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CHAPTER W-13.1 REG 63

The Wildlife Act, 1997

Title

- 1 These regulations may be cited as *The Archery and Muzzle-loading Firearm Big Game Open Seasons Regulations, 1995*.

Interpretation

- 2 In these regulations:

- (a) “**Act**” means *The Wildlife Act, 1997*;
- (b) “**assigned operating area**” means the area of land defined in an outfitter’s licence issued pursuant to *The Outfitter and Guide Regulations, 1988* where an outfitter is authorized to provide an outfitting service to hunt wildlife;
- (c) “**Canadian resident**” means a person who has his or her principal residence in Canada and who is a Canadian citizen or has resided in Canada for the 12 months preceding the date of his or her application for a licence;
- (d) “**Cypress Hills Provincial Park (West Block)**” means that portion of Cypress Hills Provincial Park adjoining the Alberta-Saskatchewan boundary;
- (e) “**Indian reserve**” means a reserve as defined in the *Indian Act* (Canada);
- (f) “**muzzle-loading firearm**” means a firearm that is loaded through the front opening of the barrel;
- (g) “**non-trophy elk**” means a female elk or an elk born during the year in which hunting is taking place;
- (h) “**non-trophy mule deer**” means a female mule deer or a mule deer born during the year in which hunting is taking place;
- (i) “**non-trophy white-tailed deer**” means a female white-tailed deer or a white-tailed deer born during the year in which hunting is taking place;
- (j) “**open season**” means an open season established pursuant to any regulations made pursuant to the Act during which it is lawful to hunt a particular species of wildlife;
- (k) “**protected area**” means a protected area constituted pursuant to *The Parks Act*;
- (l) “**provincial park**” means a provincial park constituted pursuant to *The Parks Act*;
- (m) “**recreation site**” means a recreation site constituted pursuant to *The Recreation Sites Regulations, 1991*;
- (n) “**Saskatchewan resident**” means a person who:
 - (i) is a Canadian resident, has his or her principal residence in Saskatchewan and has resided in Saskatchewan for the three months preceding the date of his or her application for a licence; or

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(ii) is a member of the regular force of the Canadian Armed Forces or of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and is stationed and residing in Saskatchewan;

(o) “**wildlife management unit**” means a wildlife management unit constituted by *The Wildlife Management Zones and Special Areas Boundaries Regulations, 1990*;

(p) “**wildlife management zone**” means a wildlife management zone constituted by *The Wildlife Management Zones and Special Areas Boundaries Regulations, 1990*.

Restrictions and conditions re hunting

4 Every person who hunts pursuant to the authority of these regulations shall comply with any restrictions on and conditions relating to hunting contained in the Act, in these regulations and in any other regulations made pursuant to the Act, or specified on the person’s licence.

Archery seasons

5(1) Subject to subsection (2), no person shall hunt by any means other than a bow and arrow during any open season established pursuant to sections 6 to 11.

(2) It is lawful for a person to hunt with a muzzle-loading firearm or crossbow during the open seasons established pursuant to sections 6 to 11 where the open seasons overlap with open seasons for muzzle-loading firearms and crossbows established pursuant to sections 13 to 18.

White-tailed deer

6(1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex:

- (a) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in Wildlife Management Zones 1 to 19, 21 to 47, 51, 52 and 54, including Brokenshell No. 1, Brokenshell No. 2, Elbow, Fort-a-la-Corne, Great Bend and Horsehide Lake Wildlife Management Units;

