Foreword

The 1991 crop will be the third above-average crop since 1988 and, when the economic review for 1991 is done, it appears that we can expect to see that the volume of output in the Saskatchewan economy has increased once again. But the growth in activity has not translated into wealth due to external factors.

Saskatchewan has been producing more and receiving less. The basic health of the Saskatchewan economy is being eroded by falling prices for most of the commodities that we produce. These lower prices have constrained income flows and slowed the rate of job creation.

The people of Saskatchewan need jobs and, in this sense, the economy has not fared well as job growth has not kept pace with the expansion in the level of overall economic output. In fact, there are far fewer people employed in the province today than in 1988.


International market conditions, grain price wars, the national recession and the province's high debt load have restricted the government's ability to address the slowness in the economy. These factors can be expected to continue to constrain the government's ability to react in the near future.

We have set ourselves the formidable task of eliminating the budgetary deficit while maintaining an environment of sustained economic growth and job creation over the next few years. This task will be carried out on two fronts. The first is the difficult task of restoring order to the government's finances. The second is the pursuit of responsible economic policies.

Government must live within its means. We must learn to control spending to reduce the burden of debt being transferred to future generations. The government must ensure that public resources go to the most economically and socially productive activities. In the development of responsible and effective financial and economic policies government must work diligently with the people of Saskatchewan, in open and democratic consultations, so that workable and acceptable solutions to the province's problems can be found.

1991 In Review

Canadian Economy


The Canadian economy grew by 1.4 per cent in the second quarter, the first increase after four consecutive quarters of decline. The second quarter surge was led by exports which increased by 5.2 per cent. During the third quarter, however, falling exports and investment slowed growth to 0.2 per cent.

The second and third quarter growth was accompanied by lower inflation. The rise in the Consumer Price Index slowed to 0.7 per cent in the second quarter and 0.6 per cent in the third quarter, from 2.9 per cent in the first quarter.

The annualized inflation rate fell below 6.0 per cent in July for the first time in 1991. It averaged 6.4 per cent during the first six months of 1991 as indirect tax increases added approximately 2.6 percentage points to the annual inflation rate. The average inflation rate came just under 6.0 per cent from January to October.

Employment growth has been erratic on a monthly basis. Overall, however, employment has risen modestly since April, after five months or so of consecutive decline, but increases in the labour force left the unemployment rate largely unchanged. The unemployment rate averaged 10.3 per cent in the past ten months.

Both short-term and long-term interest rates in Canada continued to decline. The Canadian dollar also continued to appreciate, closing October over 89 U.S. cents, a 13-year high.



The federal budgetary deficit reached 28.8 billion in the first half of 1991, approximately \$10.6 billion more than the deficit in the first half of 1990. Revenues were 2.1 per cent above a year ago but expenditures increased by 9.0 per cent over the same period.

The U.S. Economy

The U.S. recession began in the fourth quarter of 1990. Real GNP declined by 1.6 per cent in the fourth quarter, 2.8 per cent in the First quarter of 1991 and 0.5 per cent in the Second quarter.

The U.S. economy expanded for the first time in the third quarter of 1991 at 0.6 per cent. The third quarter rise in real GNP was fuelled by increases in consumer spending and business investment.

In October, however, consumer and business confidence plunged anew. Meanwhile, the unemployment rate increased to 6.8 per cent from 6.7 per cent in September and consumer prices jumped 0.4 per cent in September, the heftiest increase yet since January 1991.

Rest of the World

The once robust German economy dipped in the second quarter. Rising inflation, interest rates, and the high cost of reunification appear to have pulled the German economy down. In contrast, the Japanese economy continued to advance, posting a 5.9 per cent growth in the first quarter. Japanese growth was driven by strong exports.

In the United Kingdom, signs of continuing weakness remain although both the British unemployment rate and inflation rates have eased.

Other European countries also experienced slow growth and moderate inflation during the first half of 1991.

Saskatchewan's Economy

Saskatchewan conducts trade with the rest of Canada, the United States and the rest of the world. Saskatchewan produces and sells internationally traded goods like grains, oilseeds, crude oil, natural gas, potash and uranium.


Exports account for more than one-third of the province's Gross Domestic Product. Well over two-thirds of Saskatchewan's exports are shipped to foreign countries while the rest go to other Canadian provinces. Swings in world trade and prices often determine Saskatchewan's economic performance but the province has very little control over such factors.

