get charged do you know?

02:14 10          A       Well, there was a hearing about it, but --

11          Q       I'll call up 058026, please, and this is a legal  
12          account dated May 29th, 1970 and it's addressed to  
13          Larry Fisher, and as I said, May 29th, and at this  
14          time you had moved from Avenue D to Adelaide  
02:15 15          Street; is that right?

16          A       Yes.

17          Q       And did you move out of Avenue D because of the  
18          dispute with the land lady?

19          A       I don't remember.

02:15 20          Q       And I think this legal account, did you give this  
21          to the RCMP at some point in the 1990s do you  
22          remember?

23          A       Not -- yes.

24          Q       And did you find this in your records somewhere?

02:15 25          A       Yes.



1 Q And this suggests that there was an attendance  
2 before his Honour Judge King on May 13th, 1970 and  
3 an attendance with Mrs. Fisher and Mr. and Mrs.  
4 Pambrun; is that -- do you think this relates to  
02:15 5 the charge of assault with the landlady?

6 A Yes.

7 Q And do you remember Larry Fisher getting a lawyer  
8 at this time?

9 A Yeah, I think so.

02:15 10 Q Do you remember the name of the lawyer?

11 A No.

12 Q And do you remember going to Court or going to  
13 meet with the lawyer with Larry?

14 A I remember I talked to somebody about that.

02:16 15 Q Okay. And was that Cliff and Anita Pambrun who  
16 were also --

17 A Yeah, I remember Anita, me and Anita for sure  
18 went.

19 Q Went to Court?

02:16 20 A Yes, or to a hearing, I don't know whether it was  
21 Court or a hearing.

22 Q And what do you remember happening at the hearing?

23 A Umm, well, they didn't figure it could have  
24 happened because the lady said she was beat for 15  
02:16 25 minutes and threw water on Larry, and Larry didn't



1           have no water on his clothes that we seen, and he  
2           was only gone for about 15 minutes, so --

3           Q       And were you going to be a witness, then, in these  
4           proceedings; do you remember?

02:16 5           A       I think we had to, we had to say what we thought,  
6           yeah.

7           Q       Do you recall whether the charge or the  
8           allegations against Larry Fisher for this incident  
9           had any allegation of sexual assault?

02:17 10          A       No, I don't think it did.

11          Q       And I think you told us your recollection is that  
12          the charge was -- did not proceed; is that right?

13          A       Yes.

14          Q       Now I understand that at some point in 1970 Larry  
02:17 15          Fisher went to Winnipeg for work reasons; is that  
16          right?

17          A       Yes.

18          Q       And how did that come about?

19          A       I guess that's where the job was going.

02:17 20          Q       And do you remember when he left for Winnipeg?

21          A       Well I remember him being in Winnipeg, I don't  
22          remember when he left, nope.

23          Q       And I understand from some documents that you had  
24          travelled and visited with him in September of  
02:17 25          1970 before he was arrested; is that right?



1 A On, yeah, I did visit before he was arrested.

2 Q And then tell us what you remember about when and  
3 how you heard about his arrest in Winnipeg?

4 A Umm, well I was there, I was there and we had, me  
02:18 5 and Clifford and one of the other guys had come  
6 home, and Clifford and them had went back and they  
7 said that Larry was picked up for something and --  
8 but they didn't know what, so the first I heard of  
9 it he was supposed to have been -- a cop, he was  
02:18 10 supposed to have hit a cop.

11 Q And where did you hear that from?

12 A Now I'm not sure whether it was from Clifford and  
13 Roy or what he had told --

14 Q Okay. If we could call up --

02:18 15 A It --

16 Q I'm sorry?

17 A He might have told somebody that.

18 Q Okay. So your first recollection is that Larry  
19 Fisher was picked up by the police for hitting a  
02:19 20 police officer?

21 A Yes.

22 Q If we could call up 020186. And I believe, Mrs.  
23 Fisher, this is a letter from Larry to you; is  
24 that right? Do you recognize that writing?

02:19 25 A Yes.



1 Q And just to assist with the dates, unfortunately  
2 there's not a date on the document, but if we just  
3 go down to this paragraph it says:

4 "You don't have to bother coming down  
02:19 5 because I go to Court on Wed. 14th and  
6 the police think I might get out on a 2  
7 or 3 year bond."

8 And Wednesday the 14th, October 1970 the 14th is  
9 a Wednesday, and so it would appear that this  
02:19 10 letter would have been written prior to October  
11 14th. And with that in mind if I could just go  
12 back up, just go through parts of it, it's a  
13 little bit -- it says:

14 "... I got your letter ...",  
02:20 15 something:

16 "... morning, I'm sure glad to hear from  
17 you."

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thursday.

19 BY MR. HODSON:

02:20 20 Q I'm sorry:

21 "... thursday morning ... sure glad to  
22 hear from you."

23 And then if we could go down to -- no, go back up  
24 to the top, it starts here:

02:20 25 "After work Jack and I went home and



1 changed then we went ...",

2 I can't really read that for:

3 "... beer ... we picked his wife up at  
4 10:30 and then we went to Ken's and had  
02:20 5 a beer and some whiskey so at 11:30 we  
6 went and got some chicken and went over  
7 to Jack's and ate it and drank some more  
8 ...",

9 And then:

10 "... left there at 12 o'clock to go home  
11 when the cops stopped me ...",

12 Or:

13 "... stopped one ... and that's when I  
14 ended up slugging him. (he pulled my  
02:20 15 hair where I got those stitches)"

16 Do you remember getting this letter from Larry  
17 Fisher; does that refresh your memory?

18 A Yeah, I remember.

19 Q And it appears from this that at least at the date  
02:21 20 of this, which I think would be before October  
21 14th, 1970, he had told you, at least in this  
22 letter, that he had been picked up for slugging --  
23 slugging a police officer; is that right?

24 A Yes.

02:21 25 Q So is it possible that this is where you learned





1           about -- for the first time what he was in for or  
2           do you think it was from Clifford or Roy?

3       A       I'm not sure.

4       Q       And would it have been shortly after that he was  
02:21 5       arrested that you would have heard he was in jail;  
6       is that fair?

7       A       I heard pretty soon that he was in jail, yes.

8       Q       And, I'm sorry, that was from Clifford I think you  
9       said?

02:21 10      A       Yeah.

11      Q       And when we talk about 'Clifford' that's your  
12      Uncle Cliff Pambrun?

13      A       Yes.

14      Q       And was he working in Winnipeg with Larry at the  
02:22 15      time?

16      A       Yes.

17      Q       And the weekend of the rape, the September the  
18      19th, I think that was the weekend right after you  
19      were there to visit him; is that right?

02:22 20      A       Yes.

21      Q       And did Clifford return home with you to  
22      Saskatoon?

23      A       I think so, yes.

24      Q       And then did he go back on the Monday to go back  
02:22 25      to work?



1 A Yes.

2 Q And then would it be shortly around that time,  
3 then, that you would have heard from Clifford  
4 about Mr. Fisher's arrest?

02:22 5 A Yes.

6 Q And did that surprise you when you heard that he  
7 was in jail?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And why was that?

02:22 10 A Well, I didn't know what happened, I didn't know  
11 what was goin' on.

12 Q And did you at some point, then, become aware that  
13 he was charged with rapes --

14 A Yes.

02:22 15 Q -- in Winnipeg?

16 A Yes.

17 Q And when and how did that happen?

18 A Umm, I don't know, it was a couple weeks later. I  
19 think the first I heard of it was the police had  
02:23 20 come and picked up some boots and stuff from the  
21 house in Winnipeg, --

22 Q Yes.

23 A -- and now I don't know if that's when they had  
24 told the boys that Larry was charged with rape, or  
02:23 25 whether we heard it a little later than that.



1 Q Okay. So you say 'the boys', --

2 A Clifford and --

3 Q -- was Larry living with some people in Winnipeg?

4 A Yes.

02:23 5 Q And was it, Clifford one of them, or --

6 A Clifford and Roy I think were both out there. I'm  
7 not sure, actually.

8 Q And so you told us the police went there to pick  
9 up some clothing or boots or something?

02:23 10 A Yeah.

11 Q Okay. And do you think, at that point, Clifford  
12 and Roy became aware of what the charges were?

13 A I think so.

14 Q And did they tell you?

02:23 15 A I think so, yes.

16 Q And, again, did that surprise you?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And why is that?

19 A Well, I didn't really believe them because -- I  
02:23 20 don't know, I don't know what I thought.

21 Q And then did you have some further discussions,  
22 then, with Mr. Fisher about these charges?

23 A Well that's probably when I got the letter, around  
24 that time.

02:24 25 Q Okay. That, I think that letter that I showed you



1 talks about slugging a police officer, it doesn't  
2 say anything about rapes and --

3 A Yeah, oh yeah, okay. Oh, I don't know when, I  
4 don't know when I would have.

02:24 5 Q Okay. So did you go back out and see him in  
6 Winnipeg in jail?

7 A I did go once, yes.

8 Q Okay. And I've got a letter I'll show you a bit  
9 later that --

02:24 10 A Oh, I think that might have been when I heard  
11 about the rapes, because I don't know if, for sure  
12 if they told Clifford and them about the rape or  
13 --

14 Q Okay.

02:24 15 A -- whether I got it from Larry.

16 Q If I could call up -- so you only went out to  
17 visit him once --

18 A Yes.

19 Q -- in Winnipeg in jail?

02:24 20 A Yes.

21 Q If I could call up 020175, and this is a letter  
22 Friday, March the 5th, which I think is 1971, and  
23 that's in Larry's handwriting; is it?

24 A Yes.

02:25 25 Q And, if we could just call out the first



1 paragraph, it says:

2 "Well as you could very well see from  
3 Friday that I miss you both very much.  
4 It was sure ...",

02:25 5 I can't read that:

6 "... and you sure did feel nice. Bye  
7 the way ..."

8 I take it from this that you had been up to visit  
9 him prior to this letter. And it says:

02:25 10 "Linda after our visit on Friday ...",  
11 does that sound right?

12 A Yeah.

13 Q So if -- in early March of 1971, does that sound  
14 right, as to when you would have gone to visit him  
02:25 15 in jail in Winnipeg?

16 A Probably, yes.

17 Q And just so we're clear, there was only one  
18 occasion where you went to see him in jail in  
19 Winnipeg, is that right?

02:25 20 A Yes.

21 Q So now tell us when, when in relation to that  
22 visit do you think you learned about the fact that  
23 he was being charged for rape?

24 A Either then or from Roy and Clifford. Now I, I'm  
02:25 25 not even sure, I can't really say.



1 Q Okay. So you may have heard, back in September or  
2 October of 1970, about the rapes; is that right?

3 A Well Clifford and them might have said, said  
4 something, but I don't know if I believed them  
02:26 5 until I talked to Larry. I'm not sure.

6 Q Okay. So in March of 1971 you would have gone to  
7 see Larry in prison; is that right?

8 A Yeah.

9 Q And did you talk to him about the rapes?

02:26 10 A I can't remember.

11 Q Okay. We'll go, I'll go through that a bit later,  
12 but do you have a recollection of confronting him  
13 about the rapes, or asking him to explain himself,  
14 or anything of that nature?

02:26 15 A Not when I was up there, no.

16 Q And so tell us as best you can, then, about  
17 when -- about how long after he was in jail before  
18 you realized that it was for rapes, does -- are  
19 you able to tell us that, was it weeks, months?

02:26 20 A Well now I don't even know.

21 Q Okay. So I take it at some point, and at least by  
22 March of 1971 by that letter -- and I'll come back  
23 to that -- by that time is it fair to say that you  
24 would have been aware that he was charged with  
02:27 25 some rapes in Winnipeg?



1 A I think so, probably, yes.

2 Q And did you become aware that he had been charged  
3 for some rapes in Saskatoon?

4 A I don't know when I became aware of the Saskatoon  
02:27 5 charges. I think he probably let me know there  
6 was Saskatoon charges.