- (b) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following consecutive 52 days in Cypress Hills (West Block), Duck Mountain, Greenwater Lake, Meadow Lake, Moose Mountain and Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Parks and that portion of Douglas Provincial Park lying west of Diefenbaker Lake (Gordon Mackenzie Arm); or
 - (c) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 89 days in Regina-Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and Prince Albert Wildlife Management Zones.
- (2) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence, a Second Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence, a First Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence, a Second Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence, a First Non-resident White-tailed Deer Licence or a Second Non-resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex:
- (a) on the Monday closest to August 31, or August 31 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 61 days in Wildlife Management Zones 56 to 69, including Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks; or
 - (b) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following consecutive 59 days in Greenwater Lake and Meadow Lake Provincial Parks.
- (2.01) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence or a Second Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in Wildlife Management Zones 48 to 50 and 53 to 55, including Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks.
- (2.02) It is lawful for a person who is the holder a First Non-resident White-tailed Deer Licence or a Second Non-resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in those portions of Wildlife Management Zones 48 to 50 and 53 to 55, including Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks, that comprise the assigned operating area of the outfitter with which the licence holder is hunting.
- (2.1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex:
- (a) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 89 days in Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones; or
 - (b) on the Monday closest to November 16, or November 16 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 19 days in Prince Albert Wildlife Management Zone.
- (3) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence, a First Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence or a First Non-resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex on the Monday closest to August 24, or August 24 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 103 days in Wildlife Management Zones 70 to 76, including Clearwater River and Lac La Ronge Provincial Parks.

(5) It is lawful for a person who is a Saskatchewan resident and who holds a First Saskatchewan Non-trophy White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy white-tailed deer:

(a) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in Wildlife Management Zones 1, 4, 15 to 22, 30 to 40, 42, 43 and 47 to 55, including Brokenshell No.1, Brokenshell No.2, Fort a la Corne and Horsehide Lake Wildlife Management Units;

(b) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following consecutive 52 days in Duck Mountain and Moose Mountain Provincial Parks; or

(c) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 89 days in Regina-Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and Prince Albert Wildlife Management Zones.

(5.1) It is lawful for a person who is a Canadian resident and who holds a First Saskatchewan Non-trophy White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy white-tailed deer:

(a) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 89 days in Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones; or

(b) on the Monday closest to November 16, or on November 16 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 19 days in Prince Albert Wildlife Management Zone.

(6) It is lawful for a person who is a Saskatchewan resident and who holds a Second Saskatchewan Non-trophy White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy white-tailed deer on Labour Day and the following consecutive 89 days in Prince Albert Wildlife Management Zone.

(7) It is lawful during the period specified in section 7 for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Elk Licence and who also holds:

(a) a First Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer in Wildlife Management Zones 47 to 50, 53, and 56 to 69, including Horsehide Lake Wildlife Management Unit and Meadow Lake, Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks; or

(b) a First Saskatchewan Non-trophy White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy white-tailed deer in Wildlife Management Zones 40, 42, 43, 48 to 50, 52 and 54, including Fort-à-la-Corne and Horsehide Lake Wildlife Management Units.

Elk

7(1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Regular Elk Licence to hunt a total of one elk of either sex on the Monday closest to August 24, or on the Monday closest to September 14, or September 14 if it falls on a Monday, and on the following consecutive 12 days, or on the Monday closest to September 27, or September 27 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days, in:

(a) Wildlife Management Zones 48 to 50, 53, 56 to 66, 68 South and 69, including Meadow Lake, Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks;

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- (b) that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 47 lying north of Provincial Highway No. 3 and west of Provincial Highway No. 26;
 - (c) that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 47 lying north of Provincial Highway No. 3, east of Provincial Highway No. 4 and west of Grid Road No. 696; and
 - (d) that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 67 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 4 and west of Grid Road No. 696 and south of the Fourteenth Baseline.
- (2) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Elk Licence to hunt a total of one elk of either sex:
- (a) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following consecutive 17 days in Wildlife Management Zones 33 and 37, including Duck Mountain, Moose Mountain and Greenwater Lake Provincial Parks;
 - (b) on the Monday closest to August 31, or August 31 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 19 days in:
 - (i) Fort-a-la-Corne Wildlife Management Unit; and
 - (ii) Wildlife Management Zone 52 and that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 54 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 40; or
 - (c) on the Monday closest to September 14, or September 14 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days and on the forty-ninth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive five days in Wildlife Management Zones 42 and 43;
 - (d) on the Monday closest to November 2, or November 2 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days in Wildlife Management Zone 6 and that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 7 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 271 and Grid Road No. 615; or
 - (e) in that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 7 lying west of Provincial Highway No. 271 and Grid Road No. 615, including Cypress Hills Provincial Park (West Block):
 - (i) on the Monday closest to September 14, or September 14 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days;
 - (ii) on the Monday closest to October 26, or October 26 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days; or
 - (iii) on the Monday closest to November 30, or November 30 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days.
- (3) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Elk Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy elk:
- (a) on the Monday closest to November 23, or November 23 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days in Wildlife Management Zones 40, 48, 49, that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 50 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 6 and Grid Road No. 692, and Wildlife Management Zones 56 to 59, including Wildcat Hill Provincial Park, Horsehide Lake Wildlife Management Unit and Round Lake Recreation Site;

