Foreword

Throughout the 1990s, Saskatchewan people have worked hard to build and diversify the provincial economy. There have been challenges, as well as opportunities. Together, we have met both challenge and opportunity with determination, innovation and confidence.

The 1999 Economic Review shows that we have indeed achieved significant progress. By balancing the budget and keeping it balanced, investing in our economy and our people and building a positive climate for investment and diversification, the Government has supported the work being done by individuals, businesses and communities across the Province. The results are clear: from 1993-98, Saskatchewan's annual rate of economic growth averaged 3.8 per cent, compared to a national average of 3.1 per cent. Personal disposable income grew by an average of 3.2 per cent a year - again outpacing the national average of 2.5 per cent. Exports, retail sales, manufacturing shipments and housing starts were all stronger than the national average through the six-year period 1993-98.

Over the past few years, prices for our primary products, particularly agriculture and energy resources, have witnessed some serious ups and downs. I am pleased to report that both crude oil and natural gas sales rebounded significantly from 1998. And, although the farm crisis remains a major concern, overall economic growth continued throughout 1999. Because our economy is more diversified than ever before, our ability to weather hard times in any one sector has significantly improved. In 1999, for example, areas such as non-agricultural manufacturing, rural housing starts and investment remained strong. A four-fold increase in investment in non-traditional areas such as arts, entertainment and recreation attests to the growing value of new industries in Saskatchewan.

Despite ongoing, serious difficulties in the agricultural sector, job growth has also continued. In non-agricultural sectors, 9,000 jobs were created in 1999. Job creation was especially strong in trade, transportation and utilities. Overall, 2,200 more people



were working in the Province than in the previous year, despite the loss of jobs in the agriculture sector. With nearly 481,000 people working in Saskatchewan - exceeding the previous year's record employment level - our economic strategy target of 30,000 new jobs between 1992 and 2000 was met one year ahead of schedule.

Saskatchewan people should be proud of what they accomplished in the 1990s. The past eight years represent the longest period of sustained growth since the 1970s. This hard work will continue to pay off in the form of more opportunities, lower taxes and more capacity to build and invest in our quality of life.

1999 In Review

Introduction

The Saskatchewan economy continues to grow. It averaged 3.8 per cent real growth per year from 1993 to 1998 compared to the national average of 3.1 per cent.

Diversification has allowed Saskatchewan to remain strong in the face of uncertain world markets.

Employment continued to grow, while average industrial hourly earnings increased 4.0 per cent for the first nine months of 1999. Manufacturing of electrical and electronic products increased by 29.6 per cent for the first ten months of 1999 while exports of non-agricultural goods rose by 8.1 per cent for the same time period.

Employment Level Remains Strong

The employment level in Saskatchewan averaged 480,800 persons for 1999. This represents an increase of 2,200 over the 1998 average of 478,600 people. Non-agricultural employment rose significantly over the same time period with a 1999 average of 416,200 people over the 1998 average of 407,200 people. Higher employment levels were reported for trade, services, and transportation, warehousing and other utilities in 1999.

The Saskatchewan labour force averaged 512,100 persons for 1999, up from 508,600 persons in 1998.


The 1999-2000 Budget Takes Balanced Approach.

The 1999-2000 provincial Budget included new public spending for health care, education and highways, cut the Education and Health Tax to 6 per cent, and increased investment in agricultural research and development. These actions, along with \$3.6 billion in debt reduction since 1994 and six consecutive balanced budgets ensure that Saskatchewan provides a climate for economic growth.

Investment Provides Opportunity for Growth


Investment continued to play a key role in Saskatchewan. The revised Public and Private Investment Intentions Survey by Statistics Canada showed almost \$7 billion in new capital expenditures for 1999, a 3.0 per cent increase from 1998.

While investment in traditional industries such as mining and construction continued to be strong, new targets for investment have emerged. Investment in arts, entertainment and recreation was almost four times higher in 1999 than in 1998. Transportation and warehousing, utilities, finance and insurance, and real estate, rental and leasing also posted strong increases in investment. Increased diversification further strengthens Saskatchewan's ability to grow in the new millennium.



Building Permit Values for Construction Rise

Continuing the strong growth of 1998, building permit values increased 6.1 per cent for the first ten months of 1999. This growth was attributed to a 24.7 per cent rise in the value of institutional and government building permits and a 9.4 per cent increase in commercial permit values.



The number of new homes being built also increased. Buoyed by a 38.5 per cent rise in rural housing starts, overall residential housing starts increased 9.8 per cent for the first nine months of 1999.

This increase in housing starts pushed up demand for household furniture and appliances. Retail sales for such goods increased 4.0 per cent for the first ten months of 1999.

Natural Gas Fuels Mineral Production

Natural gas production increased 4.8 per cent for the first nine months of 1999 while sodium sulphate also posted impressive increases over 1998 levels.

Spurred on by a 67.0 per cent increase in gas drillings for 1999, the number of wells drilled increased 42.1 per cent over 1998.