7 Q Okay. And did you find out the details about any  
8 of these rapes at the time either from Larry  
9 Fisher, from Clifford or Roy, or from the police?

02:27 10 A No. I found out the details in a letter from  
11 Larry, and so maybe I already knew it was rape  
12 when I visited Larry, and maybe I did ask him what  
13 happened. It seems --

14 Q Okay.

02:27 15 A It seems to me, it seems to me I did get a letter  
16 from him that said that, --

17 Q Okay.

18 A -- "well what did you do", you know, I had asked  
19 him what he did when I went to Winnipeg, so maybe  
02:28 20 I did already know about the rape.

21 Q If we could go back to 020175, and this again is  
22 the March 5th letter, and if we could just call  
23 out the top part, please, and it says:

24 "Bye the way thanks for not asking how  
02:28 25 or why I did it. (Why) I cannot tell



1                   you because I don't know myself. (How)

2                   ...",

3                   and then I think it says something:

4                   "... answer this letter and let me know

02:28 5                   if you do really want to know and I will

6                   write and explain them to you."

7                   And then if we can go to the next page, please,

8                   and then the next page. I think that note is

9                   just on the back. And then he says:

02:29 10                   "Well to hell with that. I think I'd

11                   better tell you everything. I don't

12                   think I could tell you it to your face

13                   because I feel to ashamed of myself and

14                   I think I would probably start bawling

02:29 15                   again. Linda I want you to answer this

16                   right away and please tell me what you

17                   think and if you can wait.

18                   I don't know how to start so I

19                   guess this is as good as way as any.

02:29 20                   Remember I told you I was on acid the

21                   first two times it happened well it is

22                   true but don't ask who I got it from

23                   because I won't tell you. It not that I

24                   don't want to but it just might get him

02:29 25                   into trouble also. Now to tell you what





1 I couldn't tell you to your face. I'll  
2 start with all the charges one at a  
3 time"

4 And then if -- I'll pause there, and he goes  
02:29 5 through the charges, and I'll go through those in  
6 a moment. Is -- does this assist your memory at  
7 all?

8 A Yeah, I think I did, I probably did ask him, so I  
9 must have knew when I went to Winnipeg already.

02:30 10 Q And there is a reference in one of the letters  
11 where he makes a reference to you telling him  
12 about what the details of the rape are; do you  
13 remember that?

14 A That must have been when we -- I did go see him I  
02:30 15 asked him, "well what did you do, how did you do  
16 it, did you just grab a girl on the street or what  
17 did you do", I told him.

18 Q Okay.

19 A And so I must have said that. That must have been  
02:30 20 in Winnipeg then.

21 Q Okay. And then if we could go down, scroll down,  
22 please. Just on the acid, do you remember or do  
23 you know who that may have been that he may have  
24 been taking acid with?

02:30 25 A No I don't.



1 Q Did you know that he was taking acid?

2 A No.

3 Q And then the first he says:

4 "I took a pill of acid and I was pretty  
02:30 5 high and I couldn't control myself I  
6 can't explain it but it had some kind of  
7 effect on my mind. My head was aching  
8 about 1/2 - 3/4 of an hour after I took  
9 the pill and it went on like that for a  
02:31 10 long time but I just couldn't bring  
11 myself around to telling you for fear  
12 that I might loose you. I don't know  
13 how fast after I dropped the pill I  
14 remembered everything that I did clearly  
02:31 15 and this is what 1/2 of my dreams are  
16 about at night. I went down to the bar  
17 that night and you were in N.B. ...",

18 which I presume is North Battleford:

19 "... and I took the pill before I went  
02:31 20 downtown I wasn't cheating on you  
21 either. I was in the Baldwin and had a  
22 few beer and that is when I started to  
23 get the pain in my head but after that I  
24 couldn't control my self and then I got  
02:31 25 on the bus but I don't know what for and



1                   then I got off the bus and at the same  
2                   time a girl got off and that when it all  
3                   happened. I grabbed her just like you  
4                   told me in the visiting room and then  
02:32 5                   you should be able to figure it out from  
6                   there."

7                   Now that comment there:

8                   "... just like you told me in the  
9                   visiting room ...",

02:32 10                  do you know what that --

11           A           Well that's when I told him, "well what did you  
12                   do, did you just grab a girl and --"

13           Q           Okay. So, again, does this assist, Mrs. Fisher,  
14                   in determining when -- prior to this visit and  
02:32 15                   this letter are you able to tell us when, how much  
16                   prior to that you would have heard about the fact  
17                   that it was rapes and not hitting a police officer  
18                   that he was in jail for?

19           A           Well, I don't know. Oh I think I heard from  
02:32 20                   Clifford or Roy that, when they came to get the  
21                   evidence, that it might have been rape. That  
22                   might have been when I heard, heard that it was  
23                   rape, and then I don't know when exactly he would  
24                   have told me but I must have confronted him in the  
02:32 25                   visiting room about the --



1 Q Right?

2 A What he did.

3 Q And would there have been other communications  
4 between you and Mr. Fisher, then, --

02:33 5 A Oh yes.

6 Q -- prior to this letter?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And by letter, by phone, or --

9 A By letter.

02:33 10 Q Now these letters I think you turned over to the  
11 police or to Mrs. Milgaard at some point, or both,  
12 in the early 1990s; do you think there were other  
13 letters back and forth that you were not able to  
14 find?

02:33 15 A Oh yeah. I only, I only gave them the ones that I  
16 thought were important.

17 Q Okay. And I believe, Mr. Commissioner, I think  
18 that the other letters were given to the RCMP or  
19 had been reviewed at some point by someone; is  
20 that right?

21 A Not all of them.

22 Q Okay.

23 A Just the ones that I thought were --

24 Q Okay.

02:33 25 A Said something about the Miller.



1 Q Right?

2 A So the, for the stuff like that, I might not even  
3 have --

4 Q Okay. So, again, let's just go back. So  
02:33 5 September 19th, 1970 he is arrested, and sometime  
6 before October 14th you get a letter where he  
7 tells you that he slugged a police officer, and  
8 that sometime in there you hear from Clifford and  
9 Roy that the police were at their house in  
02:34 10 Winnipeg to pick up some clothing and that it's a  
11 rape charge; is that correct?

12 A That, yeah, that --

13 Q And I think you --

14 A That --

02:34 15 Q Sorry?

16 A That would probably be more --

17 Q And I think you said at the time when you first  
18 heard it, did you believe it, or did you --

19 A I probably didn't. I probably kind of doubted it  
02:34 20 until Larry told me.

21 Q And so then from about October 1970 until March of  
22 1971 is it possible that you would have had  
23 further discussions with Larry Fisher or gained  
24 further information about the charges?

02:34 25 A Yes.



1 Q And so the charge I just read he talks about  
2 getting off the bus at the Baldwin; is the Baldwin  
3 a hotel in Saskatoon?

4 A Yes.

02:34 5 Q And so would it be fair to say at this point, at  
6 least the first one that he described, he would  
7 have -- you would have been aware that it was a  
8 rape in Saskatoon?

9 A Yes.

02:35 10 Q And then he says:

11 "The others were all the same except for  
12 one which I slapped her and took \$15  
13 from her and that's the Robbery with  
14 violence charge that I got against me".

02:35 15 And then:

16 "(2) It happened the same way again  
17 except that it was just an assault  
18 charge. After this happened I wanted to  
19 tell you but with the trouble Cliff and  
02:35 20 I were getting into I didn't think you'd  
21 be able to take it so I didn't bother  
22 telling you."

23 Do you know what he might have been referring to  
24 about the trouble he and Cliff were getting into?

02:35 25 A Their running around.



1 Q "I was more afraid of losing you then and  
2 after you read this letter I'm pretty  
3 sure that I am going to loose you."

4 COMMISSIONER MacCALLUM: Just a second.

02:35 5 "The trouble Cliff and I were getting into", your  
6 answer was "they were running around", meaning  
7 what, please, Mrs. Fisher?

8 A With other women.

9 COMMISSIONER MacCALLUM: Okay. Thanks,  
02:35 10 Mr. Hodson.

11 BY MR. HODSON:

12 Q It says:

13 "... I am pretty sure that I am going to  
14 loose you. While I am writing you this  
02:36 15 I feel like I just want to die I'm  
16 serious."

17 Do you recall at this time, Mrs. Fisher, Larry  
18 Fisher talking about suicide and things of that  
19 nature?

02:36 20 A Well I was kind of scared, because of the letters  
21 he was writing, that he might think of something  
22 like that.

23 Q Okay. And in your mind at -- and you may have  
24 answered this earlier -- but at some point after  
02:36 25 he was arrested in Winnipeg did you, in your own



1 mind, make a decision about whether you would stay  
2 his spouse after he got out of jail?

3 A Yes, I -- I knew I couldn't trust him again, no.

4 Q Okay. And so, as far as you were concerned, the  
02:36 5 marriage would be over at some point; is that  
6 fair?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And did you tell him that?

9 A No.

02:36 10 Q And why not?

11 A Because I was scared he'd do something suicidal or  
12 something.

13 Q So you would have stayed in communication with  
14 him; is that correct?

02:36 15 A Yes.

16 Q And then:

17 "(3) It happened about a month after I  
18 came down here. It happened the same  
19 way to, but I wasn't on acid and I was  
02:37 20 pretty drunk and I was getting those  
21 pains in my head again. I'd better tell  
22 you that most of the time I get these  
23 pains in my head is when I drink but I  
24 get them when I don't drink also."

02:37 25 And scroll down:





1 "4) It happened the same way again. But  
2 that is when I took the \$15.00 from her.  
3 5) It happened the same way also and  
4 that is when I got caught and I'm glad I  
02:37 5 did. Now I finished and I'm sure glad I  
6 told you because this was the other  
7 reason for me not sleeping at night also  
8 I'm more afraid of losing you now more  
9 than I ever was before."

02:37 10 And so, again, would this have been the letter,  
11 then, when he told you about what happened?

12 A Yes.

13 Q And so at this time would you have been aware,  
14 generally, that there were rape charges in  
02:37 15 Winnipeg and rape charges in Saskatoon; is that  
16 fair?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And did you know whether or not a knife was used  
19 in some or all of those rapes, were you -- do you  
02:38 20 remember that, becoming aware of that?

21 A I don't know. I don't know when I became aware of  
22 that.

23 Q At some point in this time frame, Mrs. Fisher, did  
24 you start to suspect Larry Fisher as possibly  
02:38 25 being involved in the murder of Gail Miller?



1 A Yes.

2 Q When?

3 A Probably almost immediately.

02:38 4 Q Okay. And tell us what went through your mind and  
5 how you reached that conclusion?

6 A Well from the rapes and the everything else.

7 Q And so just for the time frame, and again I think  
8 he was arrested September of 1970, and from some  
9 point between September 1970 and March of '71 you  
02:39 10 became either aware or more aware of the  
11 charges -- or of the allegations; --

12 A Yes.

13 Q -- is that right?

14 A Uh-huh.

02:39 15 Q Yes?

16 A Yes.

17 Q And did you become aware that he'd confessed or  
18 had admitted the rapes?

19 A I don't -- I don't know.

02:39 20 Q He --

21 A I don't remember.

22 Q -- certainly did to you in the letter; is that  
23 fair?

24 A Oh, okay, yes.

02:39 25 Q Yeah. And so would it be sometime in that time



1 frame, then, when you thought to yourself that  
2 maybe he was involved in the Gail Miller murder?

3 A I know it was before he was sent to P.A., because  
4 as soon as he got to P.A. I asked him.

02:39 5 Q Okay. And I think the records show --

6 A Yes.

7 Q -- you are talking about the penitentiary in P.A.?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And I think he went there in July of 1971, or  
02:39 10 thereabouts, does that sound right? I think  
11 that's what the records show.