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- (b) on the seventh day following Labour Day and the following consecutive five days, and on the Monday closest to November 30, or November 30 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days, in those portions of Wildlife Management Zones 6 and 7 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 271 and Grid Road No. 615; or
 - (c) on the Monday closest to November 23, or November 23 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days in Wildlife Management Zone 37, including Duck Mountain Provincial Park, and in Greenwater Lake Provincial Park.
- (4) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Regular Elk Licence to hunt a total of one elk of either sex in Horsehide Lake Wildlife Management Unit:
- (a) on the Monday closest to August 24, or August 24 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days;
 - (b) on the Monday closest to September 14, or September 14 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 19 days; or
 - (c) on the Monday closest to November 23, or November 23 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days.

Moose

8(1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Moose Licence to hunt a total of one moose of either sex:

- (a) on the Monday closest to September 20, or September 20 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days in:
 - (i) Wildlife Management Zones 37, 43, 48 to 50, 53 and 55 to 73; and
 - (ii) that portion of Clearwater River Provincial Park lying south of 57 degrees north latitude and Duck Mountain, Lac La Ronge, Meadow Lake, Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks;
 - (b) on the Monday closest to August 24, or August 24 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 47 days in Wildlife Management Zones 74 to 76, including that portion of Clearwater River Provincial Park lying north of 57 degrees north latitude.
- (2) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Moose Licence to hunt a total of one moose of either sex on the Monday closest to September 20, or September 20 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days in:
- (a) Wildlife Management Zone 37; and
 - (b) Wildlife Management Zones 40, 42, 48, 49, 56 to 59, 62 to 66, including Fort-à-la-Corne Wildlife Management Unit and Duck Mountain, Greenwater Lake, Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks.

(3) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Guided Moose Licence to hunt a total of one moose of either sex:

(a) on the Monday closest to September 20, or September 20 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days in Wildlife Management Zones 60 to 62, 69 and 70 to 73, including Lac La Ronge Provincial Park and that portion of Clearwater River Provincial Park lying south of 57 degrees north latitude; or

(b) on the Monday closest to August 24, or August 24 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 47 days in Wildlife Management Zones 74 to 76, including that portion of Clearwater River Provincial Park lying north of 57 degrees north latitude.

Mule Deer

10(1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Mule Deer Archery Licence to hunt a total of one mule deer of either sex:

(a) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in Wildlife Management Zones 1 to 3, 5 to 7, 13 to 19, 21 to 31, 33, 36, 40, 41 to 47, 54, 55 and Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones, including Brokenshell No. 1, Brokenshell No. 2, Elbow and Great Bend Wildlife Management Units; or

(b) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following 54 days in Wildlife Management Zones 1 to 3, 5 to 7, 13 to 19, 21 to 31, 33, 36, 40, 41 to 47, 54, 55 consecutive 52 days in Cypress Hills (West Block) and Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Parks and that portion of Douglas Provincial Park lying west of Diefenbaker Lake (Gordon Mackenzie Arm).