These factors have contributed to a substantial increase in the value of mineral sales. For first nine months of 1999, crude oil sales increased 37.2 per cent and natural gas sales rose 47.6 per cent over comparative 1998 values.

Farm Cash Receipts Down

Farm cash receipts declined 6.0 per cent for the first nine months of 1999. Low prices for wheat, durum and barley caused crop receipts to drop 12.5 per cent. Despite record hog slaughters, low hog prices along with decreased cattle marketing reduced livestock receipts 3.4 per cent over the same period.


To combat the low prices for traditional crops, Saskatchewan farmers have continued to diversify. Specialty crops such as lentils and dry peas set record levels of production while total specialty crop production was at its highest level since 1996.

Manufacturing Faces Up and Down Year

The first ten months of 1999 saw manufacturing shipments increase 1.9 per cent over its 1998 level. Manufactured machinery was hard hit by the downturn in the agricultural sector with shipments down 8.1 per cent. Low commodity prices also affected the non-metallic mineral products and food industries. However, these losses were offset by increased shipments of wood, and electrical and electronic products, which posted increases of 18.2 per cent and 29.6 per cent, respectively.

Saskatchewan's Population Increases

The population of Saskatchewan increased by 2,577 persons to 1,027,780 on July 1, 1999 from 1,025,203 on July 1998.



Inflation Remains Within Target

The Saskatchewan Consumer Price Index indicated that average prices for Saskatchewan rose 1.7 per cent for the first eleven months of 1999 over the same time period in 1998. The rise was caused primarily by higher prices for transportation, shelter, and alcoholic beverages and tobacco.

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Table 1: Population, Canada and Saskatchewan by Sex





Table 2: Saskatchewan Components of Population Change



Table 3: Population, Saskatchewan Distribution by Age Groups





Table 5: City Population, Saskatchewan




Table 6: Percentage Distribution of Population by Place of Residence



Table 10: Employed by Industry, Saskatchewan









Table 15: New Motor Vehicle Sales, Saskatchewan








Table 21: Private and Public Investment by Industry, Saskatchewan



Table 22: Per Capita Capital Investment, Canada and the Western Provinces



Table 27: Value of Mineral Sales by Kind, Saskatchewan





Table 29: Principal Markets for Saskatchewan Crude Oil









Table 40: Production of Principal Field Crops, Saskatchewan







Table 44: Gross Marketings of Livestock by Crop District, Saskatchewan






Table 47: Saskatchewan Grain Exports by Destination


Table 48: Oilseeds Marketings, Saskatchewan







Table 59: Number of Locations and Total Receipts for Major Accommodation Groups, Saskatchewan





Table 61: Motor Vehicle Registrations, Saskatchewan






Table 62: Telephone Statistics, Saskatchewan

SASKATCHEWAN BY CENSUS DIVISION



Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has developed a set of economic accounts which can be used to trace the development and growth of the Saskatchewan economy.

The purpose of the accounts is to measure the value of economic activity in each sector of the economy. This is done by means of a balancing set of accounts similar to the annual income and expenditure statements of a commercial enterprise.

The accounts have many useful functions. They consolidate information which is now provided through a number of scattered sources and organize it into a central framework. This allows many kinds of economic analysis to be performed ranging from monitoring current economic performance to analysis of structural change in the economy.

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has available upon request, many more detailed tables and other information concerning the Saskatchewan Economic Accounts.

Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

Saskatchewan Gross Domestic Product (GDP) measures the total value of goods and services produced annually in the province. By removing the effects of inflation, it is possible to measure the volume of output. After adjusting for price changes, Saskatchewan's real Gross Domestic Product increased by 2.3 percent in 1998.

In nominal terms, Saskatchewan's GDP decreased by 2.2 percent in 1998 to \$28,793 million. Personal expenditure on consumer goods and services rose by 2.4 percent as consumers increased spending in most categories. Government current expenditure on goods and services rose by 3.8 percent in 1998.

Total investment decreased 8.8 percent over 1997 due to a 44.2 percent drop in mining investment. However, total non-mining investment rose 12.8 percent with significant increases to investment in transportation, finance and insurance, and manufacturing.

The value of physical change in inventories was negative in 1998 as wholesale trade experienced large drawdowns of inventories.

Nominal exports decreased by 6.5 percent over 1997 levels following declines in grain, crude oil and manufactured goods exports. Nominal imports rose by 1.1 percent in 1998 as imports of goods from abroad increased.

Final domestic demand for goods and services by individuals, the government and for investment purposes fell by 0.2 percent over 1997 levels, after adjustments for inflation. Real personal expenditure on consumer goods and services increased by 2.1 percent, government expenditures on goods and services increased by 3.2 percent and real gross fixed capital formation decreased by 6.4 percent.

This document represents an update to the Saskatchewan economic accounts, released in June 1999. Periodic revisions are common to all economic series to improve the accuracy, reliability and consistency of the data.