12 A Yes.

13 Q Okay. And so tell us about that?

14 A Well seeing -- well when I, when I first went up  
02:39 15 to visit him I asked him if he had anything to do  
16 with the murder of the nurse in Saskatoon, and he  
17 told me "no".

18 Q Okay. And so this would have been in Prince  
19 Albert; is that right?

02:40 20 A Yes.

21 Q When you went to see him in March of 1971 in  
22 Winnipeg did you ask him about, ask him about the  
23 Gail Miller murder at that time?

24 A No.

02:40 25 Q Did you have suspicions at that time, do you know,



1 or was it after that?

2 A I -- probably after that.

3 Q And so once you had suspicions, then, you -- did  
4 you decide to confront him then?

02:40 5 A Yes.

6 Q And why? Why did you do that?

7 A Because I just wanted to know.

8 Q And what did he say to you?

9 A "No".

02:40 10 Q This is probably a good place to break, Mr.  
11 Commissioner.

12 COMMISSIONER MacCALLUM: Yes it is.

13 Mr. Hodson, I forgot to mention  
14 something to counsel. Last week we had some  
02:41 15 witnesses who were terribly hard to hear, and we  
16 had some lawyers who were in a state of  
17 excitement, unfortunately they're not here today  
18 to hear what I have to say. But, at any rate,  
19 the reporters were having a very difficult time,  
02:41 20 I'm sorry that we didn't do something about it at  
21 the time, but from now on let's please all make  
22 an effort to restrain ourselves and our witnesses  
23 so that they can get it down. Thank you.

24 15 minutes, please.

02:41 25 (Adjourned at 2:41 p.m.)



(Reconvened at 3:05 p.m.)

BY MR. HODSON:

Q Mrs. Fisher, before the break we talked about -- I think you were telling us that you went to visit Larry Fisher in the Prince Albert Penitentiary after he was sent there from Winnipeg; is that right?

A Yes.

Q And I think the records show that he went there in, likely, July of 1971; does that sound right?

A Yes.

Q Do you recall hearing about or becoming aware that Mr. Fisher also had to deal with the Saskatoon charges in a Saskatchewan Court, that there was another Court appearance after Winnipeg, after he went to Prince Albert; do you remember anything about that?

A Yes, I --

Q And what do you remember?

A That he had other charges, I don't know where he had to deal or what, I don't know when I knew.

Q Okay. I'll show you some letters in a moment. Do you recall being visited by any Saskatoon City Police officers after Mr. Fisher was arrested in Winnipeg?



1 A Umm, they -- there was two detectives came to  
2 grandma's when I was at grandma's, I remember  
3 that, yes.

4 Q Okay. And that was on Avenue K; is that right?

03:06 5 A Yes.

6 Q Okay. And what do you remember about that?

7 A Just that they had talked about how vicious he was  
8 and if he was vicious with me.

9 Q Okay. Do you recall whether they talked about the  
03:06 10 Winnipeg rapes?

11 A Yes, I think.

12 Q What do you remember them saying?

13 A He had bit a girl.

14 Q Okay. And he -- were these Saskatoon Police  
03:07 15 officers?

16 A I don't know.

17 Q Okay. Did they identify themselves as police  
18 officers?

19 A I think so, yeah.

03:07 20 Q Were they in uniforms or in plainclothes; do you  
21 remember?

22 A Plainclothes.

23 Q And do you remember why they were talking to you?

24 A I don't really know why. It's just that they did  
03:07 25 mention what he had done to the girls in Winnipeg



1 and asked about our sex life.

2 Q Okay. And would this have been around the time  
3 after the -- after Mr. Fisher had been arrested in  
4 Winnipeg?

03:07 5 A I think he was in P.A. already.

6 Q Okay. And do you recall any discussions with the  
7 officers about any of the Saskatoon rapes?

8 A No.

9 Q And at the time these officers came to see you did  
03:08 10 you have suspicions, at that time, that Mr. Fisher  
11 may have been involved in the Gail Miller murder?

12 A If he was in P.A., yes.

13 Q Okay. And did you tell the officers about those  
14 suspicions?

03:08 15 A No.

16 Q Why not?

17 A I don't know, they -- I don't know why.

18 Q Okay. Is it -- okay. And at that time, when they  
19 were there, are you able to tell us whether you  
03:08 20 did or did not have suspicions about him being  
21 involved in the Gail Miller at the time they  
22 visited you?

23 A I don't know.

24 Q We're going to go -- or pardon me, if we could go  
03:08 25 to 155678, please. And this is an envelope of a



1 letter, it's addressed to -- if you will just call  
2 that out -- Mrs. Larry Fisher, 830 Avenue K North;  
3 is that where your grandmother lived at the time?

4 A Yes.

03:09 5 Q And do you know if that's Larry's writing?

6 A It looks like it, yes.

7 Q And if we just go to the top left of that document  
8 it's got a postmark in Winnipeg. And then if we  
9 could go to the next page, please. The next page  
03:09 10 in this document, this is a letter I think dated  
11 June -- or pardon me, Saturday -- or sorry,  
12 Thursday, June the 3rd; is that right?

13 A Something like that, yes.

14 Q And so at that time, June of 1971, you would have  
03:10 15 been living at your grandmother's house; is that  
16 right?

17 A Yes.

18 Q If we could just go back to 020185, please, and  
19 this is a letter from Larry to you of May 29th; is  
20 that right?

21 A Yes.

22 Q And just go through, this would be the day after  
23 he was convicted in Winnipeg, or in Fort Garry.  
24 It says:

03:10 25 "Hi. I suppose by now you have heard





1                   how my case turned out, well in case you  
2                   didn't I'll let you know.

3                   As you know yourself that there  
4                   were three charges, well heres how they  
03:10 5                   ended up two six and a half year terms  
6                   and a one year term which ends up to  
7                   fourteen so think over that question  
8                   about a divorce and let me know if you  
9                   want one or not."

03:10 10                  And then scroll down. And then he says:

11                   "Linda they just brought me out of the  
12                   whole and into segregation and I still  
13                   feel as if I want to spin out.

14                   I don't know what is going to  
03:11 15                   happen about the two charges back home,  
16                   but all I know is they're going to be  
17                   pretty stiff."

18                   So at that time is it fair to say you would have  
19                   known that he still had some Saskatoon charges;  
20                   is that right?

21           A           Yes, yeah.

22           Q           And then if we can go to 045229, please, and this  
23                   is a letter from Lawrence Greenberg who was acting  
24                   for Larry Fisher at the time. Do you remember  
03:11 25                   dealing with Mr. Greenberg or hearing about Mr.



1 Greenberg?

2 A No.

3 Q And it looks like this is a letter to Larry's  
4 mother, and that's Marcy Fisher; is that right?

03:11 5 A Yes.

6 Q And I believe this letter was given to the RCMP in  
7 the 1990s by you and it looks as though that  
8 Mrs. Fisher, Larry's mother, would have written  
9 the note to you; is that right?

03:12 10 A Yes.

11 Q It says:

12 "Linda when you finish this letter burn  
13 it. I guess Larry will do his time in  
14 PA. I just hope he doesn't get to many  
03:12 15 yrs for the Charges in Saskatoon did you  
16 hear from Larry. He hasn't wrote for a  
17 long time let me know for sure if you've  
18 heard anything. I just feel sick from  
19 this all."

03:12 20 So that would have been a note that Larry's  
21 mother had sent to you?

22 A Yes.

23 Q Do you remember hearing anything in the media,  
24 either in the news, television news or the radio  
03:12 25 or in the newspaper about Larry Fisher being



1 convicted in Winnipeg?

2 A I don't remember.

3 Q I'm just going to call up 159724, please, and this  
4 is an article in the *StarPhoenix* dated the day  
03:13 5 after Mr. Fisher was convicted and it talks about  
6 his sentence in Manitoba. Do you remember reading  
7 about that or hearing about that at the time?

8 A I don't remember.

9 Q No? What about in December of the same year,  
03:13 10 1971, did you become aware that Larry Fisher  
11 appeared in a court in Regina and was convicted of  
12 three rapes and an indecent assault?

13 A I don't recall, no.

14 Q Do you remember hearing anything about it at the  
03:13 15 time?

16 A Larry probably wrote and told me.

17 Q Okay. Now if we can go back to your visit to the  
18 Prince Albert penitentiary, and I think you said  
19 you went to ask him about the Gail Miller murder;  
03:13 20 is that right?

21 A Yes.

22 Q And at that time would you have been aware that  
23 David Milgaard had been convicted of the murder of  
24 Gail Miller?

03:14 25 A Yes.



1 Q And tell us what you thought about that? Let me  
2 phrase that a bit better. This would have been  
3 shortly after Mr. Milgaard had been convicted; is  
4 that right?

03:14 5 A Yes.

6 Q And did that give you any comfort, that Larry  
7 Fisher may not have been involved in the murder,  
8 or what if any influence did that have on your  
9 decision to go see him?

03:14 10 A None I don't think.

11 Q Did the fact that somebody had been convicted for  
12 the murder cause you to think that it must not be  
13 him?

14 A Yes.

03:14 15 Q But I take it you still had suspicions enough to  
16 go and see him?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And I think you told us that Mr. Fisher told you  
19 that he had not been involved in the murder of  
03:14 20 Gail Miller; is that right?

21 A Yes.

22 Q And did that satisfy your suspicions or concerns?

23 A Maybe a little bit.

24 Q After you saw him, did you still have some  
03:15 25 thoughts or suspicions that he may have been



1 involved in the Gail Miller murder?

2 A Probably, yes.

3 Q Pardon me?

4 A Yes.

03:15 5 Q Now, did you talk to other family members  
6 throughout the '70s, 1970s, about these concerns?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And just generally who would you have talked to  
9 and what would you have said?

03:15 10 A Pretty well all my family and friends.

11 Q And tell us again after you went and saw him in  
12 Prince Albert, what were your suspicions, what was  
13 bothering you?

14 A That my knife was missing and because of the rapes  
03:15 15 I think.

16 Q And what about your accusation that morning and  
17 his response, how did that figure into your  
18 thinking at the time?

19 A Well, that too, yeah.

03:16 20 Q And tell us, did his reaction to your accusation  
21 cause you some concern?

22 A Yes.

23 Q And tell us about that?

24 A Just that he was shocked and, I don't know, scared  
03:16 25 or something and --



1 Q And so you would have talked to family members?

2 A Yes.

3 Q And Cliff Pambrun?

4 A Yes.

03:16 5 Q Anita Pambrun?

6 A Yes.

7 Q Roy Pambrun?

8 A Yes.

9 Q The Poitras family members, Doris Poitras?

03:16 10 A Jim, yes.

11 Q Pardon me?

12 A Doris and Jim.

13 Q Anybody else that you can think of?

14 A Pat, Carol.

03:16 15 Q That would be Pat Van Aseldonk?

16 A Carol Klassen.

17 Q Carol Klassen?

18 A Yeah. I don't know. Lots.

03:17 19 Q And would you tell people that you suspected him  
20 of being the murderer of Gail Miller, was it that  
21 blunt?

22 A Yes.

23 Q And what kind of reaction did you get from these  
24 people?

03:17 25 A Well, they said they wouldn't convict somebody if



1           they didn't have some serious evidence.

2       Q       Okay. Did you think at that time about going to  
3           the police? Again let's talk 1971 and the years  
4           that followed.

03:17 5       A       No.

6       Q       And we know, and I'll get to this in a moment, in  
7           August of 1980 you went in to see the city police;  
8           is that correct?

9       A       Yes.

03:17 10      Q       Prior to that time had you considered -- again  
11           let's go the early and mid '70s. Had you  
12           considered going into the police?

13      A       To the late '70s?

14      Q       Yes.

03:17 15      A       Well, I might have considered it, but I had went  
16           to the *StarPhoenix* and I looked at the knife and I  
17           didn't recognize it.