(2) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Mule Deer Licence to hunt a total of one mule deer of either sex:

(a) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in Wildlife Management Zones 1 to 3, 5 to 7, 9 to 19, 21 to 31, 33, 36, 40 to 42, 44 to 47, 54 and 55 and Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones, including Brokenshell No. 1, Brokenshell No. 2, Elbow and Great Bend Wildlife Management Units;

(b) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following consecutive 52 days in Cypress Hills (West Block) and Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Parks and that portion of Douglas Provincial Park lying west of Diefenbaker Lake (Gordon Mackenzie Arm); or

(c) on the Monday closest to November 1, or November 1 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 26 days in Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones.

(3) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Non-trophy Mule Deer Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy mule deer on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in Wildlife Management Zones 11, 45 and 46.

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Bear

11 It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Bear Licence, a Canadian Resident Bear Licence or a Non-Resident Bear Licence to hunt a total of one black bear of either sex at the times and places mentioned in section 10 of *The Big Game Open Seasons Regulations, 1995* and in section 4 of *The Spring Bear Open Seasons Regulations, 1988*.

Muzzle-loading firearm seasons

12 No person shall hunt by any means other than a muzzle-loading firearm or crossbow during any open season established pursuant to sections 13 to 18.

White-tailed deer

13(1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex:

(a) on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 26 days in:

(i) Wildlife Management Zones 1 to 19 and 21 to 47, 51, 52 and 54, including Brokenshell No. 1, Brokenshell No. 2, Elbow, Fort-a-la-Corne, Great Bend and Horsehide Lake Wildlife Management Units; and

(ii) Cypress Hills (West Block), Duck Mountain, Moose Mountain and Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Parks and that portion of Douglas Provincial Park lying west of Diefenbaker Lake (Gordon Mackenzie Arm); or

(b) on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 61 days in Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones.

(2) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence, a Second Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence, a First Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence or a Second Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex:

(a) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in Wildlife Management Zones 56 to 69, including Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks;

(b) on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 26 days in Wildlife Management Zones 48 to 50, 53 and 55; and

(c) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following consecutive 52 days in Greenwater Lake and Meadow Lake Provincial Parks.

(2.1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Non-resident White-tailed Deer Licence or a Second Non-resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex:

(a) on Labour Day and the following consecutive 54 days in assigned operating areas of Wildlife Management Zones 56 to 69, including Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks;

- (b) on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 26 days in those portions of Wildlife Management Zones 48 to 50, 53 and 55 that comprise the assigned operating area of the outfitter with which the licence holder is hunting; and
 - (c) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following consecutive 52 days in Greenwater Lake and Meadow Lake Provincial Parks.
- (3) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Saskatchewan Resident White-tailed Deer Licence, a First Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence or a First Non-resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex on the Monday closest to August 24, or August 24 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 103 days in Wildlife Management Zones 70 to 76, including Clearwater River and Lac La Ronge Provincial Parks.
- (3.1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a First Canadian Resident White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one white-tailed deer of either sex on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 61 days in Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones.

- (5) It is lawful for a person who is a Saskatchewan resident and who holds a First Saskatchewan Non-trophy White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy white-tailed deer:

 - (i) Wildlife Management Zones 1, 4, 15 to 22, 30 to 40, 42, 43 and 47 to 55, including Brokenshell No. 1 and Brokenshell No. 2 Wildlife Management Units; and
 - (ii) Duck Mountain and Moose Mountain Provincial Parks; or
 - (b) on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 61 days in Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones.
- (5.1) It is lawful for a person who is a Canadian Resident and who holds a First Saskatchewan Non-trophy White-tailed Deer Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy white-tailed deer on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 61 days in Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones.

