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
### **The Cover**

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## Foreword

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


During our Celebrate Saskatchewan year, we have remembered with pride and gratitude the contributions made by our pioneers since 1905 in the development of Saskatchewan. Because of their work and vision, and with their example in mind, our province has progressed greatly from a time when its less than 250,000 inhabitants depended almost entirely for their livelihood on wheat production and sales.

Today, the Saskatchewan economy supports a population of 970,000 people. Rather than relying on a single commodity, our economy rests on the exporting of a broad range of agricultural, mineral and manufactured products. Because of this broader base, our economic structure affords a degree of stability and assurance of prosperity that our pioneers could only dream of.

In this light, 1979 was a remarkable year. Saskatchewan's economy generated real economic growth as well as 15,000 new jobs, in the face of a twenty-five per cent drop in crop production from 1978.

Notwithstanding the steady growth experienced in the 1970's, Saskatchewan's economy still remains vulnerable to the ups and downs of economic cycles. Agriculture will remain our economic base, but it is clear that we need to continue our efforts to develop Saskatchewan's resources, and diversify our province's production. If we are successful in this, we can continue to enhance the quality of life for our citizens.

## Saskatchewan, 1905 and 1980

Although we would have to refer to the journals and diaries of our pioneers to understand the real flavour of Saskatchewan life in 1905, we can gather some idea of conditions from Census information gathered in 1906.

The period around Saskatchewan's entry into Confederation was a time of rapid settlement. In 1901, its population was only 91,279. That figure had increased to 257,763 by 1906.

As is the case in any pioneer society, the sex and age composition of early Saskatchewan favoured the young, the men, and the single. There were six men for every four women, compared to the near 50:50 ratio of today. Those in the 20-44 year age group represented 44 per cent of the population. Today that figure is 34 per cent. Conversely, those 65 years and older made up only two per cent of the population, compared to the almost 12 per cent of today.

Because the settlers were for the most part young and single, those most socially and economically mobile, the birth rate for Saskatchewan in 1905 was considerably less than one would find in an older, more settled community.

In 1906, only 18 per cent of the population, less than 46,000 people, had been born in Saskatchewan including Indian people native to Saskatchewan.

The new settlers came from diverse backgrounds. About one-third, 83,197 people, came from other parts of Canada, in the main, from Ontario. Of those born in other countries, the British Isles and the United States were virtually equal in providing about 35,500 migrants each. Austria-Hungary sent 21,865 migrants, followed by Russia with 16,551. Many of the Russians were Doukhobors.

Of course, this massive influx of immigrants meant that Indian people made up an ever-decreasing proportion of Saskatchewan's population. From 8.2 per cent in 1901, the Indian population on Reserves had decreased in 1906 to only 2.5 per cent of the total.

The economic base of the province in the beginning was agriculture, as in large measure, it continues to be. Between 1900 and 1906 the number of farms in Saskatchewan grew from 13,380 to 55,971, more than

quadrupling in only six years. Today, the number of farms is approximately 69,000.

Acreage under cultivation showed a similar dramatic increase. Wheat jumped from an insignificant figure to over two million acres by 1906. By the same year, barley was at 77,573 acres, and oats at 901,646 acres. Flax was cultivated on 108,834 acres, and potatoes on 16,628. But to indicate the vast area of land available and not yet under cultivation, one should point out that the ratio of area under field crops to total area of land was only 1 to 48.

The number of livestock on farms was on the increase. Certain animals had a larger relative importance than they do today, however.

As well as increases in the number of farmers, the urban population of Saskatchewan was growing. In 1906, the largest city in the province was Moose Jaw, with 6,249 inhabitants — an increase from 1,558 in 1901. During the same period, Regina's numbers grew from 2,249 to 6,169. Saskatoon mushroomed from 113 to 3,011. Saskatchewan's fourth city, Prince Albert, increased from 1,785 to 3,005 persons.

There were three towns whose population was greater than 1,000 persons in 1906. These were Indian Head (1,545), Yorkton (1,363), and Moosomin (1,152). Battleford and North Battleford were counted separately, but taken together they would have been the largest town, at 1,757 people. Today's cities of Estevan and Weyburn were towns of 877 and 966 people respectively. Swift Current was then a village of 554 people.

Even at that time, the urban-rural ratio was slowly growing in favour of the urban sector. In 1901, 15.6 per cent of the population was urban — in 1906, it was 18.8 per cent. This trend was, of course, to become more pronounced in later years. Today, over 55 per cent of Saskatchewan's people live in communities of 1,000 people or more.


In the intervening years, the population rose and fell with the economic fortunes of the province. The Census counted approximately the same number of residents in 1931, 1961, 1971 and 1976. With steady and broadly-based economic growth through the late 1970's,

Saskatchewan's population reached its highest level ever in 1980, standing at 970,000 people. The Census to be taken in June 1981 will undoubtedly find evidence of further growth.