18      Q       Okay. When did you do that?

19      A       I don't know. Probably the later '70s.

03:18 20      Q       And you went to the *StarPhoenix*?

21      A       Yes.

22      Q       And what did you look at?

23      A       The picture of the knife in the *StarPhoenix*.

24      Q       Okay. And do you recall seeing a picture of the  
03:18 25           knife?



1 A Yes.

2 Q And tell us then what you concluded after looking  
3 at that?

4 A I thought it was a steak knife. I didn't think it  
03:18 5 was mine.

6 Q And did any of the family members or people that  
7 you talked to encourage you to go to the police or  
8 not to go to the police?

9 A Well, actually they said -- most of the people  
03:18 10 said they thought that because they convicted  
11 David, that they probably had good evidence that  
12 he did it.

13 Q Did the fact that Mr. Milgaard had been convicted  
14 of the murder of Gail Miller influence your  
03:19 15 decision not to go to the authorities in the  
16 1970s?

17 A Some, yes.

18 Q If the Gail Miller murder had not been resolved,  
19 in other words, there had been no conviction of  
03:19 20 David Milgaard and it was an unsolved rape and  
21 murder in 1971, for example, when you went to  
22 confront Larry Fisher in the Prince Albert  
23 penitentiary, if at that time you would have known  
24 that the Gail Miller murder was unsolved, do you  
03:19 25 think you would have gone to the police with your





1                   suspicions about Larry Fisher?

2       A           Yes.

3       Q           And why do you say that?

4       A           Because I would have been more sure that it was  
03:19 5                   him.

6       Q           Okay. Can we take it from that, Mrs. Fisher, that  
7                   the fact that you didn't go in until 1980, would  
8                   the fact that Mr. Milgaard had been convicted, I  
9                   think you said, would have influenced you; is that  
03:20 10                  right?

11      A           Yes.

12      Q           Would it be a significant factor in your decision?

13      A           I think so, yeah.

14      Q           After you confronted Mr. Fisher in 1971, did you  
03:20 15                  ever talk to him again about the Gail Miller  
16                  murder?

17      A           No.

18      Q           Now, I understand that in the late '70s -- or that  
19                  Mr. Fisher was released on mandatory supervision  
03:20 20                  in January of 1980; is that correct, or  
21                  thereabouts?

22      A           Yes.

23      Q           And do you remember having a discussion with Mr.  
24                  Fisher prior to his release?

03:20 25      A           Yes.



1 Q And tell us about that discussion?

2 A He told me he hadn't gotten any treatment and that  
3 he thought that he could re-offend.

4 Q And where was he when you had this discussion?

03:20 5 A Probably in Prince Albert.

6 Q And can you give us some rough time frame, was it  
7 shortly before he was released or a year before?

8 A It might have been about '76 even. I'm not sure.  
9 '78.

03:21 10 Q And did you have -- and at that time would you  
11 still have had suspicions about his involvement in  
12 the Gail Miller murder?

13 A Yes.

14 Q Did you have any discussions with any prison  
03:21 15 officials prior to his release in January of 1980?

16 A Well, somebody came to the house and asked me what  
17 I thought about Larry getting out and I had said  
18 that he had told me that he got no treatment and  
19 that he probably would do it again.

03:21 20 Q And were you living in Saskatoon at the time?

21 A Yes.

22 Q And were you with Bryan Wright at the time?

23 A Yes.

24 Q And I think it was about '77, '78 that you were  
03:21 25 with Mr. Wright, starting in that time frame; is



1           that correct?

2       A       Yes.

3       Q       So it would be after '77 or '78; is that correct,  
4           the time frame?

03:22 5       A       Yes.

6       Q       And you say -- was it one or two people? Do you  
7           remember who came?

8       A       I think there was two people.

9       Q       And do you remember who they were there on behalf  
03:22 10          of?

11      A       No, I don't.

12      Q       Were they police officers?

13      A       I don't know. They weren't in police clothes.

14      Q       Do you recall if they were with Corrections Canada  
03:22 15          or parole officers or --

16      A       I don't know. They could have been.

17      Q       What was your understanding at the time as to who  
18           they were or how they were involved in the system,  
19           if I can call it that?

03:22 20      A       I didn't know.

21      Q       Okay. Now, in March of 1980, within a couple of  
22           months after Mr. Fisher was released on mandatory  
23           supervision, he was arrested for the attempted  
24           murder and rape of (V10) (V10)- in North  
03:23 25          Battleford. Did you become aware of that at the



1 time?

2 A I'm not sure when, but that year, yes.

3 Q And if I can just go back, sorry. When you had  
4 the discussion with the two people who were  
03:23 5 talking about -- they were asking you questions  
6 about Larry being released from prison; is that  
7 right?

8 A Yes.

9 Q Did you tell those people about your suspicions  
03:23 10 that he may have been involved or that he was  
11 involved in the Gail Miller murder?

12 A No.

13 Q Why not?

14 A I don't know.

03:23 15 Q And I think you said you did become aware that Mr.  
16 Fisher was arrested shortly after he was released;  
17 is that correct?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And did you have any discussions with any police  
03:23 20 officers in connection with the (V10) (V10)-  
21 matter?

22 A No.

23 Q With the prosecutor in that case?

24 A No.

03:23 25 Q With any defence counsel or anybody on behalf of



1 Larry Fisher?

2 A No.

3 Q Did you ever talk to Larry Fisher about it?

4 A No.

03:24 5 Q Now, I understand in August of 1980 you went into  
6 the Saskatoon City Police station; is that  
7 correct?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And we have a statement that I'll show you in a  
03:24 10 moment dated August 28th, and does that sound like  
11 the right date?

12 A I think so, yes.

13 Q Tell us what prompted you to go in?

14 A I think it was probably Larry getting charged,  
03:24 15 David escaping, a flier.

16 Q When you say David, you are referring to David  
17 Milgaard?

18 A Milgaard.

19 Q Had you been aware, when you went into the  
03:24 20 Saskatoon City Police, or what was your  
21 understanding of the position that David Milgaard  
22 was taking with respect to his conviction for the  
23 murder of Gail Miller?

24 A That he was still innocent.

03:24 25 Q Okay. And you said something about a flier. What



1 do you remember about that?

2 A Mrs. Milgaard had put out a flier saying that  
3 David was saying he was innocent.

4 Q Okay. Had you thought about going into the police  
03:25 5 prior to August 28th, 1990?

6 A I probably -- probably after the lady was  
7 assaulted in Battleford I thought about it.

8 Q Okay. And at the time you were in a relationship  
9 with Bryan Wright; is that correct?

03:25 10 A Yes.

11 Q And he was your common-law spouse; is that a fair  
12 description?

13 A Yes.

14 Q And did you talk to Mr. Wright about this?

03:25 15 A Yes.

16 Q And did you confide in him about what you thought  
17 about your suspicions about Mr. Fisher?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And did Mr. Wright have a view that he expressed  
03:25 20 to you about whether you should go to the police?

21 A He said if I thought -- if I thought there was  
22 anything, I should go.

23 Q Now, at the time that you went in to the city  
24 police in 1980, I take it you were aware that Mr.  
03:26 25 Milgaard had been convicted?



1 A Yes.

2 Q And you were aware that he was saying that he was  
3 innocent; is that fair?

4 A Yes.

03:26 5 Q Now, do you recall -- do you recall going into the  
6 police station, do you have a memory of that  
7 today, of going in?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And I'll go through the statement with you in a  
03:26 10 moment. Do you remember, did you have any alcohol  
11 before you went in?

12 A Yes.

13 Q And do you remember how many or --

14 A I don't know. Probably about six beer.

03:26 15 Q And the statement indicates that you went in at  
16 four -- or the statement was given at 4:30 in the  
17 morning. Does that sound right or do you remember  
18 what time you went in?

19 A I don't know, it would probably -- I think we  
03:26 20 waited a while, so probably -- I don't know,  
21 around 2:30, three.

22 Q So you waited a while at the police station; is  
23 that right?

24 A Uh-huh.

03:27 25 Q And do you remember how long you had been drinking



1 before you went in?

2 A Probably from about -- I'm not sure. I don't  
3 know, about eight or something.

4 Q And were you nervous about going into the police  
03:27 5 station?

6 A Yes.

7 Q And when you went into the police station,  
8 Mrs. Fisher, did you consider yourself to be drunk  
9 or under the influence or did you feel okay,  
03:27 10 yourself?

11 A I didn't consider myself drunk.

12 Q Okay. If I could call up 159712, please. Let me  
13 just ask, at the time you went into the police  
14 station, did you think that -- and I think you  
03:27 15 said it was beer that you had before you went in?

16 A Yes.

17 Q Did you think that your consumption of beer  
18 influenced your recollection of events at all?

19 A No.

03:28 20 Q If we could call up -- this is a newspaper  
21 article, it's actually dated August 28th, 1990  
22 (sic) from the *StarPhoenix* --

23 MR. ELSON: '80.

24 BY MR. HODSON:

03:28 25 Q Sorry. That's about the sixth time. 1980. And





1 this is the date that your statement is dated.

2 Now, I believe this newspaper may have been  
3 published sort of later in the day that you went  
4 in, I think you went in at 4:30 a.m. on the 28th,  
03:28 5 I think at the time the *StarPhoenix* was  
6 distributed in the afternoon, but in any event, it  
7 talks about:

8 "Members of the Saskatoon police force  
9 have been issued photographs of  
03:28 10 convicted murderer David Milgaard, 36,  
11 of Langenburg, who escaped while on  
12 leave from Stony Mountain penitentiary  
13 Friday."

14 And I think the date of that was August 22nd, and  
03:29 15 I know that there are other news reports around  
16 and prior to this time, Mrs. Fisher, talking  
17 about David Milgaard's escape, and I think you  
18 told us, but do you have a recollection, prior to  
19 going into the police on the morning of August  
03:29 20 28th, 1980 of hearing about the fact that David  
21 Milgaard had escaped?

22 A I think so, yes.

23 Q And did that influence your decision to go in at  
24 that time?

03:29 25 A Probably, yes.



1 Q And in what way?

2 A Well, he was still escaping and saying he was  
3 innocent.

4 Q Okay. So that -- and I take it this was, like,  
03:29 5 six days, five or six days before you went in, so  
6 is it fair to say that would have been a factor in  
7 your decision to go in?

8 A Yes.

9 Q Next if we could call up 159706, and this is a  
03:29 10 document, there's no date on it, but it talks  
11 about a reward, it says:

12 "A total \$10,000 reward is offered to  
13 any person or persons, able to provide  
14 information that will exonerate David  
03:30 15 Milgaard, convicted on circumstantial  
16 evidence, of the murder of Gail Miller,  
17 in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, on January  
18 31st, 1969.

19 David has spent over 11 years  
03:30 20 in prison, where he presently remains.  
21 His family, who pledge this money,  
22 believe David is innocent and that  
23 justice must prevail! If you know  
24 anything, it may help. Please write or  
03:30 25 send your name and phone number to us."



1 And then there's an address. You had talked  
2 before that you had heard about a flier or  
3 reward. Is this the flier?

4 A Yes.

03:30 5 Q Is it similar to the flier you received?

6 A Yes.

7 Q And was it delivered to your house or do you  
8 remember how you received it?

9 A I think so.

03:30 10 Q And the fact that there was a reward, Mrs. Fisher,  
11 was that an influence, did that influence your  
12 decision to go in?

13 A Probably some, yeah.

14 Q And the fact that the Milgaard family was saying  
03:30 15 that David Milgaard was professing his innocence  
16 and looking for information, would that have  
17 influenced your decision to go in?

18 A Yes.

19 Q Now, this talks about contacting a box number in  
03:31 20 Manitoba. Did you ever contact --

21 A No, I went to the police.

22 Q And why did you decide to go to the police rather  
23 than contact?

24 A Because if there was anything to my suspicion, I  
03:31 25 figured the police would deal with it.



1 Q So let's go back to August 28th, 1980, and I'll go  
2 through your statement, but generally tell us how  
3 you were treated by the police officers? Was  
4 there more than one who you dealt with?