Elk

14(1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Elk Licence to hunt a total of one elk of either sex:

- (a) on the Wednesday following Labour Day and the following consecutive 17 days in Wildlife Management Zones 33 and 37, including Duck Mountain, Moose Mountain and Greenwater Lake Provincial Parks; or

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- (b) on the Monday closest to August 31, or August 31 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 19 days in:
 - (i) Fort-a-la-Corne Wildlife Management Unit; and
 - (ii) Wildlife Management Zone 52 and that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 54 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 40;
 - (c) on the thirty-fifth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive five days, and on the forty-ninth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive five days in Wildlife Management Zones 42 and 43;
 - (d) on the Monday closest to November 2, or November 2 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days in Wildlife Management Zone 6 and that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 7 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 271 and Grid Road No. 615; or
 - (e) in that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 7 lying west of Provincial Highway No. 271 and Grid Road No. 615, including Cypress Hills Provincial Park (West Block):
 - (i) on the Monday closest to September 14, or September 14 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days;
 - (ii) on the Monday closest to October 26, or October 26 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days; or
 - (iii) on the Monday closest to November 30, or November 30 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days.
- (2) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Elk Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy elk on the Monday closest to November 23, or November 23 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days in Wildlife Management Zones 40, 48, 49, that portion of Wildlife Management Zone 50 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 6 and Grid Road No. 692, and Wildlife Management Zones 56 to 59, including Wildcat Hill Provincial Park.
- (3) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Elk Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy elk on the Monday closest to November 23, or November 23 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days in Wildlife Management Zone 37, including Duck Mountain Provincial Park, and in Greenwater Lake Provincial Park.
- (4) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Elk Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy elk on the seventh day following Labour Day and the following consecutive five days, and on the Monday closest to November 30, or November 30 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive five days, in those portions of Wildlife Management Zones 6 and 7 lying east of Provincial Highway No. 271 and Grid Road No. 615.

15 It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Moose Licence to hunt a total of one moose of either sex on the Monday closest to September 20, or September 20 if it falls on a Monday, and the following consecutive 12 days in:

- (a) Wildlife Management Zone 37; and
- (b) Wildlife Management Zones 40, 42, 48, 49, 56 to 59 and 62 to 66, including Fort-à-la-Corne Wildlife Management Unit and Duck Mountain, Greenwater Lake, Narrow Hills, Wildcat Hill and Clarence-Steepbank Lakes Provincial Parks.

Mule Deer

17(1) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Mule Deer Licence to hunt a total of one mule deer of either sex on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 26 days in:

- (a) Wildlife Management Zones 1 to 3, 5 to 7, 9 to 19, 21 to 31, 33, 36, 40 to 42, 44 to 47, 54 and 55 and Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones, including Brokenshell No. 1, Brokenshell No. 2, Elbow and Great Bend Wildlife Management Units;
- (b) Cypress Hills (West Block) and Saskatchewan Landing Provincial Parks;
- (c) that portion of Douglas Provincial Park lying west of Diefenbaker Lake (Gordon Mackenzie Arm); or
- (d) Regina-Moose Jaw and Saskatoon Wildlife Management Zones.

(2) It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Special Non-trophy Mule Deer Licence to hunt a total of one non-trophy mule deer on the twenty-eighth day following Labour Day and the following consecutive 26 days in Wildlife Management Zones 11, 45 and 46.

Bear

18 It is lawful for a person who is the holder of a Saskatchewan Resident Bear Licence, a Canadian Resident Bear Licence or a Non-Resident Bear Licence to hunt a total of one black bear of either sex at the times and places specified in section 10 of *The Big Game Open Seasons Regulations, 1995* and in section 4 of *The Spring Bear Open Seasons Regulations, 1988*.

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Protected areas and recreation sites

19 Where a wildlife management zone is opened for hunting a species of big game pursuant to clause 6(2)(a), section 7 or 8, subsection 13(2) or section 14 or 15, the following protected areas and recreation sites lying within that wildlife management zone are deemed to be open for hunting that species on the Wednesday following Labour Day and closed on the last day of the season for that species:

- (a) Anderson Island Protected Area;
- (b) Bronson Forest Recreation Site;
- (c) Round Lake Recreation Site;
- (d) Waskwei River Protected Area;
- (e) Wildcat Hill Protected Area.