## Current Economic Performance

### Growth in Output, Income and Employment

Saskatchewan's positive economic performance in 1979 and 1980 reflects the province's position as a diversified primary producer. Continuing strength in the non-agricultural sectors has generated real economic and employment growth, in the face of two successive years of below average crop production. Despite a fall in grain production of 25 per cent in 1979, total output in the economy increased by 1.8 per cent, measured in constant (deflated) dollars. The economy has continued to grow at a similar rate in 1980, led by the mining and manufacturing sectors.




Saskatchewan has enjoyed increasing levels of real output every year since 1973. By contrast, during the previous twenty years the provincial economy suffered an absolute fall in real output more frequently than one year in three. The province's economic base has gradually broadened, to include oil and gas, potash, oilseeds and uranium as major exports, in addition to grains and livestock. Together with important stabilization programs in agriculture, the development of resource industries has noticeably stabilized economic cycles in the province through the 1970's.




Rising export values, buoyed up by escalating world commodity prices in potash, oil and gas, kraft pulp and major grains, contributed substantially to raising the value of provincial Gross Domestic Product to \$11,081 million in 1979.

Intense interest in the development of resources has attracted new investment to Saskatchewan at a rapid rate. Major projects include development or expansion of several potash and uranium mines, downtown redevelopment and expansion of a steel mill in Regina, construction of office and apartment buildings in Saskatoon, installation of two 300 megawatt, coal-fired electrical generating units at a plant near Coronach, and commercial and residential construction in a number of smaller centres, especially those providing services to oil and gas drilling and to mining.



In contrast to the late 1960's, when falling non-agricultural investment tended to magnify the negative impact of downturns in agriculture production, investment in the latter half of the 1970's has acted as a source of balance and offsetting strength in the economy.

Growth in the value of output led to a rise in personal income of 13 per cent in 1979, reflecting increases of 10 per cent in average weekly wages, 2.2 per cent in net farm income and 17 per cent in income from other sources. These gains were partially offset by inflation; the consumer price index rose by an average of 8.7 per cent in Regina and Saskatoon, following slightly behind the national trend. Rising interest rates, reflecting national and international forces, contributed to rather weak growth in personal expenditures and acted as a significant restraint on farm and business net incomes.



Employment grew at a rate of 3.8 per cent in 1979, sufficient to absorb a small decrease in agricultural employment and generate 15,000 additional jobs in other sectors. This rate of job creation led to net immigration from other provinces and elsewhere of 2,100 persons, and reduced the unemployment rate to 4.2 per cent. Labour force participation rates remain slightly lower than the national average. Employment has grown at a slightly slower pace in 1980, maintaining Saskatchewan's unemployment rate significantly below the Canadian average.

### Industrial Growth

The economy's fastest-growing sectors in 1979, measured in current (undeflated) dollars, included mining, manufacturing, utilities, construction and forestry. The rapid growth in income generated in those sectors reflects the strong growth in exports and investment activity that occurred in Saskatchewan in 1979.


Service-producing industries grew rather more slowly, on average, as did agriculture.

### Agriculture

In agriculture, 1979 was a year of mixed success. Grain production, including wheat, barley, oats, rye, rapeseed and flax, declined by 25 per cent to 14.5 million tonnes, due to late seeding conditions, a hot and dry July and early frost in August. Transportation constraints limited marketing in the first half of the year, resulting in an increase of on-farm wheat stocks in Saskatchewan, from 3.8 million tonnes on July 31, 1978 to 6.3 million tonnes on July 31, 1979. By July 1, 1980, on-farm stocks had dropped to 3.1 million tonnes, as efforts to speed the handling and transportation of grain paid off in a 23 per cent increase in farmers' shipments to primary elevators in Saskatchewan from the previous crop year. Total grain and oilseed shipments out of Saskatchewan reached 14.6 million tonnes, in the twelve months ending July 31, 1980.

International grain prices rose through 1979 and 1980, except for a three to four month period early in 1980, when the United States grain embargo to the Soviet Union caused a significant price softening. The Canadian Wheat Board export asking price at Thunder Bay for No. 1 C.W. 13.5 per cent protein wheat rose from \$158 per tonne on September 15, 1978 to \$230 per tonne on September 15, 1980. Other prices have also strengthened. Prices for feed barley and flax increased by more than 50 per cent between these dates, while the street price for rapeseed rose in the order of 10 per cent. Cattle prices showed marked improvement over 1978 levels, while hog prices declined slightly. However, an increase in hog marketings resulted in increased receipts.

Farm cash receipts rose an estimated 17.5 per cent in 1979, to \$2.9 billion. Included in this figure is over \$500 million in payments from various income and price stabilization programs, principally the Western Grain Stabilization program, Saskatchewan Crop Insurance, net cash advances, net deferments of grain receipts and final payments from the Canadian Wheat Board.

After accounting for farm operating and depreciation expenses, the net income flow realized by farmers rose by more than 32 per cent. Personal income from farming, which excludes the value of sales from inventory, grew only marginally, as noted earlier in the Review.