03:31 5 A Yes.

6 Q And how were you treated by the officers?

7 A In 1980?

8 Q Yes.

9 A Good.

03:31 10 Q And did Bryan Wright go in with you or did you go  
11 in alone?

12 A He came in with me, but I gave my statement alone.

13 Q And do you remember what you would have said to  
14 the police when you went in?

03:32 15 A I have some information.

16 Q And about -- did you tell them about what crime or  
17 the names?

18 A Yes, yes.

19 Q And would you have said the Gail Miller murder?

03:32 20 A Yes.

21 Q Would you have mentioned David Milgaard do you  
22 think?

23 A Yes, I think so.

24 Q How long do you think you spent at the police  
03:32 25 station; do you recall?



1 A About two hours.

2 Q I'll call up 025417 and this is a copy of the  
3 handwritten statement. Linda, is this your  
4 signature in the bottom right-hand corner?

03:32 5 A Yes.

6 Q And we've heard evidence from an Inspector Ken  
7 Wagner. Do you remember Inspector Wagner?

8 A No.

9 Q I believe he was the officer who took down the  
03:33 10 statement. Do you remember one officer taking the  
11 statement?

12 A Yes.

13 Q And tell us as best you can, did you tell your  
14 story and then did he ask questions or how did the  
03:33 15 interview go?

16 A I think I told my story and he wrote it down.

17 Q And did you think that he took you seriously, did  
18 you form any impression at the time?

19 A Yes.

03:33 20 Q If we can go to the third page, and again that's  
21 your signature at the bottom right?

22 A Yes.

23 Q If we could then call up 103521, please, and this  
24 is simply a handwritten -- pardon me, a typed  
03:34 25 version of the August 28th, 1980 statement, and



1 I'll go through this with you. Go to the first --  
2 that would have been your address and date of  
3 birth at the time; is that correct?

4 A Yes.

03:34 5 Q And 4:30 in the morning, that sounds right does  
6 it?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And then it goes and gives some details here, the  
9 date of your marriage, and I think you later  
03:34 10 corrected that, is that right, it was December  
11 16th?

12 A Yes.

13 Q '67?

14 A Yes.

03:34 15 Q Actually, if we can go back to the written  
16 statement, the handwritten statement says 1967,  
17 December 14th, so I think -- was it December 16th  
18 was the --

19 A Yes.

03:34 20 Q And then you went on to describe living at 329  
21 Avenue O South and then go on to talk about the  
22 Cadrain family, and I think you later corrected  
23 that to 324; is that right? Do you remember that?

24 A Yeah.

03:35 25 Q You told the police, though, that at the time of



1 the murder you lived in a house occupied by the  
2 Cadraains?

3 A Yes.

4 Q On Avenue O?

03:35 5 A Yes.

6 Q And then you say here:

7 "David Milgaard was convicted of that  
8 murder and was to have come to our house  
9 that morning. He apparently knew the  
03:35 10 Cadrain family who lived upstairs in  
11 that house. We lived in the basement  
12 suite."

13 And how is it that you knew that?

14 A Probably from Pat.

03:35 15 Q And that was Pat Van Aseldonk?

16 A Yeah.

17 Q And was that what you told us a bit earlier today,  
18 about talk in the neighbourhood?

19 A Yeah.

03:35 20 Q Back in '69?

21 A Yes.

22 Q So you would have known -- you didn't have  
23 personal knowledge that he was there I take it?

24 A No.

03:36 25 Q But you knew from others that he was supposedly



1                   there the morning of the murder?

2           A           Yes.

3           Q           Is that fair?

4           A           Yeah.

03:36 5           Q           And then you say:

6                   "The police have never talked to me  
7                   about this murder."

8           And you had told us earlier today, Mrs. Fisher,  
9           that you had talked to the police?

03:36 10          A           Yeah. I probably forgot.

11          Q           Okay. So if we could just scroll down, it says:

12                   "I divorced Larry two years ago while he  
13                   was serving time for rape. He has been  
14                   involved in several cases of rape. The  
03:36 15                   last time was last March in North  
16                   Battleford when he slashed a 56 year old  
17                   woman and raped her while he was out of  
18                   prison on parole. I think he is back in  
19                   jail now."

03:36 20          And I think you told us earlier this incident  
21                   with (V10) (V10)- in North Battleford, would that  
22                   have been a factor that influenced you to go into  
23                   the police?

24          A           Yes.

03:36 25          Q           And then it says:





1 "Something has been bothering (me) about  
2 the murder ever since it happened."

3 If I can pause there. Those would be the words  
4 -- do you have any reason to dispute the words  
03:37 5 that Inspector Wagner wrote down and you signed?  
6 Let me just back up. I'll ask you to explain  
7 this, but just as far as what was written down  
8 and what you signed at the time, do you accept  
9 that he would have written down your words and  
03:37 10 you signed it or do you have -- do you take issue  
11 with that?

12 A Well, I mean, from the time it happened, I mean,  
13 the only -- the shock was what was --

14 Q Sorry, maybe --

03:37 15 A It should have been maybe put a little bit  
16 different.

17 Q Let me back up, and we'll go through this  
18 statement and I'll ask you questions about what  
19 you mean by various things, but as far as at the  
03:37 20 time when you went and spoke to Inspector Wagner,  
21 told your story, he wrote out a statement and you  
22 signed it; is that right?

23 A Yes.

24 Q And did you expect to hear back from the police?

03:37 25 A Yes.



1 Q And did you expect to give more detailed  
2 information?

3 A Yes.

4 Q So at the time you gave this statement, and again  
03:38 5 my question was are you satisfied, is there  
6 anything in this statement -- and you've read it  
7 over since then on a number of occasions; have you  
8 not?

9 A (Nods head).

03:38 10 Q And I'm just wondering, is there any reason for  
11 you to think that the words may not have been  
12 written down correctly as to what you said at the  
13 time?

14 A Yes. Well, I'm not sure what I said at the time  
03:38 15 now.

16 Q Okay. Why don't we go through the statement and  
17 maybe that will assist. So here you say:

18 "Something has been bothering (me) about  
19 that murder ever since it happened. I  
03:38 20 should have come forward long ago."

21 So the first part, is that accurate?

22 A Well, ever since Larry was charged, I think that  
23 that's when I would have --

24 Q Okay.

03:38 25 A Yeah.



1 Q So -- and I think you told us earlier this  
2 afternoon that, and please correct me if I'm  
3 wrong, that the first time that it started to  
4 bother you, that is, Larry Fisher's connection to  
03:39 5 the Gail Miller murder, was when you learned he  
6 had been charged with rape in Winnipeg?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And then it says:

9 "I should have come forward long ago."

03:39 10 Why did you say that?

11 A Well, I should have come -- well, I figured I  
12 should have because of what was going on, that if  
13 I had came home, somebody could have looked at it  
14 earlier.

03:39 15 Q And I may have asked this, and I apologize to ask  
16 it again if I have, but what were your reasons for  
17 not coming forward earlier than this statement?

18 A I don't know. Probably because most people  
19 thought that the court wouldn't have made a  
03:39 20 mistake. I think that was the basic reason why I  
21 never came forward.

22 Q Okay. Anything else that you can think of that  
23 you haven't already told us?

24 A No. No, no.

03:40 25 Q Then it goes on to talk about:



1 "The day of the murder or the day after  
2 I found my paring knife missing."

3 And you've been asked about this on a number of  
4 occasions subsequent; can you tell us what you  
03:40 5 meant when you said:

6 "The day of the murder or the day after  
7 I found my paring knife missing."?

8 A Oh, I don't know, that was probably just the way  
9 he put it. It was at noon the day of the murder  
03:40 10 that I found my paring knife missing.

11 Q Did you -- when you said:

12 "The day of the murder or the day after  
13 ...",

14 were you referring to the Friday at noon  
03:41 15 following?

16 A Yes.

17 Q Okay. And I believe I read something, did you  
18 think that the murder may have taken place the  
19 night before, or did you know?

03:41 20 A The night before, I thought.

21 Q Okay. So when you said:

22 "The day of the murder or the day after  
23 ..."

24 you were talking about noon-time, the first  
03:41 25 noon --



1 A After dinner.

2 Q -- or the first morning following; is that fair?

3 A Yeah.

4 Q And when those words were used in your statement,

03:41 5 and again we know that the murder took place on

6 the morning of Friday, January 31, 1969, when you

7 made that statement were you intending to say that

8 'either on the Friday or the Saturday after I

9 found my paring knife missing'; is that what you

03:41 10 intended with that statement?

11 A I meant on the Friday.

12 Q Okay. And then you say:

13 "Larry and I were not getting along well

14 and I said to him, "you probably killed

03:42 15 that nurse." "

16 And again, do you have a recollection today of

17 the words that you would have used that morning,

18 or generally or specifically do you know the

19 exact words you used?

03:42 20 A Probably not.

21 Q Okay. Do you remember if you referred to 'killed

22 that nurse' or 'killed that girl' or are you able

23 to say?

24 A Yes, 'that girl', I probably would have -- I could

03:42 25 have said 'girl', I could have said 'nurse', I'm



1 not sure.

2 Q Okay. And then it says:

3 "He went very pale but at that time I  
4 didn't think any more of it."

03:42 5 And I think that's what you told us this  
6 afternoon; is that correct?

7 A Yes.

8 Q At least until Winnipeg --

9 A Yes.

03:42 10 Q -- you didn't. And then it says:

11 "It has been bothering me ever since,  
12 especially when Larry started raping  
13 women."

14 A Yes.

03:42 15 Q And would that be a reference to Winnipeg, when  
16 you found out?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And is it fair to say that you didn't know that  
19 Larry started raping women until, I think you told  
03:43 20 us, until September or after September of 1970; is  
21 that right?

22 A Yup, that's --

23 Q And so you told us earlier today that it started  
24 to bother you when you learned that Larry had been  
03:43 25 arrested for raping women; is that fair?



1 A Yes.

2 Q Next page. You describe the missing knife as  
3 follows:

4 "It was a short handled ordinary paring  
03:43 5 knife with a smooth blade, about 4  
6 inches long. The handle was wooden and  
7 brown colored. I have never found that  
8 knife."

9 And, again, I think that's what you told us this  
03:43 10 afternoon, is that right? Is that a fair  
11 description of the knife?

12 A Yes.

13 Q And then it says:

14 "I have spoken to Dr. McGettigan about  
03:43 15 this matter being on my mind."

16 Who was Dr. McGettigan?

17 A The family doctor.

18 Q And do you remember what you had discussed with  
19 him?

03:44 20 A Probably, if they could, if they could make a  
21 mistake in Court and stuff, and if there could  
22 have been anything wrong with it, and that kind of  
23 thing.

24 Q And why; would there be a reason you would be  
03:44 25 talking to your family doctor about this?



1 A Well I think that's when David was already sayin'  
2 he was innocent and, I don't know, I was probably  
3 upset about it.

4 Q And so were you confiding in Dr. McGettigan  
03:44 5 because he was your doctor and you were looking  
6 for some help?

7 A Yes.

8 Q Okay. And would you have talked to him on more  
9 than one occasion?

03:44 10 A Probably not.

11 Q Okay.

12 A Probably just that once.

13 Q And do you remember what he said to you?

14 A He said "no, if there was a coverup over anything  
03:44 15 it would be ...", I think he thought it was a  
16 different girl, umm --

17 Q A different murder?

18 A Yeah, yeah.

19 Q Okay. And then it says:

03:45 20 "Larry was never questioned about this  
21 case."

22 If I can pause there, and I take it that was your  
23 understanding at the time?

24 A Yes.

03:45 25 Q And so is it fair to say that you would not have





1           been aware, at that time, about the fact that the  
2           police interviewed him at the bus stop?