Saskatchewan had an excellent crop harvest in 1991. The sharp decline in grain prices, however, will sap farm income just as the increased harvest will increase farm expenses. Government payments, including Saskatchewan's share of approximately \$295.0 million in the recently announced federal farm aid package, will help offset some of the income loss that farmers will endure due to low prices but it is not nearly enough to bail out the farm sector from financial difficulties.

The excellent harvest will raise Saskatchewan's real Gross Domestic Product, which measures the volume of production in the province, in 1991. But neither the harvest nor the economic growth rate mean strong income growth.

Consumer Prices

Saskatchewan's inflation rate, as measured by the increase in the Consumer Price Index, averaged 5.7 per cent during the first ten months of 1991, approximately 1.4 percentage points higher than the average inflation rate over the same period in 1990.



Consumer prices rose by 6.8 per cent on a year-over-year basis in January, after the federal Goods and Services tax was introduced, and by 6.6 per cent in April, after the provincial sales tax was harmonized with the federal Goods and Services Tax.

Labour Force and Population

Saskatchewan's labour force averaged 487,000 through to October 1991 compared to 485,000 over the same period last year. The total number of employed people for the January to October period averaged 451,000, largely unchanged from last year's total.

Agricultural employment averaged 84,000 and non-agricultural employment was 367,000, both also unchanged from last year's levels.

The total number of unemployed increased to 36,000 over the same period from 34,000. The province's actual unemployment rate averaged 7.4 per cent through to October, up from just 7.0 per cent in the same period last year.



As at October, there were roughly 1.3 million people without jobs in Canada, reflecting an unemployment rate of 10.3 per cent on a seasonally adjusted basis. The national unemployment rate also averaged 10.3 per cent from January to October. Saskatchewan's unemployment rate was consistently the lowest among the provinces through to October.

The province's population as at July 1991 was 997,400 up approximately 2,100 from January 1991 for the first time since the fourth quarter of 1987. The province continues to lose population through out-migration but the pace has slowed substantially from previous years.

Agriculture

In 1991, Saskatchewan farmers harvested an estimated 25.3 million tonnes of the 15 major crops, approximately 24.0 per cent more than the 1981-1990 average production of 20.3 million tonnes.

Total farm cash receipts are projected to reach \$4.3 billion in 1991, up 7.6 per cent from 1990. Slightly higher grain sales and government payments will partially offset the lower average crop prices during the year. Government payments are now estimated to comprise approximately 21.4 per cent of total farm cash receipts.

Mining

Mining is another important industry in the province. Mineral fuels production, consisting of crude oil, natural gas and coal, accounts for more than half of the total mining industry in the province.

Mineral fuels production advanced marginally in 1991. Crude oil production, through to August, increased by 1.2 per cent while natural gas production was up by 6.0 per cent over the same period. However, heavy crude oil and natural gas prices have been weak.

Oil and gas drilling, through to November 15, 1991, declined by 10.9 per cent and 22.0 per cent, respectively. The number of oil wells drilled to date reached only 442 wells compared to 496 wells drilled over the same period in 1990. Drilling of natural gas wells totalled 409 wells compared to 525 last year.

Coal production to August decreased by 6.8 per cent from the same period last year.

The other significant mineral products in Saskatchewan are potash and uranium. Potash production increased during the first nine months of the year. Current estimates place the volume of potash production at 4.7 million tonnes, up 6.4 per cent from last year.

The value of potash sales is estimated to be roughly equal to last year's despite a marginal improvement in the overall price of potash and large Chinese purchases.

Uranium production advanced by 14.6 per cent through to September. The start up of the Rabbit Lake mill in August added to the production of uranium in the province. The recent low spot prices of uranium, however, have left pessimism in the industry.

Manufacturing Investment

Saskatchewan's manufacturing sector is small but the construction of a second heavy oil upgrader, a fertilizer plant and a pulp mill will help support economic growth in 1991 as well as offer opportunities for more growth in future when these new facilities come on stream or reach full capacity production.

Total manufacturing investment for 1991 is estimated at just under \$1.0 billion or roughly one-fifth of the total planned new capital investment of about \$5.0 billion for the year.