Prolonged drought conditions during the spring and early summer raised grave doubts concerning the success of the 1980 grain harvest, and left cattle producers with a shortage of good quality feed. Above average rainfall in July and August saved the grain crop, resulting in a Saskatchewan harvest of 15.4 million tonnes, up almost 1 million tonnes from the 1979 level. The general quality of the 1980 crop was reduced as a result of unfavourable harvest weather.

The combination of spring drought, strong demand for feed grains and softening prices for feeders has induced further liquidation of the cattle breeding herd in the province in 1980. The Saskatchewan Hog Assured Returns Program (SHARP) is providing a measure of


stability in the hog industry, in the face of rising feed costs and fluctuating hog prices experienced in the first three quarters of 1980.

Continuing strong world demand for grain has put increasing pressures on the carrying capacity of the grain transportation system. To provide part of the extra rolling stock needed to maintain Saskatchewan's share of the grain export market, the Saskatchewan Grain Car Corporation has ordered delivery of 1,000 hopper cars. The cars are expected to be put into the system in 1981.

### Mining

The mining sector enjoyed an increase of over 15 per cent in the value of mineral shipments in 1979. Potash sales set new records, reaching 7.1 million tonnes of K<sub>2</sub>O equivalent, 10 per cent above the previous high, set in 1978. Sales to the People's Republic of China of 400,000 tonnes of K<sub>2</sub>O equivalent over a period of three years were announced in 1980. Uranium prices fell back from 1978 levels in 1979 and 1980; production is expected to show moderate growth in 1980. While production of light and medium crude oil continued to decline slowly in 1979, heavy oil production increased for the fourth year in a row.

Oil and gas exploration approached record levels, as 1,275 wells were drilled in 1979. Much of this activity focussed on heavy oil in the Lloydminster area, where a record 777 wells were drilled. Sales of petroleum and natural gas rights set a new record of \$37 million in 1979. By October, 1980, sales for the year amounted to \$66 million. Uncertainty surrounding the net effect on


Saskatchewan industry of pricing, taxation and incentive provisions contained in the National Energy Program, however, raises the risk of adverse movements in oil and gas development and production in the early 1980's.

Over 60 per cent of all Canadian hard rock exploration in 1979 took place in Northern Saskatchewan, resulting in four new uranium discoveries. Completion of the first phase of the Cluff Lake uranium mine south of Lake Athabasca and expansion of capacity at Beaverlodge will have raised installed production capacity in the industry to 10.4 million pounds of  $U_3O_8$ , by the end of 1980. Environmental assessment hearings on a proposal to build a new mine at Key Lake were completed in 1980; the results are expected to be released early in 1981.

In November, 1979, the Potash Corporation of Saskatchewan announced a ten year expansion plan that will increase its production from 2.3 million tonnes of  $K_2O$  in 1979 to 6.9 million tonnes, involving expansion of the Corporation's four mines and construction of one or more new mines. In 1980, plans for capacity expansion of three privately-owned mines were announced, followed by an announcement by PCS of a \$430 million expansion at Lanigan and plans to construct a new mine at Bredenbury.


### Manufacturing

Factory shipments grew by 23 per cent in 1979. Serving the regional market, the food and beverage industry represents approximately 40 per cent of Saskatchewan's manufacturing activity. Other areas, including steel production, farm implements and high technology electronics, are emerging as sources of strength. The province's largest single manufacturing concern, the Interprovincial Steel and Pipe Company Ltd. (IPSCO), is in the process of expanding capacity from 490,000 tonnes to 680,000 tonnes of steel production per year. In 1980, IPSCO was awarded a contract for large diameter pipe for the pre-build section of the Alaska Highway Natural Gas Pipeline project.



### Service Industries

While goods-producing industries attract attention as the economic base of the province, the vibrancy of the service sectors provides a good indicator of the ability of the economy to exploit growth in the primary sectors and to provide business and employment opportunities for Saskatchewan residents.



The trade, finance and service sectors have led as job generators over the past twenty years. In 1979, over half of new job creation occurred in these three sectors. While the greatest variety of service industries is located in the largest urban centres of Regina and Saskatoon, smaller centres around the province are undergoing a transition, as they develop to meet the needs of resource development and satisfy rising levels of income of Saskatchewan residents generally.

### Prospects for the 1980's

Saskatchewan's recent economic performance demonstrates that the province has achieved a reasonable degree of protection against inevitable variations in agricultural production. In comparison with more developed manufacturing economies, Saskatchewan is relatively well insulated against the current North American recession, because of its diverse range of exports and agricultural income stabilization programs.

Announced or predictable investment plans, and market opportunities in major export commodities, provide reason to expect continuing economic and population growth in the province in the early 1980's. In order to allow more of the benefits of development to remain and multiply within the province, a major challenge for Saskatchewan during this period will be to supply a broader range of the goods and services required for its primary industries.







**Table 3: Population, Saskatchewan Distribution by Age Groups**





New Motor Vehicles Sales, Saskatchewan








**Table 64: Motor Vehicle Registrations, Saskatchewan**





## SASKATCHEWAN BY CROP DISTRICTS




