20		the publicity and the negativity that was going on
21		suggesting that there was a cover-up and things
22		like that, so I think, you know, the people that I
23		associated with left me with the impression that
24		they would like nothing better than to get this
25		matter cleared up and dealt with.

1	Q	And as far as the missing files, and I think we're
2		fairly clear on what those are, I think the,
3		ultimately part of the (V1)- file was found, but
4		not its entirety, and (V2) and (V3) I
5		think statements were found, but the files were
6		not located, and the (V5) file, and again I
7		think it was the entire file, although there might
8		still be a bit of debate on that, but of the four
9		Saskatoon Fisher assaults, at least three of the
10		four files were not found in their complete state.
11		Does that accord with your recollection?
12	А	That's my recollection, yes.
13	Q	And in your dealings with the Saskatoon City
14		Police, did you observe anything, Mr. Pearson, or
15		hear anything or come to any conclusion that any
16		police officers may have been involved in
17		destroying the file or hiding the file or doing
18		anything improper with any of those files?
19	А	Nothing like that was ever related to me.
20	Q	And in your dealings with the police officers, and
21		again your discussions with them, I'm just talking
22		about your observations and dealings, did you get
23		any sense as to whether the police officers that
24		you were dealing with, and I think your words were

4 Α Well, just generally speaking, you know, most of 5 the people, or a lot of the people around were not familiar with the Milgaard case, so to speak, 20 6 7 years before, a lot of the people weren't even on the department at that time. A lot of them had no 8 9 knowledge of this investigation, you know. There 10 was Chief Penkala and a few of the older members 11 that were about to retire had some knowledge, but 12 the general view was that, you know, the people 13 that I was dealing with, they had no knowledge or 14 direct involvement in this at all, all they were 15 living with was the present bad publicity they 16 were getting over it and they just wanted this 17 thing resolved.

18 Did it strike you as being unusual, Mr. Pearson, Q 19 at this time, that of -- and again I don't recall 20 the exact number, but there were many files that 21 were located, but of the ones that were not 22 located, three out of the four Fisher files fell 23 into that category, and I think that's -- and I 24 don't want to go to the media reports, but 25 certainly that was what was being suggested, that

1		it wasn't a case of all files be destroyed, but
2		only a small number compared to the grand total
3		and it happened to be three out of the four. Do
4		you recall hearing things of that nature?
5	A	Yes.
6	Q	And again, did that cause you any concern, that
7	A	It does cause you to think, it sure does, and, you
8		know, I think the Sask Police Commission and their
9		inquiry for the tapes that they reviewed, I think
10		there's something like 38 files that were missing.
11		I don't have the details on what those files were
12		all about or what they were related to, but there
13		were other files. Now, was that to do with
14		anything that was, you know, being done illegally
15		or under the table or was that just administration
16		of file conversion from paper to microfiche, I
17		don't know, the Police Commission I believe put a
18		report in in that regard, but when you say, yeah,
19		there were some files missing, I suppose the
20		natural thing is to scratch your head and say,
21		well, where are they and why are some of these the
22		Fisher files.
23	Q	And again, as far as your dealings, you mentioned
24		the, I think at the last sitting the fact that the

3		penitentiary file. Did you ever have any
4		suspicions or concerns about the manner in which
5		the Fort Garry police files were destroyed?

7		corrected, but I think this date coincides with