3       A       Yeah, or I could have forgotten about it.

4       Q       Okay. So either you didn't know about it or, if  
03:45 5           you did, you forgot about it?

6       A       Yes.

7       Q       And then it says:

8                       "I had a feeling that Milgaard was  
9                       innocent of the time."

03:45 10           And I think it should be 'of the crime', and is  
11           that what you felt at the time?

12       A       Yes.

13       Q       And, tell us, what caused you to think that?

14       A       Because of my suspicions of Larry, I think.

03:45 15       Q       Did you know anything about, at this time, did you  
16           know anything about the evidence that had been  
17           presented at David Milgaard's trial?

18       A       Umm, probably not much, no.

19       Q       And so when you said:

03:46 20                       "I have a feeling that Milgaard was  
21                       innocent of the crime.",  
22           would that be because you thought Larry Fisher  
23           had committed the crime, and that if Larry Fisher  
24           committed the crime David Milgaard didn't; is  
03:46 25           that --



1 A Yes, that's right.

2 Q And so do we take it, from that, that there was  
3 nothing -- or tell me; was there anything that you  
4 knew at the time about the case against David  
03:46 5 Milgaard, other than Larry Fisher and your  
6 suspicions, that caused you to think that he was  
7 innocent?

8 A No.

9 Q Okay. And then you say:

03:46 10 "I don't know Milgaard. I have never  
11 seen him."

12 And then go on to say where you are working, and:

13 "I will be home until Sunday Aug. 31 if  
14 the Detectives wish to see me."

03:46 15 And, I think you touched on this, but did you  
16 expect to hear back from the police?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And what caused you to think that?

19 A Well I thought they'd question me about -- a  
03:46 20 little more in depth.

21 Q And were you prepared to provide them with any  
22 information they asked for?

23 A Yes.

24 Q And were you prepared, at the time, to cooperate  
03:47 25 with them fully?



1 A Yes.

2 Q Do you recall any discussion with the officer who  
3 took your statement about whether or not they  
4 would be getting back to you?

03:47 5 A Well, just -- just -- I told him where, I would be  
6 at home, and when they could get ahold of me, so I  
7 --

8 Q Sure. Why don't we call up 106701, please. And  
9 this, Mrs. Fisher, is the police report that  
03:47 10 Wagner prepared the morning right after he met  
11 with you, and Inspector Wagner was the fellow who  
12 took your statement, and this is the report. You  
13 may not have seen this, do you remember seeing  
14 this at some later point, you may have been shown  
03:48 15 it?

16 A No, I don't think I have seen that.

17 Q Okay. Anyway, these are Inspector Wagner's words  
18 where he writes down a report about his meeting  
19 with you, and he says:

03:48 20 "She related to me that she had  
21 something on her mind for the last 10  
22 years, that has been bothering her, and  
23 that she wished to speak to someone  
24 about it, in case it was of any  
03:48 25 importance."



1 And does that sound accurate, that would have  
2 been accurate, is that right?

3 A Yes.

4 Q And then it goes on to say:

03:48 5 "She then referred to the murder in  
6 question, and advised that she feels  
7 David Milgaard whom she has never met,  
8 and does not know, did not commit this  
9 murder, that he was serving time, for,  
03:48 10 and was convicted of, but that instead  
11 that it was her former husband that  
12 committed this murder."

13 And then talks about living in the basement. At  
14 that time, on August 28th, 1980, was it your  
03:48 15 belief that he had committed, that Larry Fisher  
16 had committed the murder, or that he was a  
17 suspect?

18 A Well I thought, if David was innocent, Larry  
19 committed it.

03:49 20 Q Okay. So at that time, as far as the strength of  
21 your belief at that time, again help us out, was  
22 it 'I think he's a suspect' or 'I think he did  
23 it', talking about Larry?

24 A A suspect, well, a suspect.

03:49 25 Q It says here:



1 "... instead that it was her former  
2 husband that committed this murder."

3 And I think -- are you able to say?

4 A Umm, well I figure he -- I figured he was capable,  
03:49 5 after the lady in North Battleford, I mean I  
6 really figured he was capable of doin' it.

7 Q Okay. But when you went into city police in your  
8 mind did you think, 'yes, I think Larry Fisher  
9 killed Gail Miller'?

03:49 10 A Yes.

11 Q That was your thinking at the time?

12 A Uh-huh, uh-huh.

13 Q Okay. If we could scroll down, and then talks  
14 about the Cadraings and that Larry Fisher later  
03:50 15 started committing rapes and harming women in  
16 Winnipeg and in various parts; do you remember  
17 whether or not you told him that he had committed  
18 rapes in Saskatoon or not?

19 A I -- I don't know if I did or not.

03:50 20 Q Okay.

21 A I don't remember.

22 Q And has been in and out of jail ever since, got a  
23 divorce, and then again talked about the (V10)  
24 (V10)-. Then Inspector Wagner says:

03:50 25 "This woman seems quite sincere. She



1                   had a slight order of alcoholic beverage  
2                   on her breath, but was sober."

3                   And, again, that's Inspector Wagner's assessment,  
4                   and I think you've told us, when you went in, did  
03:50 5                   you believe you were sober at the time?

6           A           Yes.

7           Q           And then it says:

8                   "In view of this development, I decided  
9                   to take a statement from her, and she  
03:50 10                   was advised that the investigating  
11                   officers that handle the original case,  
12                   would no doubt be in touch with her, to  
13                   obtain further information from her, and  
14                   probably could enlighten her on the  
03:51 15                   case. to clear her mind."

16                   And:

17                   "I advised her that it would be better  
18                   if the investigating officers did it,  
19                   since I myself was not that familiar  
03:51 20                   with the case, since I was not directly  
21                   involved in it at the time."

22                   So it appears from this report, and I think we  
23                   heard from Inspector Wagner last week, that he  
24                   may have told you that someone would be following  
03:51 25                   up with you; is that possible or do you remember



1                   that?

2           A           I don't remember it, but he may have.

3           Q           And then it talks here about:

4                               "... and probably could enlighten her on  
03:51 5                               the case. to clear her mind."

6                   Were you looking at the time, Mrs. Fisher, for  
7                   some evidence that maybe Larry Fisher had not  
8                   committed the murder?

9           A           Yes. Either way I wanted to know.

03:51 10          Q           And so I think you've told us you started having  
11                   suspicions in 19, late 1970-early 1971, and at  
12                   this date you still had -- you were still  
13                   troubled; is that fair?

14          A           Yes.

03:52 15          Q           And is it fair to say that you were looking for  
16                   someone to either say 'yes he did it' or to  
17                   satisfy you that, no, he didn't?

18          A           Yes, that's --

19          Q           And is that the reference here about to clear your  
03:52 20                   mind; is that what that may be referring to?

21          A           Yes.

22          Q           Okay. After your meeting with Inspector Wagner on  
23                   August 28th, 1980, did you ever talk to another  
24                   member of the Saskatoon City Police Service about  
03:52 25                   the Gail Miller murder or your suspicions about



1 Larry Fisher?

2 A Oh, that was quite a bit later.

3 Q Okay. Was that -- and who was that?

4 A Umm, that was after 1990 I think, Mr. Pearson,  
03:52 5 Mr. Williams.

6 Q Okay. Sergeant Pearson is with the RCMP; do you  
7 recall that?

8 A Yes.

9 Q Upon -- and my question was the Saskatoon City  
03:52 10 Police?

11 A No.

12 Q Okay. So let me ask it again. After you talked  
13 to Inspector Wagner on August 28th, 1980 did you  
14 ever, again, talk to a member of the Saskatoon  
03:53 15 City Police Service about the Gail Miller murder  
16 and your suspicions about Larry Fisher?

17 A No.

18 Q And I will ask you some questions about  
19 Mr. Pearson and Mr. Williams later. After you  
03:53 20 left the police station on August 28th, 1980 did  
21 you feel better about going in?

22 A I don't know, I -- I think so.

23 Q Did you feel relieved?

24 A Yeah.

03:53 25 Q Why?





1 A Because then they could check it out.

2 Q And did you have any expectation as to what would  
3 happen with the information you gave them?

4 A Well I just thought they'd look into it.

03:53 5 Q And at some point, again after August 28th, 1980,  
6 did you think about making inquiries to find out  
7 what might have happened?

8 A No.

9 Q Did you make any assumptions about what may have  
03:54 10 happened, of what the police may have done with  
11 your information?

12 A No.

13 Q Did you continue to have suspicions that Larry  
14 Fisher was a suspect or may have committed the  
03:54 15 Gail Miller murder?

16 A I probably was still a little suspicious.

17 Q Did you take any comfort from the fact that you  
18 went into the Saskatoon City Police and made a  
19 statement and didn't hear anything further; did  
03:54 20 that cause you to change your thinking at all?

21 A Maybe some, yes.

22 Q And tell us how?

23 A Well, I was just relieved that nothing else  
24 happened.

03:54 25 Q Okay. Did you -- the fact that you didn't hear



1 anything from them, did you make any conclusions  
2 in your mind, or any assumptions about whether or  
3 not Larry Fisher may have been involved in the  
4 Gail Miller murder?

03:54 5 A Well I think I kind of let it go a bit then, yes.

6 Q Okay. Did you think that, if he had been  
7 involved, you would have heard something?

8 A Yes.

9 Q And did you think that, since you hadn't heard  
03:55 10 anything from the Saskatoon City Police, that  
11 maybe he wasn't involved?

12 A I was hoping, uh-huh.

13 Q Okay. When you say you were hoping?

14 A That he wasn't.

03:55 15 Q That he wasn't involved. Did you ever consider  
16 contacting the Saskatoon City Police about, I mean  
17 after you went in in August of 1980, to find out  
18 what they did?

19 A No.

03:55 20 Q Now we know that your next contact with  
21 authorities would have been I think in March of  
22 1990, does that sound right, Sergeant Pearson and  
23 Eugene Williams?

24 A Yes.

03:55 25 Q And I think, shortly before that, you were



1           contacted by Joyce Milgaard and Paul Henderson; is  
2           that correct?

3           A       Yes.

4           Q       And so from the time, let's go August 28th, 1980  
03:55 5           until March of 1990 when you hear back from  
6           Mrs. Milgaard and the authorities, during that  
7           time frame did you continue to talk about your  
8           suspicions with other people, your suspicions  
9           about Larry Fisher?

03:56 10          A       Not so much any more I don't think.

11          Q       Had you put it behind you a bit?

12          A       Yes.

13          Q       And was that because you had gone in to see the  
14          police?

03:56 15          A       Yes.

16          Q       If we could call up 159890, please. And this is  
17          an advertisement that appears to have run in *The*  
18          *Saskatoon StarPhoenix* at least on March 26, 28,  
19          29, 30, 31, and April 2nd. It says, 'Linda  
03:57 20          Fisher. Would anyone knowing the recent  
21          whereabouts of Linda Fisher (who was married in  
22          1969 to Larry Fisher) and has a daughter, Tammy,  
23          please contact Box 410C, *StarPhoenix*. The  
24          advertiser has important information which may be  
03:57 25          to her advantage and is anxious to contact



1 Mrs. Fisher as soon as possible. Her last known  
2 address was in Saskatoon.'

3 Now do you remember seeing that  
4 in *The StarPhoenix* at the time?

03:57 5 A Yes.

6 Q And where were you living at the time?

7 A Umm, on Avenue E.

8 Q In Saskatoon?

9 A Yup.

03:57 10 Q And do you remember whether or not you were in --  
11 your name was in the phone book?

12 A I'm not sure whether mine or Bryan's the phone was  
13 under.

14 Q And were you going by the name Linda Fisher, --

03:57 15 A Yes.

16 Q -- had you kept your --

17 A Yes.

18 Q And you've kept the name Fisher right till today;  
19 is that right?

03:57 20 A Yes.