Manufacturing Shipments and Retail Sales

The total value of manufacturing shipments from January to August decreased by 3.7 per cent from the same period last year. All the product components of manufacturing shipments posted a decline except fabricated metal and chemical products which exhibited strong growth of 35.0 per cent and 16.6 per cent, respectively.

Retail sales in the province during the first six months amounted to \$2.5 billion, down 6.0 per cent from the same period in 1990.

All the provinces experienced similar declines in retail sales during the same period. Total Canadian retail sales amounted to \$85.5 billion, down by 6.9 per cent.

Sales of passenger cars and commercial vehicles to September reflect a decline of 5.2 per cent from last year.

Housing Starts

Residential housing starts to September totalled 781 units compared to 1,214 units during the same period in 1990. More than half of these units were started in urban areas but urban housing starts reflect a larger decline of 49 per cent. Rural housing starts totalled 341 units, down by only 2.3 per cent from last year.

1992 Outlook

Construction of the second oil upgrader, the fertilizer plant and the pulp mill will peak this year, leading to potentially weaker capital expenditures next year. As well, a return to normal crop volumes means a decline to trend levels in 1992.

Weak prices for agricultural commodities will temper farm income growth next year. Obtaining additional farm support will, therefore, be crucial.

On the other hand, the elimination of the provincial sales tax on a host of consumer items, including restaurant meals, groceries, clothings and used cars, and the concomitant decline in the inflation rate, should increase consumer spending in the province.

Consumer spending accounts for more than half of the province's Gross Domestic Product. Consumer spending growth will drive service-related activities to expand next year.






Table 2: Population, Saskatchewan Births, Deaths, Natural Increase and Immigration

Table 3: Population, Saskatchewan Distribution by Age Groups



Table 5: City Population, Saskatchewan





Table 6: Percentage Distribution of Population by Place of Residence



Table 19: Indexes of Farm Prices and Farm Costs (1986 = 100)





Table 20: Industry Selling Price Indexes, Canada (1986 = 100)









Table 51: Air Traffic - Inbound and Outbound Passengers

Table 52: Visitation at Provincial Parks and Recreational Areas





Table 53: United States Visitors Entering Saskatchewan by Type of Transportation







Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has developed a set of economic accounts which can be used to trace the development and growth of the Saskatchewan economy.

The purpose of the accounts is to measure the value of economic activity in each sector of the economy. This is done by means of a balancing set of accounts similar to the annual income and expenditure statements of a commercial enterprise.

The accounts have many useful functions. They consolidate information which is now provided through a number of scattered sources and organize it into a central framework. This allows many kinds of economic analysis to be performed ranging from monitoring current economic performance to analysis of structural change in the economy.

The Saskatchewan Bureau of Statistics has available upon request, many more detailed tables and other information concerning the Saskatchewan Economic Accounts.

Saskatchewan Economic Accounts

Saskatchewan Gross Domestic Product (GDP) measures the total value of goods and services in the province. By removing the effects of inflation, it is possible to measure the volume of output.

In 1990 the economy grew by 5.6 per cent. After adjusting for price changes Saskatchewan's real Gross Domestic Product increased by 4.0 per cent. Total gross fixed capital formation increased substantially over 1989, accounting for 23.5 per cent of total positive growth. Within this category notable advances were observed in business non-residential construction. Exports increased by 10.9 per cent over 1989. This increase largely reflected a rise in the volume of grain exports.

Final domestic demand for goods and services by individuals, the government and for investment purposes rose by 1.9 per cent in 1990 over 1989 levels, after adjustments for inflation. Personal expenditures on

consumer goods and services declined by 0.4 per cent in 1990. Real government expenditures on goods and services increased by 4.1 per cent in 1990. Real gross fixed capital formation rose by 6.2 per cent. Government investment declined in all areas while business investment recorded advances in all categories with the exception of residential construction.

This document represents an update to the economic accounts since the release of the government's annual Economic and Financial Position of August 1991. Periodic revisions are common to all economic series to improve the accuracy, reliability and consistency of the data. In late 1991 adjustments to farm income was modified to include both adjustments to grain transactions and the difference between farm subsidies recorded on an accrued basis and a cash basis. This adjustment was necessary to ensure that farm subsidies are now reported on an accrued basis. The net result to total GDP is minimal because a similar adjustment to farm subsidies was made under indirect taxes less subsidies.
