#### Message from the Chairman

Under *The Expropriation Procedure Act*, the Public and Private Rights Board has the authority to review matters relating to the expropriation of land, or the intention to acquire land, by expropriating authorities. The Board investigates claims and manages negotiations between landowners and expropriating authorities in an effort to help the parties reach mutually acceptable solutions.

Landowners may request the Board to review either or both:

- a. the route, situation or design of a public improvement;
   and
- b. the amount of compensation offered for the expropriated land.

The primary role of the Public and Private Rights Board is dispute resolution. For this reason, the Board uses the services of The Dispute Resolution Office at the Ministry of Justice to deliver its mandate. The Board assists landowners and expropriating authorities in reaching agreement on the most appropriate route or design of a public improvement and/or what fair and reasonable compensation should be paid for the required land or easement.

"The primary purpose of compensation is to place the owner whose land has been taken in the same position financially as he was prior to the taking. On the one hand, the owner should not receive a windfall or unjust enrichment as a result of the taking. On the other hand, the owner should not be required to shoulder an economic loss for the general public benefit which is achieved as a result of the taking."

The Board assists parties in their negotiations and, if necessary, mediates a settlement. In many instances, resolution can be reached prior to the formal expropriation process being initiated. This is beneficial to all the parties as it brings a neutral third party to work with them to ensure accountability, clear understanding and openness.

Fair and efficient approaches to managing expropriation matters are important to Saskatchewan's future growth. To this end, the Board will continue to review its work to ensure best practices are employed in serving citizens and expropriating authorities.