21 Q And at the time, again 1993, had you taken any  
22 steps or efforts to preclude people from finding  
23 you?

24 A No.

03:58 25 Q Now, when you saw this in the newspaper, tell us



1           what you thought and what you did?

2           A       Well I thought it might be one of Larry's victims,  
3                   and I think we wrote, but we gave them the box  
4                   number instead of the address.

03:58 5           Q       Okay. If I can call up 213943, please, and go to  
6                   page 3. If we can just -- this is March, can't  
7                   see it very well, but March 30, 1983 to *The*  
8                   *StarPhoenix*. That's the box number in the ad, and  
9                   then in the top corner it says, 'L. Fisher, Box  
03:58 10           276, Cando, Saskatchewan'; is that right?

11          A       Yes.

12          Q       And would that have been a box number that you had  
13                   in Cando?

14          A       Yes.

03:59 15          Q       And then if we can go to page 5 of this, please,  
16                   ending in 48. And I think this is a letter March  
17                   27th, 1983. It says, 'Gentlemen: I am writing in  
18                   regard to the ad you placed in the Saturday, March  
19                   26th edition of *The StarPhoenix*. I am wonder who  
03:59 20           you are, why you want to get in contact with me,  
21                   and what is it all about. You can contact me at  
22                   this address', and then you gave a box number; is  
23                   that correct?

24          A       Yes.

03:59 25          Q       And it's signed 'Linda Fisher'. Did you write



1           this letter?

2       A       No.

3       Q       Who wrote it?

4       A       I don't know. Maybe one of my sisters.

03:59 5       Q       Was it written on your behalf?

6       A       Yes.

7       Q       Okay. And was there a reason you didn't want to  
8       write it?

9       A       They probably had better writing than me.

03:59 10      Q       Okay. And so, at the time when you wrote this,  
11       you thought it was one of Larry Fisher's victims;  
12       is that right?

13      A       Yes.

14      Q       And then, if we could go to page 213946, this is a  
04:00 15       letter; and do you recognize that as Bryan  
16       Wright's handwriting?

17      A       Yes.

18      Q       And was he your common law spouse at the time?

19      A       Yes.

04:00 20      Q       And it says, "To whom it may concern regarding the  
21       advisement in *The StarPhoenix* re Linda Fisher.  
22       You may contact me at 382-8167, Bryan, for further  
23       information as I am her common law husband I would  
24       like to know more about this matter and if she  
04:00 25       will need a lawyer, etc. Sincerely yours, Bryan.'



1 And do you know if Mr. Wright wrote that letter on  
2 your behalf?

3 A Yes.

4 Q And then again go to 213948. And that's Bryan's  
04:00 5 writing, is it, to the same box address?

6 A Yeah, it could be.

7 Q And then if we can go to 213943, please, and this  
8 is a letter to Peter Carlyle-Gordge in Winnipeg;  
9 do you know whose writing that is?

04:01 10 A No.

11 Q If we can go back to 213947, please. There's some  
12 handwriting at the bottom, here, and it looks like  
13 directions to Cando, is that right, Wilkie,  
14 Luseland; would you know what that, any of that,  
04:01 15 refers to?

16 A No.

17 Q Do you remember talking to Peter Carlyle-Gordge in  
18 1983, or being aware that someone wished to talk  
19 to you about the David Milgaard case?

04:01 20 A Umm, not the Milgaard case, no.

21 Q Okay, or about Larry Fisher?

22 A Umm, yeah, I think -- I think we did hear  
23 something but I don't remember what it was.

24 Q Did -- do you remember if Bryan dealt with a  
04:02 25 Mr. Carlyle-Gordge?



1 A He could have, yes.

2 Q And I believe, and we will be hearing more  
3 evidence on this, but I believe at the time  
4 Mr. Carlyle-Gordge was interviewing a number of  
04:02 5 people, telling them he was looking at a book on  
6 the David Milgaard story, and there is also some  
7 evidence that he may have been assisting Joyce  
8 Milgaard at the time; does any of that assist your  
9 memory at all?

04:02 10 A Umm, I don't remember.

11 Q Okay. At this time, 1983, I take it you responded  
12 to the advertisement; is that fair?

13 A Yes.

14 Q Would you have discussed your suspicions about  
04:02 15 Larry Fisher with Mrs. Milgaard if she would have  
16 asked you at that time?

17 A Yes.

18 Q And if Mr. Peter Carlyle-Gordge had talked to you  
19 as a writer, or as assisting Joyce Milgaard, would  
04:02 20 you have talked to him about your suspicions about  
21 Larry Fisher?

22 A Umm, I don't know. I don't know. Maybe, if he  
23 just said he was writing a book, I wouldn't want  
24 to be involved.

04:03 25 Q Okay. If he was looking into the case would you





1 have told him your concerns?

2 A Yes.

3 Q If we could call up 213627. This is a letter  
4 October 12th, 1983 from Mr. Tony Merchant, who was  
04:03 5 the lawyer at the time for David and/or Joyce  
6 Milgaard, to a process server in Calgary, and this  
7 was a little later in 1983, and looking to find  
8 you, who it says:

9 "Linda Fisher. In 1969 she lived at 334  
04:03 10 Avenue O South, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.  
11 She married Larry Fisher who is  
12 presently in prison for a rape charge."

13 Do you have any recollection of being contacted  
14 by Universal Process Servers or Tony Merchant at  
04:03 15 the time?

16 A No.

17 Q And again, October of 1983, where would you have  
18 been living at the time?

19 A Umm, '83? I might have been living on Avenue E,  
04:04 20 but not in the -- in the -- at 1340, it would have  
21 been 1329 or 13 --

22 Q In Saskatoon?

23 A Yeah.

24 Q And were you working at the time; do you remember?

04:04 25 A In '83? Yes.



1 Q Do you remember where you were working?

2 A Probably for ASL Paving.

3 Q Okay. If we could call up 011984. This is a  
4 document December of 1984, it's a Community  
04:04 5 Assessment Form for Larry Fisher. And so this  
6 would be, just to give you some assistance, 1984,  
7 so this would be about four years after you went  
8 into the city police and about five years after  
9 you and Mr. Fisher were divorced. Okay? And if  
04:05 10 we can just go down to the bottom, it talks about  
11 going to the Fisher household on December 19th,  
12 '84 to discuss plans for family visiting; do you  
13 remember this occasion, someone from Parole  
14 Services?

04:05 15 A Maybe --

16 Q Maybe we'll go to the next page, there's just a  
17 part here I can show you, it looks like it's C.A.  
18 Borody and Ms. G. Thompson; do those names ring a  
19 bell?

04:05 20 A No.

21 Q If we could just go back to the top of the page.  
22 And I think what this talks about is your daughter  
23 Tammy, who would have been 16 at the time, going  
24 in to visit Larry Fisher in prison; do you  
04:05 25 remember discussions about that?



1 A No, I don't remember.

2 Q And then it says:

3 "Mrs. Fisher stated during the course of  
4 the interview that she is not concerned  
04:05 5 for her welfare, her daughter's welfare,  
6 and her mother-in-law's welfare. She is  
7 very concerned about the population in  
8 general should her husband be released.  
9 She also stated that in her estimation  
04:06 10 her ex-husband needs long term  
11 psychiatric care. She sees his crimes  
12 escalating in violence and believes that  
13 next time he could quite possibly kill  
14 someone."

04:06 15 Do you have a recollection of telling the parole  
16 people that information?

17 A No, I don't really remember it.

18 Q And does that, again having read that, does that  
19 sound like something you would have said at the  
04:06 20 time; is that what you thought at the time?

21 A Yes.

22 Q And it -- there is no mention in here about the  
23 Gail Miller murder; do you know whether you would  
24 have mentioned that to them at the time, your  
04:06 25 suspicions?



1 A Probably not.

2 Q And, if not, why not?

3 A I don't know.

4 Q I'm done with that document. Now again, Mrs.

04:06 5 Fisher, I just wanted to ask you a couple

6 questions about some of the late '70s-early 1980s,

7 and you have been questioned about this subject on

8 a number of occasions, in particular at Larry

9 Fisher's trial, and relates to your alcohol use in

04:07 10 the '70s and '80s. And can you tell me generally,

11 again, did you have, in the '70s or '80s, did you

12 have a problem with alcohol at some time in those

13 two decades?

14 A Yes.

04:07 15 Q And about when did it start?

16 A Probably about '72.

17 Q '72? And did it continue into the '80s?

18 A Yes.

19 Q And, at some point, did you join Alcoholics

04:07 20 Anonymous?

21 A Yes.

22 Q And do you remember when that was?

23 A I think it was around 1988.

24 Q And since 1988, in the last 17 years, can you tell

04:07 25 us approximately how many drinks, alcohol, liquor,



1                   you've had since then?

2       A           Oh, I don't know, maybe four or five.

3       Q           Okay.

4       A           Five or six.

04:07 5       Q           So, in the last 17 years, four or five drinks?

6       A           Uh-huh.

7       Q           Do you have a problem with alcohol today?

8       A           No.

9       Q           Have you had a problem with alcohol for the last  
04:08 10               17 years?

11      A           No.

12      Q           If we can just talk about some of the statements  
13                   that family members have given us, and I think  
14                   you've told us that certainly in the '70s and  
04:08 15               sometimes in the '80s you talked to a lot of  
16               people in your family about your suspicions about  
17               Larry Fisher?

18      A           Yes.

19      Q           And I think, and please correct me if I'm wrong,  
04:08 20               probably more so in the '70s than in the '80s; is  
21               that fair?

22      A           Yes.

23      Q           And were you aware that, amongst family members,  
24                   that this subject came up from time to time?

04:08 25      A           Yes.



1 Q And your Uncle Clifford and Uncle Roy would have  
2 talked about it as well?

3 A Yes.

4 Q And Doris Poitras and Jim Poitras?

04:08 5 A Yes.

6 Q And Herb Poitras and Sylvia?

7 A Yes.

8 Q And, again, it would be the topic of discussion?

9 A Yes.

04:09 10 Q Did any of those people express a view to you  
11 about whether they had suspicions that Larry  
12 Fisher was involved in the Gail Miller murder?

13 A Not really, no.

14 Q If we can call up 035786, please. And this is a  
04:09 15 1993 interview that the RCMP had with Doris  
16 Poitras. You know -- I'm sorry, is it, how do you  
17 pronounce it, is it Poitras?

18 A Poitras.

19 Q Poitras? And let me just check, Doris is your  
04:09 20 aunt, is that right?

21 A Yes.

22 Q And so she is the sister to Cliff and Roy Pambrun;  
23 correct?

24 A Yes.

04:09 25 Q And she's married to James Poitras?



1 A Yes.

2 Q And James' brother is Arnold Poitras?

3 A Yes.

4 Q James' other brother is Herbert Poitras?

04:09 5 A Yes.

6 Q Who used to be married to Sylvia Poitras who's  
7 Larry Fisher's sister; is that correct?

8 A Yes.

9 Q All right. So if we go to page 035785. Would you  
04:10 10 have had discussions with Doris present, or to  
11 Doris, where you expressed concerns about your  
12 suspicion of Larry Fisher?

13 A Yes.

14 Q And, again, this is an RCMP officer's note in 1993  
04:10 15 when they interviewed Doris and it says, 'Doris's  
16 suspicions in relation to Larry Fisher's alleged  
17 responsibility for the murder of Miller flow from  
18 the following points. First, she has known Larry  
19 Fisher nearly all of his life and has never liked  
04:10 20 or trusted him.' Scroll down. It talks about  
21 reading the book *When Justice Fails*, scroll down.  
22 'Doris could not offer any other evidence which  
23 would implicate Fisher. Both she and James  
24 implied that there were other victims of Larry  
04:11 25 Fisher but they would not disclose the identities.



1 In addition, Doris offered the following', if you  
2 go to the next page, and it talks about discussing  
3 with Arnold Poitras Larry and her theories with  
4 Arnold as well as others. Down at the bottom it  
04:11 5 says, 'she has discussed Larry with Linda but  
6 Linda never told her at any time that Larry came  
7 home the morning of January 31, 1969 with blood on  
8 his clothing.'

9 And you will see that in some  
04:11 10 other reports, Mrs. Fisher, do you have any  
11 recollection of ever seeing Larry Fisher come home  
12 the morning of January 31, 1969 with blood on his  
13 clothing?

14 A No.

04:11 15 Q Did you ever tell anybody that you saw that?

16 A No.

17 Q And page 035781, and the RCMP say:

18 "It is apparent from speaking to Doris  
19 that she and others from her immediate  
04:11 20 family and friends, (including Arnold),  
21 have discussed this topic a great deal."  
22 Is that fair, you would agree with that?

23 A Yes.

24 Q Go to 056651, and that's part of doc ID 056639,  
04:12 25 and just down at the bottom, paragraph (ii), and





1           this is an RCMP report of Mr. Pearson, but it  
2           says:

3                       "On 91 Dec 13 a call was received from  
4                       S/Sgt. Bertrand of Saskatoon City  
04:12 5                       Police, who indicated that a Crime  
6                       Stoppers tip had been received from an  
7                       anonymous female, stating that Herb  
8                       Poitras had picked up Larry Fisher on  
9                       the morning of the murder and that  
04:12 10                      Fisher had blood on his clothes. The  
11                      caller went on to say that Poitras and  
12                      Fisher went back to Fisher's residence  
13                      and Larry burnt his clothing."

14           Are you able to tell us if any of that happened?

04:12 15       A           Not that I know of.

16       Q           Did you have discussions with Herb Poitras about  
17                      your suspicions about Larry Fisher?

18       A           Not Herb. Doris said that Herb had seen Larry  
19                      with blood on his clothes at one time, but that  
04:13 20                      was in North Battleford.

21       Q           And that was -- in North Battleford?

22       A           Yes.

23       Q           But as far as around the time of the Gail Miller  
24                      murder, to your knowledge was Herb Poitras at your  
04:13 25                      house that morning or was he with Larry?



1 A No.

2 Q If we can go to 285242, please, this is a taped  
3 statement that the RCMP took in October of 1999,  
4 and this was part of their investigation in the  
04:13 5 prosecutor of Larry Fisher, from a lady named Rose  
6 Cote who lived in Plenty, Saskatchewan, and she  
7 talks about knowing you in Cando in I think  
8 1986-'87. Do you remember Rose Cote?

9 A I don't remember her, but yeah, I probably -- I  
04:14 10 remember the Cotes. I don't remember her  
11 personally.

12 Q Okay. And it looks as though -- and the officer  
13 asks:

14 "The reason why we are here today, is  
04:14 15 uh, you made a phone call to the  
16 Detachment here in Saskatoon."

17 And she says:

18 "I phoned in and told them that I knew  
19 Mrs. Fisher and what she had told my  
04:14 20 ex-husband and I when we were at her  
21 place for coffee one night in Cando."

22 And next page, and then she goes on to describe  
23 the conversation:

24 "We, we had met through some friends of  
04:14 25 ours. And uh, um she seemed like a very



1 nice lady. And we were invited out  
2 there for coffee and we went. And the  
3 more we got to know her the more I began  
4 to like her. And then she started to  
04:14 5 confide in me. And that's when she -  
6 started opening up and saying to me  
7 that, her husband - she believed  
8 committed a murder. And that uh, he had  
9 come home one night, he was all in  
04:14 10 blood. And uh, that she had been  
11 missing a parring knife from her drawer,  
12 when she went to peel potatoes. But  
13 when he came home, that knife was in his  
14 hand and it was all bloody and so was  
04:15 15 he. She asked him what he was doing?  
16 And he said he had been hunting, and she  
17 called him a liar. This is what like  
18 she told me."

19 Again, do you recall telling anybody that  
04:15 20 information, Mrs. Fisher?

21 A Well, part of it, about the paring knife maybe  
22 being missing.

23 Q Would you have told the story -- or the version of  
24 events that you've told us today about the morning  
04:15 25 of the murder, is it possible you would have told



1 her that?

2 A Yes.

3 Q And this part about him coming home with blood and  
4 holding the knife in his hand?

04:15 5 A No.

6 Q Again, have you ever told anybody that?

7 A No.

8 Q And again the next page, just for the record, she  
9 says that this was in '86-'87, somewhere in there.

04:15 10 If we could call up 034536, and  
11 this is a report in 1993 when the RCMP interviewed  
12 your doctor, Dr. McGettigan, and if you can go to  
13 page 034538, and I think at the bottom it just  
14 says -- scroll up a bit, please, one line, it  
04:16 15 says:

16 "Dr. McGettigan does not recall Linda  
17 ever saying anything about the Miller  
18 murder, however, there is an entry --"

19 And it's got August 12th of '88,

04:16 20 "-- made on her chart by Dr. McGettigan  
21 in the words: "This is the wife of the  
22 guy who is suspected in the Milgaard  
23 murder." Dr. McGettigan could not  
24 recall why he made this note."

04:16 25 And again, I think you had told us earlier that



1           you would have talked to Dr. McGettigan about  
2           your concerns?

3       A       Yes.

4       Q       Do you think that was before you went into the  
04:16 5       Saskatoon City Police in 1980?

6       A       I don't even know.

7       Q       Now, do you have -- if we can call up 179141, and  
8       this is a memorandum, I believe it's from David  
9       Asper to his file, December 12th, 1991, and he  
04:17 10       says:

11                   "I received an anonymous telephone call  
12                   from a male caller on Wednesday,  
13                   December 11 ... the caller indicated  
14                   that he three pieces of information from  
04:17 15                   "very close to the horse mouth" relating  
16                   to Larry Fisher.

17                   a) He claimed that Peter Pambrun, who  
18                   lives on Avenue "V" South in Saskatoon,  
19                   told people on occasion, and has done so  
04:17 20                   ever since the Gail Miller murder, that  
21                   he saw Larry Fisher burning his clothes  
22                   in an old oil drum the morning after the  
23                   murder. The caller indicated that Peter  
24                   Pambrun was not a very credible guy, and  
04:18 25                   is basically an illiterate alcohol, but



1                   that he has maintained his story for  
2                   many, many years."

3                   Do you know a Peter Pambrun?

4           A           That would be Roy.

04:18 5           Q           Roy. Is there a Peter Pambrun to your knowledge?

6           A           (Shakes head).

7           Q           No?

8           A           Not that I know of.

9           Q           So Roy -- tell me what you know. Did you ever  
04:18 10           have a discussion with Roy Pambrun about any  
11           encounter he may have had with Larry Fisher?

12          A           Well, Roy told me that Larry had thrown a pair of  
13           good boots in his burning barrel.

14          Q           And when would Roy have told you that?

04:18 15          A           That would be in the '70s.

16          Q           So would this be after Larry was in jail?

17          A           Yes.

18          Q           And would it have been in the course of a  
19           discussion where you might have been expressing  
04:18 20           your suspicions about Larry Fisher?

21          A           Yes.

22          Q           And he told you that he remembers Larry burning  
23           some boots in a burning barrel?

24          A           Yes.

04:18 25          Q           Do you remember whether he said what day it was



1 or --

2 A I don't remember.

3 Q Roy Pambrun later gave a statement stating that  
4 one morning, and I think he may have said it  
04:19 5 either was or could have been the morning of the  
6 murder, that Larry Fisher showed up at his back  
7 door without a coat and shoes and there was a fire  
8 in the burning barrel. Are you familiar with that  
9 statement that he made?

04:19 10 A Yes.

11 Q Had Roy ever discussed that with you, that version  
12 of events?

13 A Well, later on he couldn't remember about the  
14 boots, but he did -- he said he lent Larry boots  
04:19 15 and a jacket and that the burning barrel was  
16 going.

17 Q Okay. And so back in the early '70s he told you  
18 that Larry burned his boots in the burning barrel?

19 A Yes.

04:19 20 Q And then later did he tell you or did you hear him  
21 say that Larry had been at his house one morning  
22 and that he had borrowed some boots?

23 A Yeah, because Roy couldn't remember, Roy couldn't  
24 remember about the boots later. Later he said it  
04:20 25 was, that he had lent a jacket and boots to Larry,



1 but the burning barrel Larry was warming up at.

2 Q And did you hear that version from Roy in the  
3 early '70s or was that later?

4 A That was later.

04:20 5 Q How much later?

6 A Just recent.

7 Q Recent as in?

8 A Just on the internet.

9 Q So you became aware of Roy Pambrun's version of  
04:20 10 events from what you read about the Inquiry?

11 A Yes.

12 Q And prior to that had you been aware of his  
13 version of events about Larry being at his house  
14 in the morning?

04:20 15 A Yes.

16 Q You had been aware?

17 A Yeah.

18 Q Sorry, let me start over. I thought you said that  
19 the first time you heard Roy Pambrun tell the  
04:20 20 version of events that Larry was at his house and  
21 borrowed shoes and a coat was when you read it on  
22 the internet in these proceedings.

23 A Well, I -- all I knew was about the burning barrel  
24 and the, that it was in the winter and Larry  
04:21 25 warmed up at the burning barrel and that later Roy





1           seen a pair of boots in the burning barrel.

2           **Q**       So putting apart what you may have heard in the  
3                   Inquiry proceedings or read on the internet in  
4                   these proceedings, apart from that, your  
04:21 5                   recollection of Roy Pambrun's version of events is  
6                   as you've told us, the burning barrel and the  
7                   boots in the burning barrel; is that right?

8           **A**       Yes.

9           **Q**       And the events, or the version that he told this  
04:21 10                  Inquiry last week about Larry showing up at his  
11                  door without a coat and without shoes and  
12                  borrowing a coat and shoes, are you telling us the  
13                  first you became aware of that is when you read it  
14                  on the internet?

04:21 15           **A**       Well, I could have forgotten, I could have  
16                  forgotten about, you know, him lending the coats  
17                  and the boots. All I remembered of what Roy told  
18                  us was that he had, Roy thought he had burned a  
19                  pair of work boots in the barrel.

04:22 20           **Q**       And if we can just go back to this memo, the  
21                  caller says:

22                                "b) He also claimed that shortly after  
23                                the murder, Fisher headed south with a  
24                                fellow by the name of Leonard, with the  
04:22 25                                last naming sounding somewhat like



1 "Sunshine", and committed a rape  
2 somewhere south. He was not and could  
3 not be more specific."

04:22 4 And again, do you know anybody with the name of  
5 Leonard and the last name Sunshine?

6 A Leonard Sonnleitner.

7 Q And who is Leonard Sonnleitner?

8 A He was married to my aunt.

9 Q And did he work with Larry?

04:22 10 A At one point he did, yes.

11 Q And in January of 1969 was he -- where did he  
12 live?

13 A I don't know. Either Regina or here. I'm not  
14 sure.

04:22 15 Q And did Larry socialize with this Leonard fellow?

16 A Some, yeah.

17 Q And then it says:

18 "c) He also claimed that Linda Fisher  
19 had indicated that she had somewhat more  
04:23 20 to say about Larry Fisher, particularly  
21 regarding their sexual lives. The  
22 caller indicated that Linda Fisher  
23 claims that Larry on occasion used to  
24 hold a knife to her throat while having  
04:23 25 intercourse with her."



1 Did that ever happen?

2 A No.

3 Q Did you ever tell anybody that?

4 A No.

04:23 5 MR. HODSON: Mr. Commissioner, this is  
6 probably an appropriate spot to break for the  
7 day.

8 COMMISSIONER MacCALLUM: Thanks. Tomorrow  
9 at nine.

04:23 10 (Adjourned at 4:23 p.m.)
